<b>Chris Wanna</b> introduced our guest speaker, Kim Curran, who clarified that her talk would cover the range of range of health services provided by the Elizabeth Bruyere network in addition to palliative care. Élizabeth Bruyère (1818-1876) established a school, hospital and orphanage in the Ottawa area. Her work was instrumental in saving the lives of Irish workers constructing the Rideau Canal, following an outbreak of typhus. Today, the Bruyere network includes the St Vincent Hospital and an affordable housing and long term care complex. Bruyere partners for palliative care with Hospice Care Ottawa, but also does stroke and catastrophic injury rehabilitation and care and research into brain and memory health. During comments and questions <b>Jim Maxwell</b> noted that a friend with Alzheimer's was receiving excellent care at St Vincent. In answer to <b>Don</b> <b>Butler</b> on the hospital's success in restoring patients' memory Curran cited some positive results but noted the importance of outside factors such as diet and environment. Also to <b>Don</b> Curran said access to Bruyere services was by general practitioner or other hospital. Bruyere specialists also visit hospitals to identify potential patients. <b>Denzil Feinberg</b> told us that a client of his had been so impressed by the care he received in Manitoba for a stroke that he donated \$45,000 in mutual funds. To <b>Bill Rolph</b> inquiring whether one could isolate specific factors that contribute to improved patient condition Curran replied that holistic approaches and a healthy life style are the best treatment.
