

Ruth Martin Award for Community Service

Conferred upon Kitty Galt on June 25, 2024

In 1983 the awardee recognized a desperate need for a women's shelter in Sandy Hill, and there began what is now known as Cornerstone Women's Shelter.

In the beginning it was older women who came to the shelter who had nowhere else to go.

With financial aid, and support from the church, and no salary for herself, so began Kitty Galt's journey. She rallied her friends in Sandy Hill to prepare food and deliver it to the shelter.

She then went on to help start St Joe's Supper Table on Laurier Avenue so the women had somewhere to go during the day.

Cornerstone Women's Shelter has since grown to five locations helping serve the over 1,000 women who become homeless in Ottawa each year. St Joe's is also still going strong, feeding the hungry as well as offering a weekly food bank and community garden.

After a time, it was necessary to follow her husband to Los Angeles for work. Never one to sit idle, she volunteered at a Pasadena drop in centre.

Even during the Rodney King riots in Los Angeles she continued to drive across town doing her volunteer work.

In 2011, they returned to Ottawa. She now volunteered at Center 507 before becoming staff. There were fundraisers held to enable a better life for their clients. On her own time there were trips to ball games, the Gladstone Theatre, museums and the list goes on.

Aside from all her work at Centre 507 over some 10 years, she delivered potted mums for our Thanksgiving fundraiser with Brian Waters.

She volunteered at a fundraiser in Wakefield for Suan Cross's Project Chance Africa during a very bad snow storm. Lots of others did not show up, but she did, because she believed so much in the project. Ottawa is a better community with people like Kitty Galt. Ruth Martin would be proud of her.
