TODAY'S PROGRAM

Major Patrick Linford, U.S. Army – Job Opportunities in the U.S. Army

Major Linford, a 2007 West Point graduate, began his career as an engineer officer in the operational branch of the Army. His job was to support military operations around the world by "pushing dirt" (i.e., building roads and making sure there was proper drainage. An example of this, when deployed to Afghanistan in 2010, was to take a small base that housed 100 and turn it into one that could house 2,000 in just three months. His second deployment in 2014 required him to maintain 108 bridges.

At this point, Major Linford pivoted to the institutional side of the Army. He obtained a master's in

mechanical engineering and taught at West Point. The Army likes to have teachers with 7-10 years of experience to mentor the

students and give them an idea as to what to expect.

His next stop brought him here, working at the Detroit Arsenal in Warren. His duties there included the wholesale overhaul of military vehicles with the armored multipurpose vehicle (AMPV). The first overhaul since the 1970s. While his family remained in the Detroit area, he also had a brief stint working in marketing for the Army out of Chicago.

Major Linford has been in Grosse Pointe for three years as he pursues a PhD in mechanical engineering at U of M. After obtaining his degree, he will return to teaching at West Point.

The two things that Major Linford stressed about the Army are: (1) its willingness to invest in its people, as his degrees show/will show; and (2) a military career can be as focused or as broad as you want it to be.
