RI President John Kenny has set the theme for 2009-2010 -*The Future of Rotary is in your hands*. The Future of Rotary is, in fact, in our hands. Our community needs Rotary more than ever, our community needs what we do as Rotarians more than ever - and this at a time when being a Rotarian is tougher than ever. Work is harder, family life is busier, fundraising is more difficult and demands on our time are greater then ever. President Kenny tells us that everything we Rotarians aspire to is in the hands of Rotarians in their Clubs, not in the hands of the President, the DG, the RI Director or the club president - the key to success is in the hands of the 27,000 Rotarians in Canada and three million throughout the world.

What does this mean for the Rotary Club of Windsor St. Clair? We possess all the elements of a successful club. As Rotarians, we tend to be a modest group, but putting modesty aside, I want to tell you that we are a great club! We have consistently been recognized as one of the top clubs in District 6400, which is one of the top districts in Rotary, all of this because of you and all the work you do.

In preparing for this year, I listed all the things we do as a club. It was a long list! We do much good work and I believe we have stretched our member resources thin in meeting our goals. In typical Rotarian style we pull together and get the job done. Another enlightening moment was reviewing who does what, when looking for a few names to approach for special projects. My fellow Rotarians, there wasn't much capacity on that list. In order to send people to Africa, complete community projects, read stories, serve soup, clean up a trail, serve beer and hot dogs, work bingos, ring bells, participate in a food drive, host an exchange student, award scholarships, host a golf tournament, raise money to eradicate polio and solicit gifts for a successful TV auction - we need more hands. **We need to grow membership.**

With this in mind, I want to share with you a theme I intend to weave into our activities this year. If executed properly, it will add to our membership. I have distributed small tokens of my appreciation for your dedication to Rotary. One is a simple Rotary Wheel Sticker and the other is a rotary coin with the 4 way test on one side and the Wheel on the other. This will be the central focus of my *Everyday Rotarian* theme. Rotary needs you all now, more than ever. Everyday Rotarians, members like you and I who through our actions, do the many small things which in the end, add up to big things. With these gifts I am asking every member to do two things: display the sticker in a space which is identified as yours your car, office, bike, your briefcase - and use the visability to tell everyone you are an Everyday Rotarian and most importantly let them know what Rotary means to you and what you do as an *Everyday Rotarian*. You are an *Everyday* Rotarian not a secret Rotarian; and then I want you to decide if they would be a good set of hands for our club. If so, show them the coin, talk about the 4 way test, give them the coin to keep (I'll get you another one) and ask them to come to a meeting. It's that simple - it all starts with an ask.

I am asking every member to bring one guest to a club meeting, function or activity to share what we do as Rotarians and show how much fun we have together. You have my commitment that once you introduce a prospective member to us, we as a club and a Board, will help you usher that person to membership through a defined communication plan. And equally as important, once a member we will support you as their sponsor in introducing them to Rotary through our new member education program. Membership recruitment is a club responsibility and having a program to develop *Everyday Rotarians* is a club responsibility.

In order to secure the future of our club we need more *Everyday Rotarians* and it all starts with an ask.

Finally on a lighter note, I would like to introduce a dose of weekly fun into our activities. For such a group of accomplished professionals, we are horrible at self promotion. We need to let people know about Rotary. With this in mind, this year we will launch the **ROTASMILE** program. Each week a member will be given \$20 to be used to put a Rotary Smile on a face, or faces, in the community. Be it buying a coffee for strangers, ice cream for kids, flowers for seniors, treats for volunteers, what ever you think of you can do. Together with the money, you will receive a few business cards which you will leave with the **ROTASMILE** activity. These cards will include our club name, together with contact information for the recipient to find out more about us. There will be a link to our website and a brief explanation of Rotary.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to all to my fellow Rotarians. I look forward to serving you this year and working with you to develop *Everyday Rotarians* to ensure our future.

Birmingham (UK) embraces historic Rotary International convention

After four days of celebrating Rotary's spirit of international fellowship and service, Rotarians from all over the world bid adieu to the 100th RI Convention in Birmingham, England, on 24 June.

RI President-elect John Kenny, the first Scotsman to head the international humanitarian service organization in its 104-year history, encouraged the more than 16,000 Rotarians from over 150 countries at the convention to join in the last push to eradicate polio. "Until the day the earth is declared polio-free, this work must be our first priority and our main focus," Kenny said during the closing plenary session. "It is up to us to finish the job."

"The future of Rotary is being decided every day, in every one of our clubs -by every one of you," Kenny said. "Every Rotarian adds fresh ideas and energies to their clubs and their districts. Each one of you can make important contributions and pass on to your successors stronger clubs, healthier communities, and a better world."

Kenny, emphasized the important role that individual Rotarians and Rotary

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE
