Thank you for your interest in applying for membership in the Rotary Club of South Cowichan (Mill Bay).

Membership Application Process:

Step 1: Attend one or more meetings as a guest to meet members in the Club and inquire about membership. Confirm the member in the Club who will sponsor you. Review the Constitution and Bylaws. Ask questions!

Step 2: Complete the membership application form and submit along with your application fee and pro-rated annual dues amount to the Club Secretary and Membership Director.

Step 3: Once received, your application will stand for review with the Club Executive, and at three regular Club Meetings with the membership before it is eligible for approval. During this time, members of the Club have the opportunity to inquire about your application.

Step 4: Your application may be approved. Following approval, there will be a standard induction ceremony to welcome you to the Club, and you will be assigned a Rotary International number, website access, nametag, etc.. Note: Additional meeting meal fees / pre-order forms will be required at this time.

The Object of Rotary

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service; SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society; THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life; FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

The Concept of Vocational Service

What is vocational service? Active, engaged Rotarians view vocational service as a way of life; sometimes Rotarians find it difficult to articulate a clear definition.

The Object of Rotary is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The concept of vocational service is rooted in the Second Object, which calls on Rotarians to "encourage and foster":

- High ethical standards in business and professions
- The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations
- The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society

Members conduct themselves and their businesses in accordance with Rotary's principles.

Rotary Code of Conduct

As a Rotarian, I will:

1) Exemplify the core value of integrity in all behaviors and activities

2) Use my vocational experience and talents to serve in Rotary

3) Conduct all of my personal, business, and professional affairs ethically, encouraging and fostering high ethical standards as an example to others

4) Be fair in all dealings with others and treat them with the respect due to them as fellow human beings

5) Promote recognition and respect for all occupations which are useful to society

6) Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community

7) Honor the trust that Rotary and fellow Rotarians provide and not do anything that will bring disfavor or reflect adversely on Rotary or fellow Rotarians

8) Not seek from a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship

The Four-Way Test

The Four-Way Test is an essential standard against which Rotarians measure ethical behavior of the things we think, say or do:

- 1) Is it the TRUTH?
- 2) Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3) Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4) Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?
