

100 Years of Service Above Self Rotary Club of Victoria November 15 1913-2013



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PREFACE

This history of the Rotary Club of Victoria, BC was prepared because it needed to be and what better time to do it than for the 100th anniversary of the Club in 2013.

Most of the research material exists in the 40-50 boxes in the Archives of the City of Victoria. The other main sources were the BC Provincial Archives and the Victoria Public Library. Numerous other sources were checked but yielded little.

Throughout the hundred years, there were literally dozens of individual members who contributed to the recording of the story. Most are now unknown but a few stand out. HP (Pete) Johnson was the historian during the twenties and the thirties. Captain Thomas J. (Cappy) Goodlake, who was the Club Secretary for twenty years and then was elected President, wrote an abbreviated 60-year history of the Club starting in 1913. Dr.Carron Jameson (President 1966-67) was the historian for many years until his death. He was followed by Bedford Bates (assisted by Judge Blake Allan).

Bedford Bates made an appeal to the Club for historical information. Lo and behold, he was invited by Eric Dowell (President 1970-71) to visit Dowell's Transfer and Storage warehouse where, with the use off a forklift, they obtained a large case filled with memorabilia.

At this time, Bedford's wife had passed away so he was rattling around in a large empty house. Bedford took the material from Dowell's and sorted it by decades in different rooms of the house. Over the years, the material was all indexed and turned over to the Victoria Archives. The last major Club historian was Frank Cappello who continued the indexing and archiving.

This history is a summation of probably 50-60,000 pages of material. There are a few scattered years where the information is sketchy and there are a few individual presidential biographies which were not found in the city, however, there are no historical events that have been missed.

There are a number of Club members who deserve thanks in the preparation of this history. In particular, Past President Ros Scott took the basic draft and turned into a format ready for publishing. Others include Presidents Murray Ramsbottom (proof reading), Don Jensen, and Terry Toone as well as Bedford Bates and Frank Cappello. Flynn Printing, which has supported the Club for more than two decades, printed the history.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL BEGINNINGS

Paul Harris organized the first Rotary club in Chicago in 1905. The name 'Rotary' was derived from the practice of rotating meetings from one member's place of business to another's. This practice was changed when the size of the club became unwieldy and the luncheon meeting was initiated. By 1910, the existing 16 Rotary clubs linked to form the "National Association of Rotary Clubs".

In 1912, the name of the association was changed to the "International Association of Rotary Clubs". During the same year, the first emblem embodying a gear wheel was adopted. In 1916, a Rotary endowment fund was established which was the forerunner of the Rotary International Foundation. In 1922, the name was changed again to "Rotary International". In 1923, the present cogwheel (with 6 spokes, 24 cogs and a keyway) was adopted. In 1933, Chicago Rotarian Herbert Taylor formulated the "4-Way Test". In 1942, at a Rotary conference in London, a vast educational and cultural organization was studied, which eventually resulted in UNESCO. In 1946, a graduate fellowship program was established in memory of Paul Harris.

The 4 "Avenues of Service" were established in 1951. 1954 saw a new RI Headquarters building in Chicago. In 1962, 'Interact 'was established (for youth at the secondary school level. A few years later in 1968, 'rotoract' was established (for 18-30 year olds).

In 1985, RI established Polio Plus, a 20-year commitment to eradicate polio from the world. Ever since, this has been the highest priority for RI. The goal was to free the world of polio by the year 2005, Rotary's 100th anniversary.

The present RI HQ building in Evanston, III was completed in 1987. A year later, approval was granted to admit qualified women into Rotary.

CLUB FORMATION

In the early days of Rotary, it was considered unwise to attempt to organize clubs in communities of less than 25,000 people. Growth was slow for the first few years, but eventually the movement took hold on the Pacific Coast quickly resulting in the formation of – San Francisco in 1908, Los Angeles in 1909, Seattle in 1909 (#4), Portland and Tacoma in 1910 and Spokane in 1911.

