## Speaker: Jill Leslie

Jill spoke about the Canadian Women for Women in Afghanistan program. Afghanistan is one of the worst countries in the world. The Canadian Women for Women in Afghanistan wants to advance women's rights, and they do that through education. Their organization is connected to Rotary clubs throughout Canada and there are even 2 Rotary clubs now in Afghanistan.

They have 3 main programs:

- Adult Literacy
- Teaching Teachers
- Online learning library materials

Adult literacy – They have 40 to 50 students in rural communities. Connect with the men for permission and the senior women for support by having them host the classes. Teach numeracy, health, home care. Educating the women is the first step to educating the children.

Teaching the teachers – They go only to areas they are wanted. They provide a library kit and a science kit to each teacher. They equip over 50 schools in a year.

Online Learning materials - There are so few resources available in the schools, the online helps to supplement these. They are more accessible for children in the cities. However, it is designed so that in rural areas they can set up a local area network, and not require Internet. They are making it more accessible through the cell phone network. Working to get more computers in the girls schools as well.
