Program

Deviating from the usual introduction by a Club member **President Jean** invited Mr. John Ouellette of the Cancer Foundation to introduce Dr. John Bell whose work the Foundation supports.

Mr. Ouellette informed us that every two hours someone in our community is diagnosed with cancer. At his question a surprising number of us raised our hands indicating we have family members or acquaintances touched by cancer. Mr. Ouellette advised us that the incidence of cancer was rising, but so too was the survival rate. The focus of the Ottawa Regional Cancer Foundation was to put patients and their families at the centre of care and to fund local research into improving treatment. It attracts top medical professionals to our community such as Dr. Bell whom Mr. Ouellette introduced as a world-leader in the field of oncolvtic viruses which attack cancer cell and leave healthy cells unharmed. Dr. Bell is a recipient of the Order of Ottawa and many other local and national awards for his work, and has received funding from the Ottawa Regional Cancer Foundation which he and his team have been able to leverage to create a Centre of Excellence here in Ottawa. Dr. Bell explained some of the techniques that are used to treat cancers, including use of oncolytic viruses and training the body's immune system. Immunotherapy using activated T-Cell Therapy is used in the USA to attack cancer cells, but this technology is not yet available in Canada. Dr. Bell's laboratory in Ottawa currently performs the whole suite of research, discovery of treatment products their manufacture then subsequent testing, with the cycle being continually repeated as progress is made. Dr. Bell was enthusiastically thanked by the room for his impressive presentation and answered a few questions

Carol Bell-Thompson was interested in knowing the criteria used for selecting patients for treatment. Dr. Bell replied that the number is very small and only patients with three to six months to live are given the treatment. To **Peter Fisher** on what attracted him to Ottawa, Dr. Bell gave credit to his wife. Dr. Bell's journey took him from

Hamilton, to London, to Montreal and finally Ottawa, arriving here some 25 years ago. Answering **Cameron Ross** Dr. Bell said nanotechnology in treatment is coming. On finding oncolytic viruses Dr. Bell said a centre in Texas had built a large data base of potentially useful viruses To **Sarvesh Upadhyaya's** question about humankind playing God, Dr. Bell replied that we still had to strive for cures to diseases, but that we had to be careful as the potential for bioterrorism is a real threat should some products fall into the wrong hands.

Merv Letts thanked Dr. Bell and gave him our thank you gift and informed him of our \$25 donation in his name to Rotary's Polio Eradication Campaign
