ANN SIMONS WASHINGTON STATE WOMEN'S COMMISSION



On March 15, 2018, House Bill 2759 was signed into law by Governor Jay Inslee, establishing the Washington State Women's Commission. The bill along with the companion Senate Bill 6583 passed with bipartisan support. The legislature found that women face unique problems and needs. For economic, social, and historical reasons, a disproportionate number of women find themselves disadvantaged or isolated from the benefits of equal opportunity.

Ann Simon's enduring passion is women's justice. She started her career as a lobbyist for Washington Women United, which was a statewide umbrella women's organization

representing women's voices throughout the state. She founded a new women's health advocacy organization called the Sun Mountain Women's Health Alliance and published "The Health of Washington Women" and recently completed her Master's in International Service from American University. After 25 years of advocating for the re-establishment of a Women's Commission she succeeded in making the Commission a reality.

Addressing women's issues and improving the well-being of women has a positive impact on larger societal issues. The development of public policy and the efficient delivery of governmental services to meet the needs of women is improved by the Women's Commission.

ACADEMIC AND VOCATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP DEADLINES

The deadlines for the Academic and Vocational Scholarship applications are fast approaching. The deadline for the Academic Scholarship is Friday, May 10th. The deadline for the Vocational Scholarship is Thursday, March 16th.

The Academic Scholarship Committee will be awarding nineteen scholarships in the amount of \$2,500 each. Applications are being accepted from graduating high school students attending Davis, East Valley, Eisenhower, Highland, LaSalle, Naches Valley, Riverside Christian, Selah, and West Valley high schools, along with homeschooled and Running Start students within those districts.

The Vocational Scholarship Committee has a total of \$37,500 to divide up among their recipients. Recipients must be enrolled or planning to enroll at a post-high school vocational institution or a 2-year terminal vocational

program at a community college within one year of the scholarship award and at a minimum through the fall quarter of the award year. The same students above are eligible to apply along with non-traditional students who are currently attending or will be attending Perry Technical Institute, Heritage University, and Yakima Valley College and qualify based upon the criteria.
