REVIEW

Our program this week with Brett Lovins was exceptional. Introduced by Celisa Hopkins, Brett shared his personal story of addition, recovery, and his current work helping others through his business Sober Curious Consulting create Recovery Friendly Workplaces. Brett is an example of living in recovery. The word recovery was a word that at one time would have stopped him in his tracks. He wasn't interested in talking and put up a barbed wire fence to protect himself. Curiosity was not allowed in his sphere. Today it is becoming more and more common for people like him to step up and speak out and normalize conversations.

There are addictions problems in workplaces whether we are aware or not. The term Recovery Friendly Workplace is not something that he made up. It was started in 2018 in New Hampshire by the then governor, Chris Sununu. He found that the things he had done in his private workplace addressing the issue of addiction translated well to the populist. What he created is the gold standard. Many states have followed suit. Washington is one of them with the WA Recovery Alliance. Statistics show that 17% of the U.S. population has a substance use disorder (SUD). One in 10 of those individuals have a severe addiction; 70% are full-time employees. 2/3 of the population have been affected by SUD. Brett was a high-performing employee. He never set out to be an alcoholic and addict. He had his first beer at age 13. At some point, moderation didn't work, willpower didn't work, it wasn't a moral failing. It was a lot like holding your breath, you can only hold it so long before he needed alcohol or drugs. It was hard! Once he started, he couldn't stop.

His sobriety began on May 28, 2013. Twenty days sober he walked into an event with his employer Cisco in Miami. Right off the plane he gets told they are going to meet for a team dinner. There was music playing; everyone was handed shots. No one knew he was an alcoholic and addict. He didn't take the shot. For the next 8 years, he kept attending all the events. He stayed quiet. In 2018, he saw a documentary called "The Anonymous People". Much like the movie Rocky it was a call to arms to come out of the shadows. In 2020, his friend Jeff Meyer died from an overdose. At Jeff's memorial he overcame his fears and began to share his own story. In 2021, he took a class called "Dare to Lead" by Brene Brown with a message that you have to vulnerable to find your way to courage. After 8 years at Cisco, he started to make noise as a single voice in a company of 80,000 employees. The next 3 years, he began sharing his story. Cisco asked him to speak to their entire employee base. He said yes, and in 15 days, he went from knowing no one at the company in recovery to knowing 200 people. Things began to change, including

revisions to their bylaws and the creation of webinars and blogs. They hosted their first sober happy hour at a sales conference – it was the first event that sold out.

Growing up, his grandfather constantly asked him "if he was going to do his best." Today he is trying to do his best through his work helping other organizations and companies by sharing the benefits of reaching out to their employees. Recovery is possible. He was authentic, impactful, with a heartfelt message appreciated by us with a standing ovation.

What else happened? Our greeters this week were Ryan Smith and Elisabeth Tutsch. Selling Super Bowl board squares were Dana Dwinell and Sara Watkins. Rick Pinnell shared a recent story he'd read about a group of parents bragging about the colleges their children had chosen and one set of parents who reluctantly shared their son had signed up for the Marines, the silence that followed, and their newfound sense of pride after attending his basic training graduation. He asked to thank our service men, women, and veterans, and to remember our historical freedoms come from the military, not our politicians. President Jim shared that we raised nearly \$4,000 for California fire relief and recognized two of our members: Paul Trotter for his one-year Rotary anniversary and Rodrigo Renteria-Valencia for his new title as the new Dean of Graduate Education, Research & Strategic Initiatives at CWU.

Mike Norton introduced our first new member of 2025, Paul Needham. Paul was born and raised in Yakima and graduated from Eisenhower High School where he enjoyed running crosscountry and wrestling. As a teenager he loved to spend time working on projects alongside his dad; one of those was building the Meadowbrook Family Fun Center. He attended YVC for one year before transferring to WSU. After three years of college and having no idea of what he wanted to do, he enlisted in the U.S. Marines. After graduating from WSU, he managed lumberyards in Oregon and Washington before coming back to Yakima to open "Play it Again Sports" with his dad. He met his wife Shannon on a coed soccer team that the store sponsored; they are parents to 2 boys. Today they are the owners of Yakima Canine Club on 2nd Avenue offering boarding services, training and grooming services. When not working they enjoy RV traveling visiting National Parks and their boys at college. We are so happy to have him as part of our Rotary Club! Steven Gustafson finished up Rotary business with a TV commercial themed sergeant-at-arms.



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
