Abundance mentality or scarcity thinking?

T's an election year in the United States and almost everyone is giving at least a little attention to the political system.

The movie "All the President's Men," had a very famous dialog motif. It was: "Follow the money."

No matter what your relationship to money, that green stuff makes the world go around. Money is certainly important to economic and community development – our calendar theme for October.

A while back, I posted a message on our District Facebook page at https://www.facebook.com/groups/rotarydistrict6380, suggesting that Rotary is primarily a fund-raising organization. A surprising number of people disagreed. Some said our organization is mostly about friendship. Some said we are more about service.

Yet, without money we can't hold media-worthy events. Without fundraising, we can't do high-profile service work. Without funding, we can't produce quality marketing campaigns.

Service work requires supplies and vendors. Those vendors need to be paid. Large-scale service work requires infrastructure and incurs administrative costs.

This year, we're celebrating the 100th anniversary of The Rotary Foundation (TRF). District 6380 is having a Foundation Gala on November 5 and a Million Dollar Dinner on April 1. Register for both events in the calendar view at www.Rotary6380.org.

The Rotary Foundation is a lean machine, with a very small amount of money going toward administrative costs. We received a score of 97 from Charity Navigator last year. This year, America's largest charity evaluator upgraded Rotary to a perfect score of 100.

One of the best ways to encourage economic and community development is the coupling of vocation and philanthropy. This is essentially the confluence of business and Rotary. Indeed, smart leaders at Rotary International have arranged for vocational service to be one of our five avenues of service.

One of my favorite questions to ask Rotarians during governor visits is, "What do you do for a living?" Sometimes I ask, "What job are you retired from?"

The answer to this type of question often indicates a person's special talent – a skill that is almost always useful to Rotary.

Rotarians are known for using our professional skills to make things happen through service.

And let's face it, before making things happen in a larger community, we need to be sure that our clubs have strong infrastructure, solid leadership succession, and an ongoing membership plan.

Author Stephen Covey wrote about a choice that all of us make every day – the decision between having an "abundance mentality" or "scarcity thinking."

Ask your club president to make sure your club goals are entered in My Rotary at

<u>https://www.rotary.org/myrotary/en</u> and to make sure that those numbers reflect an abundance mentality.

With Rotary, all things are possible.

The sessions are open to all Rotarians no matter how experienced you are.


RYLA is Back!

The Short Term Youth Exchange Program or STEP program officially opened September 1 and will run through March 1, 2017.

The Youth Exchange Scholarship provides a long-term student with approximately \$24,000 worth of schooling, room and board, stipend, and local travel support as well as Our Rotary International organization that provides student support from beginning to end.

Referencing the OB Application Process will provide the steps required in leading a student candidate through the application forms necessary to meet minimum acceptance qualifications.

Joyce Joyce Honored in Dominican Republic 2016

oyce Joyce (Sterling
Heights Rotary) received
approval in the spring of
2015 to go ahead with a
Rotary International Global
Grant for Clean Water Clean
Hands Project in the
Dominican Republic. The
project started with plans
and fund-raising efforts in
July 2013.

By early spring 2016, Rotary friends in the Dominican Republic who were overjoyed and very grateful for our support had made great progress in installing BioSand clean water filters. This project was the largest project undertaken yet with the Club Rotario Bonao and is of benefit to the most people compared to previous projects with that club.

In May 2016, our Rotary District 6380 honored Joyce Joyce and John Joyce (Sterling Heights Rotary) with the Terry Youlton Humanitarian Award at our annual district conference. We were both very delighted with the recognition that we received for our work in bringing clean water to very poor people in the Dominican Republic.

We were especially pleased with this award since we had received an award a few years earlier for our previous efforts in the Dominican Republic.

Instead of making our annual trip to the Dominican Republic in February (a brief escape from winter in Michigan) in 2016 we traveled there during the end of June. Part of the trip was followup on progress for the implementation of the latest Rotary grant.

However, a major highlight

of this trip was that Rotarian Roberto Ortiz of the Club Rotario Bonao was being installed as Rotary District Governor for District 4060. We were his invited guests at this event.


District 4060 covers the entire Dominican Republic country and has 60 clubs. Joyce was honored not only for her work in the Biosand Clean Water Clean Hands Global project but for several previous projects as well. These are listed in a table. She was chosen as the only non-Dominican person to speak (with a Spanish translator) at the installation ceremony.

The ceremony also honored USA by playing the USA national anthem after the Dominican national anthem with Joyce standing by the USA flag.

Later in the week, Joyce Joyce, John Joyce and daughter Karen Joyce (Warren Rotary) were also honored at the President's Night installation ceremony for the Club Rotario Bonao. Special awards were created and given to us.

Not only was it very gratifying to know how much our projects were appreciated both by Rotarians and recipients of filters and sanitation training but we are gratified with the many friends we have made over the 12 trips we have made to the Dominican Republic. Zone Districts to Assist with Flood Relief in Louisiana



e are making good progress on moving forward with our flood relief initiative and "the ducks are getting aligned."

I have personally spoken to our Classmate Governors in New Orleans and in Baton

Rouge. New Orleans was not particularly hit but the surrounding areas were. Baton Rouge was on high ground and was not supposed to be flooded (!) and therefore many did not have flood insurance (!!) So, the need is great. I understand that the first responders have completed their work and now the rebuilding must begin - and that is where we are going to step in.


These two Louisiana Governors have appointed liaison people who are in the process of assessing local needs for goods and products. The 6450 Task Force is being led by Glenn Olson and Brian Andersen and they have been in contact with their counterparts in Louisiana. The needs assessment is underway.

In order to pay for what we intend to do, the Rotary Club of Hinsdale, as a matter of logistical convenience to our Task Force, has agreed to let us use its foundation for purposes of receiving donations.

Funds should be sent to: Rotary Club of Hinsdale Foundation P.O. Box 395 Hinsdale, IL 60522-0395 Please note on the check that the funds are for the Louisiana Flood Relief Initiative and if the check does not clearly identify the donor, please make a note of that as well. And, if I can ask a favor, when checks are sent, please send a email to Brian, Glenn and myself confirming that so that we can cross-check and anticipate the receipt of the funds.

I do know that some districts have made other arrangements or are having their separate programs - all of which is great. For those who are not connected with some program though, I am hopeful that you can collect funds for us because these are going to be translated into goods and products which we are going to purchase "up north" and then have delivered in care of specific Rotary Clubs in Louisiana to ensure distribution directly to those in need.

In due course, we expect that Rotary and our Zones and all who helped will receive proper recognition and I will continue to send progress reports along the way.
