Attending Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) Event

Jill Yarnell took the floor to introduce our two speakers, participants in the last RYLA event. Arine Karapetyan is at Woodroffe HS, speaks Armenian, Russian, English and is learning other languages. She is involved in several youth activities including Junior Achievement and now RYLA. Alessia Achihaei, daughter of members **Eugen** and **Luana**, speaks Romanian, English and French and studies at Lycée Claudel. She hopes to study law and possibly have a career in international relations.

Arine and Alessia spoke alternately to the slide presentation. RYLA started in 1971 and is organized locally by Rotary Clubs around the world. Its purpose is to encourage interaction by learning and working together and learning leadership and good citizenship and the ideals of Rotary service. In previous years the participants would assemble in Kingston, be addressed by senior officials and other speakers visit a museum, have a French-Canadian dinner, put on a talent show and finish with a dance party. In 2020 they were addressed by two young leaders and by Sunjay Nath, an award winning speaker on motivation and life strategies. From these they learned the importance of teamwork, evaluating situations for themselves and making their own decisions. In online group work often with case studies they learned from their peers and better identified their own strengths and weaknesses. Although their talent show was online, they still enjoyed doing it with the other participants. At the end they were organized into groups and asked to develop an idea or product useful in dealing with Covid. Arine and Alessia's group decided to challenge young persons anywhere to show they are unstoppable with video showing their skills and thus boost morale. Each group received \$200 to realize their project or donate to charity

The girls said they had learned about giving back, event planning and were now in contact with peers in many parts of Canada and the USA. They also learned the value of seizing opportunities that present themselves. Take chances. They then summarized how RYLA is organized and paid for and thanked all those making RYLA happen. They look forward to future Rotary activities.

PP Pardeep Ahluwalia thanked our speakers noting that their description of the event helped us see its value. He invited questions

Answering **Ron Doll** on case studies, Narine said that all the groups had come up with different answers to the same story and Alessia had enjoyed working with other people. To **Bob Harrison** Narine answered that she had not yet decided on a career while Alessia confirmed she was thinking of international relations. **Susan Diening** was told that participants were not only from Ontario and Quebec but also other parts of Canada. **Jen Ahde** and **PP Pardeep** suggested that the two consider student exchanges abroad. **PP Pardeep** then thanked them again

He then asked how much money had been collected by the End Polio concert. **Graeme Fraser** said it was hard to know exactly but the concert raised over \$5000.

DG Hadi then answered **Ron Doll** on the help-Beirut project, RC Cornwall Sunrise had replaced RCWO as the international partner (**Hadi** could not say why) and \$10,000 had been collected on the way to the US\$ 18,000. **Girija Dube** was impressed by today's speakers on RYLA and would enquire more about their 'show unstoppable' project.

Ron Doll was happy to be in Canada on the USA election day.

Fred Christie in Pennsylvania agreed it was "a learning experience"
