



Rotary TV Auction begins in POWERFUL style



Planning is well underway for the 24th annual Rotary Auction on TV COGECO which is scheduled for November 12 and 13, 2010. Before the telephones begin ringing and volunteers start taking bids - the 2010 campaign has already succeeded in attracting a Major Sponsor - International Power Canada. As a major sponsor, they have pledged \$10,000 to the 2010 auction campaign.

International Power Canada is responsible for the Harrow Wind Projects in the Town of Essex which consists of 24 wind turbines which began generating power in June 2010. When fully operational, the turbines will generate enough energy to serve close to 12,000 Ontario homes annually. Additionally, IPC is currently building the 48.6 MW Pointe-Aux-Roches Wind Farm in Lakeshore and has numerous other projects in various stages of development in Essex County.

International Power Canada, formerly AIM PowerGen Corporation, was acquired by International Power plc in October 2009. International Power plc is a leading independent electricity generating company with interests in over 21 countries.

"International Power Canada has really demonstrated a community-minded spirit in supporting TV Auction," says Windsor St. Clair Rotary Club President Phyllis Charbonneau. "The company, through its local representatives, recognize the importance of the work we do and the work we want to continue to do. This sponsorship gives

The Heart and Stroke Foundation uses the monies raised to fund research, health promotion, and community improvement projects.

The Rotary Club of Windsor-St. Clair also uses the money raised to fund club projects like the Ganatchio Trail, Shanfield Shores, and the Rotary boundary-free playground in the Town of Tecumseh. Monies raised also assist many families on an individual basis, fund a student bursary program, and aid in Rotary projects worldwide to eradicate polio.

Following that, they should proceed to the ESL Classroom of Mrs. Kaur, which can be found on the second floor

On arrival in the classroom, Mrs. Kaur will select a student, who will then go with you to the library, where they will read to you. The job of the volunteer is to assist when needed and ask questions when time permits.

A reading session should last between 12 to 15 minutes, so each Tuesday there will be an opportunity for two students to display their reading talents.

MEMBERSHIP

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

- ▶ The project in Agios Germanos in northern Greece is complete. Feedback from the project manager is that the project was well received and appreciated by the school children. The funds for our club contribution will be forwarded to the project manager in Greece in the near future.
- ▶ The committee voted to contribute \$500 to the Inner Wheel Club of Cozumel in support of their feed the elderly program.
- ▶ The committee voted to contribute up to \$500 to the ShelterBox

disaster relief effort for Pakistan. In addition a request would be made to all club members to provide additional support on their own personal behalf for this project. In the event more than \$500 is raised through private member donations then the committee's contribution would be reduced accordingly in order that the total sum raised through individual donations and committee support would be \$1,000 and allow for the purchase of one entire Shelter Box from the Club.

YOUTH SERVICE

- ▶ The committee has decided to recognize Frank Chauvin with the club Literacy Service Award for his work in Haiti and to present him with a cheque for \$250 to assist with his orphanage. Youth committee can support \$250 at the present budget. Presentation arrangements will be made.
- ▶ The committee received a request for funding from the Character Development Symposium at the GECDSB in partnership with Hiatus House. Motion passed to donate \$250 toward the project.
