TODAY'S PROGRAM

Dr. Steve Kahn, PhD – Math Corps.

Dr. Kahn has been a professor at Wayne State for 40 years and, during that time, has volunteered to help the youth of Detroit. It started with the Urban League, continued on as a volunteer math teacher for troubled teen boys, and eventually led to the formation of Math Corps in 1992.

The mission of the Math Corps is to empower and inspire children from under-served communities – through the teaching of mathematics and the fostering of self-worth, strong values and a sense of family – to build good lives for themselves and a more just society for all. The six-week summer camp is its centerpiece and serves students in grades 7-12. During camp, these students come together with college students and mathematicians in a university setting to share in the learning of mathematics. Students learn from older students who serve as role models, and they teach younger students who look up to them in the same way. Most importantly, the Math Corps offers students a vision of the world that begins with the message of "Be Yourself" – as there is greatness within! It builds a sense of family and community based on the values of kindness and integrity.

Dr. Kahn's talk primarily focused on the incredible (and terrifying) obstacles that many of the Math Corp students must overcome. The program's focus is less on math and more on kindness and acceptance, with the students supporting each other.

Math Corp is able to boast that 95% of its students graduate high school and 90% go on to attend college. This past summer, over 400 students participated on the WSU campus and the program has expanded to 8 other cities around the country. www.mathcorps.org
