Standing in for **President Marcia Armstrong**, Past President **Jean Begin** welcomed us to the 11meeting of this 120th Rotary Year at the Nepean Sailing Club. She acknowledged that we met on the traditional lands of the Algonquin Anishinaabe. She recognized guests Shanta Raj Sharma Neupane, RC Burtibang, Nepal, Area Governor Joan Hunter with Dawn Stroka RC Ottawa, Jocelyn Burns, guest of **Mike Traub**, our speaker Heather Norris and on-line guest Deborah Scarpelli.

Bob Harrison introduced Heather Norris, President and CEO of the Ottawa Network for Education (ONFE) as an experienced leader in the Ottawa healthcare sector. She has Masters in Philanthropy from Carleton University and believes the non-profit sector makes a vital contribution to the economy of the community. She has successfully led ONFE's initiatives to support

students across Ottawa, particularly focusing on student well-being, literacy, and nutrition.

Heather started by recognizing that some cCub members were already supporting ONFE initiatives. One is the reading program., She continued that ONFE's mission is to inspire and support every child's learning journey and reaching their full potential. ONFE likes to say it fuels kids (with food programs) and "ignites learning every school day with the programs that we offer,"

- ONFE collaborates with Ottawa's school boards, public and Catholic, English and French, post secondary education, business firms, community organizations and government to offer programs that range from literacy support to career readiness. The flagship programs include:
 - Volunteers in Education: Provides one-on-one tutoring and classroom support. Last year, the program reached 8,000 students across 105 schools.
 - Ottawa Reads: Matches volunteers with kindergarten to grade three students to help develop early literacy skills.
 - Food Programs: The Breakfast Program ensures that 22,000 students receive a nutritious meal daily. Snacks and lunches are also supported as required. Government funding is receive ford some of this butg Heather highlighted the growing need for this program, particularly with rising food costs and an increasing number of immigrant and refugee families.
- Financial Literacy (JA Ottawa): ONFE teaches financial literacy and entrepreneurship to 13,000 students annually through programs like the JA Company Program, which gives students hands-on experience in running a business.
- Classroom Gardens: A fun and educational program where students grow and eat their own produce, with 100 schools participating in Ottawa.

ONFE is a charity and does fundraising events and solicit grants from business and other organizations. It tries to raise \$1 million per year.

ONFE programs need volunteers support and they do active recruiting. Heather thought that anyone who has a passion to support work with children and youth would probably find a good fit with ONFE

Heather also spoke about ONFE's role in advocating for a national school food program, which Canada is the only G7 country to currently lack. Recent efforts have led to promising steps by the federal government toward establishing such a program.

Q&A

- Means Testing for School Food Programs: Heather explained that ONFE's programs are universal, as students may need food for various reasons on any given day, and applying a means test would create unnecessary barriers. However parents who can provide meals are asked to do so as government funding must be supplemented by fundraising to provide all the food support needed
- Challenges from COVID: Volunteers could not be in schools to prepare, package and serve food so providing single-serve food items skyrocketed food costs during COVID-19, ONFE is working on transitioning back to more cost-effective models.

Bob Harrison thanked Heather saying that he had not realized how much was involved in ONFE food and education programs. He gave her a memento and told her we would donate to End Polio to mark her visit. He then called on members who read for the literacy program to stand and be recognized and invited anyone interested to call him.

Guest Shanta Raj Sharma told of his area of Nepal, which has a hunting reserve and how he had gone home there after post-doctoral research in Halifax to establish a Rotary club there. He spoke about his club's interest in partnering with the Rotary Club of West Ottawa. He highlighted the unique needs of his rural community, such as building toilets, kitchens, and science labs for schools. He emphasized the impact of small projects and expressed hope for collaboration between the two clubs on initiatives to improve local education and sanitation in Nepal.
