Gates Foundation donates US\$255 to help eradicate polio

In a letter posted on the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's Web site last week, Bill Gates praises Rotary International's work for over two decades in fighting to eradicate polio and discusses the progress being made on ending the disease.

Gates cites the vital work of the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and Rotary International in the global effort to make polio the second disease to be eradicated, after smallpox. In referring to Rotary, the letter states that "we wouldn't be anywhere on this without their efforts."

The letter, the first in what is planned to be an annual exercise, outlines the goals of the Gates Foundation and the progress being made on those goals. Even though the foundation's assets fell by 20 percent last year, Gates says it will increase its giving to US\$3.8 billion in 2009, about 7 percent of its assets.

Rotary will raise \$100 million in matching funds

Last week during the 2009 International Assembly, Gates announced a new US\$255 million challenge grant to Rotary in the global effort to eradicate polio. In response to the new grant, Rotary will raise \$100 million in matching funds. In November 2007, RI received a \$100 million Gates Foundation grant, which Rotary

committed to match by raising \$100 million.

The two Gates Foundation grants total \$355 million. Rotary International's matching effort in response is called Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, which must be completed by 30 June 2012.

"Rotary International and other donors are doing a great job so far coming up with the extra resources that are needed (for polio eradication)," Gates states in the letter. "Just this month I went to a Rotary meeting and helped announce more than \$600 million in new money from various sources that will go toward eradicating polio."

A Message from the President

The power of Rotary in effect in Tanzania

I was struck again by the power of Rotary as I held a small boy in my arms in an orphanage in Tanzania. To know that we could save the life of this boy and many others with the donation of a \$3 mosquito net is very powerful. Malaria is still a major problem in many African countries. In Tanzania alone, the number of people that die has been compared to a jumbo jet full of women and children crashing into a mountainside every day.

Being Rotarians through and through, as we began to plan our trip to climb Mount Kilimanjaro, we decided that we should also do a project in Tanzania to benefit a community near the base of the mountain. After learning about the number of people that still die or become very ill from malaria, we knew that a mosquito net project was what we wanted to do. We were able to raise over \$8,000 to support the purchase of nets in Tanzania and the shipping of 500 nets that had been donated by a former Ambassadorial Scholar from Plymouth. The funds came from a variety of sources including the Past President's party, our International Service Committee, a District Simplified Grant, a World Community Service grant (awarded to Windsor-Roseland) and the sale of gift cards at Christmas. We were also very fortunate to get in touch with Rotarian Faye Cran (or Mama Kuku) from Tanzania. Faye is the Malaria Chair for her District in Eastern Africa, and she was instrumental in assisting with our shipment of nets, purchasing nets in Tanzania, and making arrangements for us to deliver the nets.

Jennifer, Nick, Mike and I met with Faye and another Rotarian on January 4 to deliver over 1000 mosquito nets. Our first stop was Upendo Orphanage, where over 60 young children are cared for by a group of Catholic nuns. Although the children seemed to be well cared for, they did not have

mosquito nets to help prevent them from getting malaria. Next, we went to Old Moshi Secondary School, a boarding school with over 800 students. The headmaster of the school explained to us that almost three quarters of the students could not afford to buy mosquito nets, and that many students' education is disrupted because they are hospitalized with malaria. He believes that the 500 nets we donated to the school will have a significant impact on the health and education of the students.

Our final stop was a very poor community outside of Moshi. When we arrived, we were greeted by over 100 women dressed in their Sunday best, singing and cheering. Almost 500 nets were distributed to the women so that their children and family members could be protected from mosquitoes and not have to suffer or die from malaria.

It was overwhelming to me to realize

that a simple net, worth \$3 to \$8 could save a person's life and prevent so much suffering. It is such a small cost and the nets are so readily available that it seems almost criminal that people still die everyday from such a preventable disease. I feel very blessed to have the opportunity to hand deliver mosquito nets and meet the people whose lives we were helping to improve. I also feel very proud once again to be a Windsor-St. Clair Rotarian, as our Club continues do demonstrate a strong commitment to helping those in need, both locally and internationally.
