PROGRAM: 'Sage" member Suren Gupta- Working in four countries

Gathering

Program

Before yielding the floor for **Gaye Moffett's** introduction of **Suren Gupta**, our 'Sage' speaker, **AP Graeme** told us that **Suren** had planned to retire from Rotary a number of years ago and he, **Graeme**, was proud that he had helped to persuade him to stay on.

Gaye Moffett told us that **Suren** had first joined Rotary in Montreal in 1968 and then, after trying a number of clubs, had joined West Ottawa in 2000. Then, as **Suren** was going to tell us his story, she thought it best to stop and let him do it.

Suren Gupta said that because he had had about 10 different careers, he could not cover them all when he spoke to the Club in 2012 so would finish the story now. After getting a MA degree in pol. sci., he started his career in journalism in India. Invited to an international conference in Tokyo in 1954, he went there and stayed on as a free-lance journalist. His writings resulted in a scholarship at a Quaker research centre near Philadelphia, after which he got a job with The New York Times. He resigned there to accept an offer as Advisor/Researcher at the Permanent Mission of India at the United Nations. In this role he was involved, among others, in India's participation in the resolution of the 1956 Suez Crisis following Egypt's nationalization of the Suez Canal. Canada had been instrumental in sending UN peace keepers to the Sinai as part of the resolution. **Suren** was also involved in setting up the IAEA. His work there resulted in his moving to Mumbai as Editor of Publications at India's Atomic Energy Commission. His monthly periodical, Nuclear India, received accolades from the U.S. AEC and from a Canadian nuclear publication whose editor assisted him in moving to Canada in 1966. He got a job at Bell Canada as executive speech writer, and later, as Director of Regulatory Research developing a close understanding of the USA telecoms sector. After taking an early retirement from Bell, he worked for about 10 years for NTT (Japan), first in Tokyo and later from Canada, as Senior Policy Advisor drawing

on his understanding of the USA telecoms world. He finally retired in 2003.

Responding to questions **Suren** told **Merv Letts** that he did not know the Indian general **Merv** had met while serving in Sinai with UN peace keepers. **Clive Talbot** thanked **Suren** saying he had told an "astounding story" and shown what a 'great idea' it was to have the 'Sage' member talks. **AP Graeme** thanked **Suren** again for not retiring from Rotary.