The Seattle Club organized the club in Vancouver in the spring of 1913 and during the same year the Vancouver and Seattle Clubs brought the idea to Victoria. Ernest L. Skeel of Seattle and James Giffen and WO Webster of Vancouver did the ground work. Skeel, a lawyer, went to one of his own profession, Frank Higgins, to promote the idea. Giffen and Webster canvassed the businessmen in Victoria and the idea of Rotary caught on rather quickly. The Club began with a number of informal gatherings in October 1913 of young businessmen who had heard of Rotary and were inclined to go further. Some of these men were Percy Abell, W.R. Dale, R.F. Fitzpatrick, John Hart, Alex Peden, W.P. Sweeney and, of course, Frank Higgins.

It is noted that the Vancouver Club (#61) was chartered in March of 1913 and the Victoria Club was formed later in the same year as Club #90.

The inaugural dinner was held at the Empress Hotel on November 15, 1913 with 41 charter members and 14 visitors (9 from Vancouver and 5 from Seattle). This date was considered as that of the formation of the Club. The dinner cost was \$2.50 which included a 6-course meal and cigars. The average age was 37 and they were all on their toes to make Rotary work without the burden of a battalion of older members to keep them in their place.

The Charter arrived from Chicago in due course dated January 1, 1914. Frank Higgins was elected as President. According to custom, the first president was re-elected for a second year, so Frank was president during the year s1914-15. Captain Thomas J. (Cappy) Goodlake was elected Secretary, a position he held for 20 years. Cappy was undoubtedly the spark plug behind the Club. His patience, excellent judgment and quiet sense of humour were of inestimable value to presidents, as all who served under his stewardship would testify.

As might be expected, the major activities during the first year were Rotary education, acquaintance and classification talks by the members.

HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

After a number of meetings in 1913, with principals Frank Higgins of Victoria, Ernest Skeel of Vancouver, and James Giffon and W.O. Webster of Seattle, the Rotary Club of Victoria was organized.

President Frank Higgins, QC

Frank Higgins was born in Victoria on December 26, 1871. His father was the Honourable D.W. Higgins, Speaker of the Legislature 1880-1898. The Higgins home is a mansion on the corner of Fort Street and St Charles. The house was large, cost \$8000, had many rooms and was the scene of much entertaining.

Higgins was called to the bar in 1895. He became the Chief Factor of the Native Sons of BC. In 1901 he married Miss Addie Louise Whitlock who died early. His second wife was Maude Higgins.

Frank was a member of the Canadian Bar Association. He was the leader and principal organizer of the Rotary Club of Victoria, BC and remained active in Rotary for the rest of his life including being a member of the Club Orchestra.

For years his law office had been in an old building in Langley Street and he never moved to more modern quarters. He liked the high ceilings, the draughty corridors, the pot-bellied stove and the air of antiquity about the place. It reminded him of the Law Courts of London where he actually appeared on a case.

He died in Victoria on September 21, 1953.

Activities

All activities centered around Rotary education with a special emphasis on acquaintance and fellowship.


One inter-city meeting was held when Vancouver brought its baseball team to Victoria during the summer of 1914. Victoria won the game and was awarded a large copper cup donated by a Vancouver Rotarian. The referee was actress Miss Verna Felton, then leading lady with the Allen Players at the Plaza Theatre.

By the Club's first anniversary the membership had increased to 90, this despite a financial depression and the war. Business was in a slump. Men's suits were on average \$15-20 and coal was \$6.50 a ton.

Finances: the total income of the Club was \$2228.89.

There were some interesting expenditures including: bulletins \$180; guest luncheon's \$101; office rental \$98 and rosters \$37.25

<u>Of Note</u>: The change-over date for Presidents and the Board of Directors was initially established as November.



YEAR TWO

Activities:

Meetings were held at the Ritz Hotel (710 Fort Street). During the year, the Club changed the luncheon meeting place to the Westholm Hotel.

The first District Conference in all Rotary was held in Tacoma and a good number of Victoria members attended. The official title of the meeting was "The First Annual Convention of the North-West Rotary Clubs". Victoria's invitation to hold the next meeting was accepted. Victoria hosted the convention held February 20-21 with Calgary, Spokane, Tacoma, Portland, Seattle, Vancouver and Victoria attending. The total attendance was about 400 and the registration fee \$3.50.

