



Rotarian-owned gym takes in wildfire evacuees

When a Rotarian-owned fitness center housed evacuees and firefighters during the blazes in and around Paradise, California, USA, the overwhelmed local government was able to provide cots but not much else.

Members of the Rotary clubs of **CHICO** and **CHICO SUNRISE** stepped in to address basic needs, donating hundreds of blankets and pillows, cases of water and days worth of food.

"When the stuff hits the fan, there is nothing that Rotary can't do," said Tony DeLuca, a member of the Chico Sunrise club and owner of Fit One Athletic Club in Chico, about 15 minutes from Paradise. "Anyone in the country who would question that, come out here and see. What we did was impossible."

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The facility took in about 250 evacuees after other emergency shelters had reached capacity during the first wave of the fires. More than a few ended up losing their homes to the flames. A Rotarian who had lost his own house in a fire a few years earlier went to every store in town to buy enough blankets and pillows for everybody staying at the

athletic center, and Rotary club members throughout the area showed up with cases of water and nonperishable food.

After the evacuation, blankets, pillows and food were donated to the local homeless shelter. But less than a

week later, the winds picked up and fanned the flames again, and the facility was used as a rest spot for firefighters coming in from all over the country to battle the flames.

In Memoriam

A tribute to Dr. Linda McKay

September 13, 1940-July 20, 2008

Thank you asking me to talk about Linda's time as a Rotarian. Linda joined Rotary in 1990 and transferred to the RC of Windsor-St. Clair five years later. For 18 years she cared about the local and global work of Rotary and thoroughly enjoyed its social aspects.

Coming to weekly meetings does not make one a good member of Rotary International. What does is participation in local and international projects, and committee work. Linda was actively involved in many committees over the years, especially Vocational Service which oversees our club's scholarships, business ethics and vocational excellence and she chaired that committee in 2000 and 2001. Under her guidance in 2000, our club, along with the other two Rotary Clubs in Windsor, partnered with the Chamber of Commerce and created the Athena Scholarships and we continue to fund scholarships for three young women to assist them to become leaders in the community and business. Equality and leadership by women was a cause that was extremely important to Linda. Within our club the growing involvement of women in leadership positions gave her great satisfaction.

Linda served on our Board of Directors for four years and as President from July 2005 to June 2006, a normal one year term. Initially she wanted to serve as president after she retired from the Faculty of Education but typical of Linda there was a need so she stepped forward to serve as President during her last year as a professor. It was during that year that she started to experience severe pain that was finally diagnosed as bone cancer. In her many positions on committees or leading our club she showed a quiet grace, confidence, determination, respect for others, good humour and firmly held views. She was always a lady and always respected by others and if that is her legacy I believe that would make her happy. Linda was a very private person and did not often share her feelings but willingly she shared her talents to serve this community and the world. Her contribution to the good work of Rotary was shown by her service. She helped select international Rotary scholars. She attended many annual Rotary District Conferences in Michigan, Ohio and Ontario. She attended International Conventions in Japan and Chicago to experience the good news of helping others. She went to Nicaragua to help



the "Children of the Dump" break their cycle of poverty. She was instrumental in getting our club to undertake projects in Vietnam and India. She is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow and as such contributed significant money to the Rotary Foundation to fund Third World projects involving education, clean water and health. She made the world a little bit better.

We will miss you Past President Linda. Thanks for sharing part of your life with us and making our Rotary club better.

Alan gave his \$25, together with other donations from his colleagues to help cover the expenses for the excursion.

Dinner raises big bucks for African projects

The July fundraising dinner featuring Cardinal Peter Turkson, Archbishop of Cape Coast [Ghana] was a tremendous financial success for both the Society of St. Vincent de Paul and the Rotary Club of Windsor St. Clair.

A total of **\$18,787.79** was collected from various sources—including ticket sales, donations and miscellaneous contributions. After subtracting the expense of planning and holding the

event—both organizations were left with cheques totaling **\$7,535.96**.

Monies raised at the South Windsor Arena event will go to R.E.L.A.Y. and St. Vincent de Paul projects in Africa.

Consensus amongst the organizers of the joint fund raising initiative is positive and both organizations believe other joint projects should be explored in the future.
