HON. RICHARD BARTHELD YAKIMA COUNTY SUPERIOR COURT PRESIDING JUDGE



Richard H. Bartheld serves as the presiding judge for the Yakima County Superior Court. He was appointed to the court in January 2012 by Governor Chris Gregoire, who selected him to replace the retiring Judge James Lust. Judge Bartheld graduated from the University of Washington with a bachelor's degree. He earned his J.D. from Gonzaga Law School in 1980. Judge Bartheld began his legal career when he opened his own practice in 1980 and worked in private practice for over 30 years. He was a senior partner at Bartheld & Schwartz in Yakima when he was appointed to the Yakima County Superior Court. He has also served as a judge pro tem on the family law docket and the domestic violence and motion dockets.

Since serving on the bench, Judge Bartheld has been instrumental in developing and refining the court's innovative and comprehensive pre-trial release program and has led the court to maintain public access while protecting public safety through the COVID epidemic.