Club members gave a minstrel show in the Royal Theatre and netted \$320. The show was well received with a packed house for 2 nights. Tickets sold for \$1. The Club hired the 88th Fusiliers' Band for the Minstrel Parade.

On July 14, 1915, Rotary International President Frank L. Mulholland, en route to the international Convention in San Francisco, addressed the Victoria club. He stressed fellowship and service to others as worthy objectives in the Rotary programme. The Club sent three delegates to the convention with special instructions to advertise Victoria, one of the Club's major objectives for the year.

Over 100 Rotarians returning from the San Francisco Convention visited Victoria en route home. The New York delegation, which was entertained by the Club, generated publicity in their newspapers and generally described Victoria Rotarians as the "liveliest of the live wires". In 1914, Club President Frank Higgins was made vice-president of the International Association of Rotary Clubs.

On February 20, Victoria hosted the 2nd annual convention of the Northwest Rotary Clubs. 113 delegates from mainland clubs arrived the evening before. The Empress Hotel had agreed (after some persuasion) to provide accommodations for the meeting, charging \$3 for a double room with a bath. The Colonist editoral had praise for the 15 month's old club – "Our felicitations upon a very successful event. It is one that must result in great good for the city". Club singing was starting to attract special attention.

There was an early indication of high membership turnover (25%). This was due to Directors using the axe on delinquents and prodding survivors to do better. The problem was with new members coming in too fast, many without realizing the obligations they had undertaken.

President James Hunter

James Hunter was a founding member of our Club and its second President. As a reward for his active service, the Club later made him an honourary member. In addition he was an active member of the Canadian Club, the Pacific Club and the United Commercial Travelers. He was an ardent golfer and popular in sports circles.

Mr. Hunter was born in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1888 and came to Vancouver with his parents. After completing school he came to Victoria and joined the staff of the Hudson Bay Company. Later he became business manager for a number of private companies. He was best known, however, for the way he organized the musical life of the City. During the War, he organized benefit concerts and singing for the Red Cross and other wartime organizations. He organized Christmas pantomimes for the children and was business manager for the Victoria Operatic Society. He is also said to have been a source of encouragement to students of drama and to have had considerable ability as an actor and singer himself.

Mr. Hunter was married with two children and lived at 957 Moss Street. He died in 1931 and is buried at Ross Bay Cemetery.

Of Note: The membership make-up of the Club is of interest. Of 72 members whose careers had been written up in the Sunshine Bulletin, 31 were Canadian born; 20 from the UK; 18 from

A study of the possibility of developing a local steel industry was promoted and there were various war activities.

The Northwest Conference of Rotary was held in Seattle 19/20 February 19-20, 1916. There were 500 delegates – including 50 from Victoria.

A campaign was sponsored for buying home manufactured products and a free port and grain elevator advocated.

The Club gave continued assistance to the Tourist Bureau.

The Club sponsored a collection of cast-off materials from Victoria homes resulting in close to \$500 being turned over to the Red Cross.

A portion of the expenses of delegates to the International Convention in Cincinnati in June were paid.

The Club had the Board of Trade and Retail Merchant's Association to lunch to foster closer cooperation. Rotarian JO Cameron hosted the weekly luncheon in the shipbuilding yards of Cameron-Genoa Shipbuilding on the Songhees. Wooden ships were built to aid the war effort.

Home Products fair was sponsored.

The Club collected \$4631 for the British Sailor's Relief Fund.

YEAR FOUR

President Percy Abell

Percy Abell, born in Woodstock in 1873, became President of the Club at the age of 33. A senior manager of Macey Office Equipment Co., he married Miss Mae Virtue, also of Woodstock. They lived together in Oak Bay where he practiced his hobby, 'intensive farming'. As well as being a Rotarian, he was a Mason and a member of the Pacific Club.

The record is light on personal details about him. We know him best from a description published in the Rotary newsletter which judged him to be "good without being too good; funny without being rude; undoubtedly clever and not at all conceited; strict but always fair; aggressive in a diplomatic way; economical without being stingy; methodical to the core, all of which go to make him an exceptionally good manager".

