Volunteers put a lid on the food drive *can* paign

The old adage, 'when the going gets tough, the tough get going' capsulates the 2008 WE CARE...WE CAN Food Drive, a partnership between local rotary clubs, The Greater Essex County DSB, the Windsor Spitfires Junior Hockey club, local food bank associations and Mayflower/Rose City Moving Company.

"Windsor and Essex County are going through some pretty tough economic times...the need this year for food banks has increased by 20 percent over last years numbers. Folks that gave food last year are coming to the banks this year as users...an ironic twist of fate for sure," said Windsor St. Clair Rotarian Arnie Charlton, the primary organizer and driving force behind the success of the food drive.

Last year, the food drive collected over 250,000 pounds of non-perishable food and this year the total jumped to over 280,000 pounds - which equates to approximately 320,200 cans. Volunteers estimates they visited 51 different locations and delivered the

donated cans to one central food bank location.

Area Rotary Club's collected different types of food. A club with a morning meeting collected cold and hot cereals, clubs meeting at lunchtime collected proteins such as tuna and salmon and clubs meeting in the evening collected peanut butter and pasta. This year there was a far greater diversity of donated foods with an emphasis on healthier foods, said Charlton. Additionally, many Rotarian's dedicated a great deal of time at the main food bank sorting and stacking all the foods being delivered.

Spitfire fans donate

On December 16, the Windsor Spitfires hosted the WE CARE...WE CAN Food Drive at the new Windsor Family Credit Union Centre. Mayflower trucks were parked at the front entrances and collected over 3,700 cans of non-perishables. The Spitfire Organization deserves thanks for giving game tickets to all the volunteers working the event.

The success of the whole project hinged on the participation of area

schools. They were asked to participate in the food drive as a component of the school board character development program which teaches the value of sharing and caring. Many of the participating schools were located in areas affected by the economic downturn but they still proved to be generous with their donations. Many schools rewarded students with pizza parties for the classes that donated the most food.

"I would declare that our food drive campaign was a total success from every possible perspective. You get a wonderful feeling when you realize just how many people you've assisted in these tough times. Someone mentioned to me that they were only one pay cheque away from having to use the food bank themselves..... that comment really hit home with me. We should all be very thankful for what we have," said Charlton.

Kudos to Arnie Charlton and his volunteers for their tireless work and commitment to the project. Well done all!

Rotarians serving up holiday cheer at the North Pole

About 150 gravely ill children and their families embarked on a special "flight" to the North Pole on 13 December. aboard a Boeing 777 out of Dulles International Airport in Washington, D.C..

For the second year in a row, members of the Rotary Club of Herndon, Virginia, USA, were there to see them off and help the children

make holiday crafts as they prepared to meet Santa and Mrs. Claus.

"It's magical for the kids." says Steve Cohen, a member of the Herndon club and one of many United Airlines employees who volunteer for the annual Fantasy Flight. "Everyone forgets what's happening in their lives, and for a couple of hours, including for the parents, it's a winter wonderland."

Since 1990, United Airlines has partnered with Children's Hospice International to bring the joy of the holidays to children battling terminal illnesses. The children, selected from hospitals and hospices in the region. were shuttled from the main terminal to Gate D7, where they and a few family members boarded United Flight 9908. The plane headed onto the runway and the pilot throttled up,

simulating a takeoff.

The pilot then threw the engines into reverse before taxiing back to Gate D29, decorated as the North Pole. Cartoon characters, musicians, face painters, and other entertainers joined Santa and Mrs. Claus, who distributed gifts selected from the kids' wish lists.

Cohen, a flight attendant, has taken part in the Fantasy Flight for five years. When organizers faced a shortage of volunteers last year, Cohen suggested members of his Rotary club could help. Cohen hopes to encourage clubs in other cities where United has a hub to get involved in the program. Other Fantasy Flights were planned this year in Denver, Colorado; Phoenix, Arizona; Chicago; and Los Angeles.

Program highlights advantages of hiring disabled

ROTARY AT WORK is a new, exciting and different project where Rotarians, partnered with Community Living Ontario, create employment opportunities for individuals with disabilities.

The goal is to find over 100 job opportunities, provincially, for people who have a disability within the next three years. Community Living Ontario staff are available to work with Rotary Clubs and potential employers to meet this goal.

Rotary Clubs are encouraging members and their business communities to actively create employment opportunities and to consider filling vacancies with people who have a disability. It is then Community Living Ontario's role to connect employers to local employment agencies if needed.

These agencies can help employers with:

- Locating potential candidates who have a disability;
- Prescreening these candidates;
- Providing on-the-job training;

- Assistance with workplace accommodations;
- Information about government assistance and other resources that will help make recruitment and retention smooth and easy.

Rotary Clubs recognize the benefits of hiring people who have a disability. Tapping into this labour pool is good business.

Studies and employer surveys show that employees who have a disability:

- Demonstrate average or above average work performance;
- Are willing and able to work at many different types of jobs;
- Have a proven positive affect on staff morale.

People who have a disability can make a valuable contribution to your business:

- ✓ A Harris study found that 88% of workers who have a disability earned performance ratings of good or excellent;
- ✓ A DuPont survey reported average or above average performance for 90% of workers who have a disability;
- ✓ The Harris study also showed that 46% of employers found workers who have a disability actually work harder than other employees;
- ✓ A Pizza Hut Corporation study showed that workers who have a disability are 5 times more likely to stay on the job;
- ✓ The DuPont survey showed that 86% of workers who have a disability have average or above average attendance records;
- ✓ The DuPont survey showed that 97% of workers who have a disability rate average or above average in safety on the job;
- ✓ A Statscan report showed that only 4% of workers who have a disability require changes to the physical workplace.
