PP Bob Harrison gave a comprehensive report on last Saturday's District International Service Committee meeting, more briefly summarized here: Bonnie Black spoke about the elements of completing an application form for grants and sharing your ideas.

Water Missions International's *(see Sept Rotarian)* Jay Cook, the money guy behind the organization. Great speaker; his people were in the Philippines 72 hours after typhoon Yolanda (Haiyan) hit. Our club is participating with WMI in a water project in that country.

The Ambassador for El Salvador spoke about gangs in his country and the efforts to create alternatives to gang membership; also the 'mujer' program where women can receive social help from other women.

Ariane Carrière spoke on behalf of the DG about registering for the Watertown Conference, paying in CDN \$\$ at the hotel and receiving a 10% discount. *(see District website).*
