Over \$50,000 raised at 22nd. Annual Rotary TV auction

When the bidding concluded at the 2008 Rotary Auction on TV COGECO and when the telephones were finally silent and all of the volunteers had gone home - \$50,145 had been raised by the Rotary Club of Windsor-St. Clair and the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Ontario [Windsor-Essex County Chapter] for important service work in our community.

Thanks to the many volunteers who made the event successful. They earned a much deserved rest last Sunday, following two hectic evenings of the televised auction.

"Many hours of planning and preparation go into the auction," says Paul Charbonneau, chair of the 2008 organizing

committee. "Without the generosity of local business donating the gifts, we wouldn't have an auction. I would like to thank them all for their community-minded spirit. This year we received 377 items. The close to 50 volunteers, both Rotarians and others, who staffed the telephones and worked behind the scenes, deserve to be congratulated for a fine job. And the Windsor and Essex County community deserves a pat on the back for coming through for us in these difficult economic times. The Windsor Star was instrumental in promoting the auction and also deserves a vote of thanks."

The Heart and Stroke Foundation uses the monies raised to fund research, health promotion, and community improvement projects while the Rotary Club of Windsor-St. Clair also uses the money raised to benefit the community, and beyond. In the past, monies raised at the auction have benefited projects like the Ganatchio Trail, Shanfield Shores, and the Rotary boundary-free playground in the Town of Tecumseh.

This was the 22nd year that the Rotary Club of Windsor-St. Clair has partnered with TV Cogeco to present a television auction and plans will soon be underway for the event next year. "The staff at Cogeco does a fabulous job for us," says Charbonneau. "and as soon as we close the books on 2008, planning will begin for next year."

It's never too early to start thinking about next year, especially regarding the positions of Auction Chair and Gift Chair. The 2008 WE CARE...WE CAN Campaign aids local food banks

The **WE CARE...WE CAN** food drive is back and plans call for it to be more successful than last year. The campaign is a partnership between Mayflower/ Rose City Moving Company, the Greater Essex County District School Board, the Windsor Spitfires, the 10 Essex County Rotary Clubs and of course - the Windsor and Essex County Food Bank Association.

Last year, the food drive collected over 250,000 lbs. of food valued at more than \$1.2 million. This year demand at area food banks has risen by 20 percent which places added importance on the 2008 drive. Volunteers picking up the food items report they had more than 18,000 cans at the kick-off at LaSalle P.S.

An added bonus this year is the support of the Windsor Spitfires organization and the new WFCU Centre. The organization has proclaimed Tuesday, December 16 as **FOOD DRIVE NIGHT**. The game starts at 7 p.m., and all fans are encouraged to bring a non-perishable item for the campaign.

YOUTH SERVICE

- ▶ RYLA 3 students sponsored by Windsor- St Clair after obtaining board approval, a fourth student was also selected by this committee and was sponsored by the Essex club. The group will make a presentation to the club at a time to be determined.

INTERNATIONAL

- ▶ Matching Grant Update we have 3 quotes for desks and chairs for the classrooms at Mumboha Primary School. The guotes range from 4000 Kenyan shillings to 5000 Kenyan shillings (about \$50 -\$60 US) per desk. We have been provided with photos of the desk samples and we have selected a contractor. We hope to have the project completed within a couple of months.
- ▶ Mosquito Nets We have been approached by a former Ambassadorial Scholar, Brad Jensen. Who purchased 500 military grade

- mosquito nets. He has offered them to us to bring to Tanzania. We contacted a customs broker and will be sending the nets by air freight. We will also purchase approximately 500 nets in Tanzania to distribute to children in the Moshi area.
- Inner Wheel of Cozumel The traditional contribution of \$3000 to the Inner Wheel of Cozumel was approved. If no member is travelling to Mexico we will be wire the money to David LaBranche to present.
- ▶ Defibrillators to Namibia Local fire and rescue staff, including Dan LeMay. have put together a package of lifesaving equipment including 10 refurbished defibrillators to send to the Tsumeb Fire Department. We approved their request for financial assistance to help with the shipping costs.

- ▶ The Board has adopted the 2008-

Alan decided to donate his Pay It Forward money to the Salvation Army, but he also asked his co-workers to help. He challenged them to donate their 'coffee money' to the cause on a certain day, and in return. Alan served coffee to them.

NOVEMBER 27/LEA-ANN SUZOR

Lea-Ann knows of a single mom of 3 young children who is really struggling. Two of her children, ages 3 and 5, are autistic, so she faces many challenges. She doesn't have a car and is having difficulty coping emotionally and financially. Lea-Ann added some funds to the Pay It Forward money and gave the woman a card containing \$100. She told the mom that the money was for her to do something special for herself, such as going out for lunch or getting her hair done.

We are also giving to our global community through our international projects this holiday season. We have agreed to assist with the shipment of life-saving defibrillators and Jaws of Life equipment to Tsumeb, Namibia. We also continue to support the Inner Wheel of Cozumel. Our donation helps provide food and medication to hundreds of seniors in that area.

Our biggest project this season is the malaria project in Tanzania. Through the donation of 500 mosquito nets from a former Ambassadorial Scholar, the funds raised at the Past President's party, funds from the International Service Committee, an anonymous donation of \$1000, and a World Community Service grant, we expect to deliver close to 1500 mosquito nets to children in Tanzania.

The nets will be hand-delivered by Nick, Jennifer, Mike and I in December when we're in Tanzania. You can help support this event by purchasing "Gift Donation Cards" to give as gifts at Christmas.
