PROGRAM

Joan Heyland introduced out guest speaker. Charles-Henri Houzé-Cerfon is a medical doctor from Toulouse France with a Rotary global grant scholarship for a year of studies at the University of Ottawa Skills and Simulation Centre from July 2017 to June 2018. Our Club was his host. Charles-Henri is responsible for the learning center at the institute of simulation in healthcare jointly run by the Toulouse University Hospital Centre and the University of Toulouse (ITSIMS) and is doctor in charge of the emergency care learning center for the regional emergency medical aid service (SAMU 31). He has been leading research in the use of simulation in the education of health professionals, and cognitive load as a factor in the performance of emergency teams. In addition, he does research on brain injury.

Dr. Houzé-Cerfon expressed his appreciation to Rotary for our support. His research program focusses on the problems caused in emergency medicine by cognitive load and addressing these problems with simulation training. He showed us a video clip and asked us to count certain actions by people in white shirts. Many of us did not see the gorilla moving among the group of people, and most of us missed the color of the background curtain changing to orange. Errors like this in evaluation of situations can lead to medical errors. There are 100,000 such errors annually equal to 165 loaded airplanes crashing. Briefing to minimize cognitive overload and well-designed simulation training of emergency medical teams can reduce the number of medical errors.

After a few questions and answers **Don Butler** thanked the speaker with the usual memento and the donation to End Polio Now.
