Opening

President Marcia Armstrong welcomed members to the 29th meeting of the 120th Rotary Year. She acknowledged we meet on unceded territory of the Algonquin Anishinaabe people

President Marcia commented on the strong grassroots patriotism being displayed by Canadians in response to recent political events.

President Marcia told us **Vijay Dube**, is a corporate member of the Club along with his wife **Girija** and daughter **Priya**. **Vijay** is a member of the **International Service and Fundraising & Events Committees.** He would now tell about his life and career.

Vijay began by reflecting on his **Ottawa upbringing**, recalling childhood hockey games on the Rideau Canal and his time at **Lisgar Collegiate Institute**. His interest in technology led him to study **Systems Design Engineering** at the **University of Waterloo**, where he specialized in **artificial intelligence and machine vision**—decades before Al became mainstream.

His early career took him to **Vancouver**, **France**, **and China**, working on **remote sensing and AI applications** for industries such as **forestry**, **agriculture**, **and geology**. Recognizing market shifts, he transitioned to **business strategy and marketing**, leading global expansion efforts for his company in **Europe and Asia**.

A defining moment in Vijay's career came when he co-founded a semiconductor distribution company in Germany, supplying technology to major telecommunications firms. While based in Stuttgart, he also facilitated technology transfers from Germany to India, an experience that led to meeting his wife, Girija.

Upon returning to Canada, Vijay pivoted into machine vision and industrial robotics, helping develop technology that could automatically detect manufacturing defects. He later joined Atsana Semiconductor, working on early cell phone camera technology. Investors initially dismissed the idea of cameras in every phone, but within two years, it became an industry standard—an anecdote highlighting how market vision often outpaces investor foresight.

Today, Vijay serves as CEO of ADS Biotech, an international leader in lab automation. His company designs instruments used in DNA extraction and cytogenetics, playing a key role in cancer diagnostics and precision medicine. He also mentors Canadian tech startups, including Boréas Technologies, a company developing haptic feedback technology for mobile devices—enabling users to feel textures on touchscreens.

Vijay's talk showcased the challenges of scaling technology businesses, and his ongoing commitment to **mentorship and business development.** He told us his son Umber lives in San Diego where he is a doctor. Daughter **Priya** is a lawyer working for the federal government.

Q&A Highlights:

- To Don Butler on Trade Wars: Vijay emphasized how geopolitical tensions are reshaping global supply chains, prompting countries like China to accelerate technological self-reliance possibly more than if China had had easy access to American technology
- Visitor Gabriel Karkaji, in mobile app development asked to contact Vijay about how he gotten into so many technologies. Vijay agreed.
- To Ron Doll Vijay gave more detail on the work of ADS Biotech which develops equipment to producens lab-grown organoids based on patient DNA to test personalized treatments for cancer etc
- **Vijay** stressed that his skill was not science but rather turning science into a business. He told **Denzel Feinberg** of a company in Montreal, working on transmitting smell over a telephone. Which could be useful in many applications.

President Marcia thanked **Vijay** for a very interesting presentation "helping us to see the future, which may be here before we know it."