Percy held Rotary and its ideals in high regard. Six years after he left the Presidency he led a gang of masked buccaneers in a raid on a Rotary meeting in progress. They drove the President from his chair, cleared the head table and took over the proceedings. Then, in a series of speeches which were "intended to be humorous" the invaders drew attention to elements that were creeping into the Club and destroying its efficiency: selfishness; petty jealousies; unjustified carping and criticism; disregard of the Chair; failure to contribute to the program; lack of support of the Club's magazine; and laxness in introducing new members. The record is silent on how this 'raid' was received by his fellow Rotarians or if the Club underwent any revision.

Activities

The third Anniversary Banquet was held in the Empress Hotel (150 attended). Premier Brewster was made an Honourary Member and addressed the assembly.

The annual North-west Conference was held in Vancouver 23/24 February 23-24, 1917.

Delegates adopted the glengarry as headwear for the occasion.

Stuart M Campbell, District Governor of the 18th District visited the Club.

Club singing became very popular throughout the District. One of our members, Ernie Down, wrote several originals some of which were accepted and published in the RI Manual. Another member, Arthur Millet, wrote the third verse to the international anthem which is in the manual and is sung at all International Conferences held in the US and Canada.

Much of the Club's activities centered on the war effort, as it was realized that the struggle was becoming all out.

The Club went on record favouring conscription.

The ladies of Rotary were beginning to take an active part.

Financially, the Club was beginning to show surpluses: the net for the year was \$1069.08.

YEAR FIVE

Of Note: For six weeks in the fall of 1918, there were no meetings of the Club because all public gatherings had been prohibited by the City because of the Spanish flu.

President Joseph O'Connell

Joe was born in Lindsay, Ontario and spent all his life in the clothing industry, first with Sellers-Gough Co. in Toronto. In 1910, he came to Victoria and established his own business, Fitzpatrick and O'Connell's with a partner. The business was first located on Yates Street but soon moved to Government Street.

In 1911 he married Elizabeth Maude Diment also from Lindsay and together they had three children.

Joe developed a first class stock of 'proper' clothes and gentlemen's furnishings. This, coupled with courtesy and good service, brought the company good business with many Rotarians "leaving their coin there".

He held many offices in local and fraternal organizations in addition to being a very active Rotarian. He is described as a very sharp dresser and an able talker, who could discourse on almost any subject. He could put his point across very distinctly and fluently and it was said that he 'commanded attention whenever he was on his feet'. It was his ability to talk and sell that landed him his first job and a lifelong career.

His hobby was playing golf. However, he was active in the Knights of Columbus, the Pacific Club, the Royal Arcanum and the Victoria Canadian Club.

Activities

Victory Loan drives were organized and conducted to establish and cultivate gardens by youngsters. The Ladies assisted members in a house-to-house canvass to promote "food conservation". A huge 'open' Rotary luncheon was held to launch the Victory Loan drive – a great success. Rotarians of Victoria subscribed \$75,000.

The Rotary choir, under Frank J. Sehl, was active during the year.

The Club-sponsored campaign to establish an Iron and Steel Industry was headed by the Mayor with Rotarians Bert Todd and Bob Neild (Manager, Victoria Machinery Depot). Resolutions were sent to Dominion and Provincial governments. A large open luncheon was held in this regard with the Honourable Dr.Tolmie, J.C. McIntosh (federal member for Victoria and Esquimalt) and H.C. Hall (provincial member for Saanich) in attendance. The Club carried the campaign to up-

island boards of trade and organized a committee composed of all island interests. An immense amount of work was done by Club members.

Rotarian Harry Lauder addressed the Club with a thrilling patriotic speech. The lunch was combined with the Canadian Club with 500 in attendance. Many were turned away.

The District Conference was held in Spokane. 22 Club members attended. Alex McFarlane of Vancouver was elected unanimously to the post of District Governor.

Victoria newspapers have been most generous with their accounts of all Rotary activities reporting that " It will be observed that the Rotary Club is the really live organization in the City boosting trade, expansion and other useful city and island buildings. The Board of Trade has for years confined it activities to retail and wholesale matters".

The Club supported the Navy League.

Several classification talks were held – Bishop Schofield and Dr. Plaskett on the new Astrophysical Observatory.

The Club held a raffle for the Red Cross raising over \$1900.

The Club was addressed by the Premier and the Minister of Lands asking our help in providing jobs for returning soldiers.

The District 22 Conference was held in Portland. Clubs attending included Seattle, Tacoma, Portland, Spokane, Vancouver, Victoria, Everett, and Bellingham. District 22 later became District 1.

The first orchestra in all of Rotary was composed of members under the leadership of Benny Bantley. The original members were: Benny Bantley piano, Justin Gilbert violin, Frank Higgins violin, Frank Waring violin, Herbert Kent flute, Jim Beatty coronet, and Frank Sehl string bass. Tom Mayers assisted on piano.

President Jack Scott

John Fleming Scott was born in Bluevale, Ontario in 1885. In 1893, with his parents, he migrated to the west coast. After some years of arduous study in school and considerable rugby football, he joined the staff of Messrs. W.H. Malkin and Company, wholesale grocers of Vancouver. As their travelling representative he was often on Vancouver Island. Jack became a favourite on the 'road' and many stories were told by residents of Nanaimo, Comox and the neighbouring towns. In 1909, he left the grocery business to join his brother Sam M. Scott, "Boys Clothes Specialist" and founder of stores in Vancouver and Victoria, bearing his name. The Victoria store was started in July 1912 and under Jack's able management made the older store in Vancouver hustle to keep in the running.

In October 1912, he married Miss Hazel Jeffrey of Toronto.

Jack was keenly interested in any movement to benefit Victoria merchants and, needless to say, was a valued member of the Rotary Club where his dramatic ability brought him to the fore.

Activities

The Installation Banquet was held at the Brentwood Hotel with 200 in attendance

There were some key objectives for the year:

- A Municipal golf course
- seed growing contest among school children
- work among boys
- the Victoria and Island Development Association
- the Council of the Board of Trade
- the annual Christmas tree campaign(which raised \$4000)

New York City and Victoria exchanged flags to display at regular meetings.

Inter-city meetings were held between Victoria and Vancouver – tennis and baseball games. W.E. Boeing, of the Boeing Seaplane Manufacturing Company of Seattle addressed the Club. In recalling the first Atlantic flight made a few days previously, Mr. Boeing predicted that the next few years would see the inauguration of regular trans-Atlantic services.

<u>Municipal Golf Club:</u> Elk Lake and Uplands were studied by the committee and Uplands was chosen. The Club made a deal with Hudson's Bay Company for long lease of the land extending from the Normal School along Landsdowne to Cadboro Bay Road, thence to Cedar Hill X Road taking in that part of what is now the Uplands Golf Course. Oak Bay agreed upon a generous water rate and low taxes, so the Club pressed into service two members, Fred Butterfield (land surveyor) and Reg Hincks (an experienced golf course architect).

The Club went to City Council and obtained consent to place a by-law before the ratepayers to spend \$20,000 to build a municipal golf course. The request lost by 98 votes. The Club decided that it had worked sufficiently hard so went back to City Council and gained their consent to 'try again'. Club members put all they had into the campaign but lost again by over 1000 votes. The Club decided to approach Esquimalt (MacAuley Point Club, the oldest on the Pacific coast) and offered them all of their information, properties and advice, gratis. They made a deal with the owner and Oak Bay and took on the task. The organizers reduced the size of the land requested, took more "back" land and released most of the Landsdowne frontage.

Inter-city meetings were held with Vancouver as visitors who bought baseball and golf teams. Victoria won the baseball game but won only one of the golf games (Hon John Hart).

The Club supported the Navy League and campaigned for a new naval training ship for Esquimalt as well as campaigning for the retention of the Naval School (Royal Roads).

The Club journeyed to Sidney to assist in the development of that territory.

Classification talks were encouraged and debates on timely topics became part of the program. General Sir Arthur Currie addressed the Club and accepted an honourary life membership, He left Victoria in 1914 as a lieutenant-colonel and returned as the Commander of the Canadian Corps France (comprised of 4 divisions totaling 120,000 men) The Club organized and conducted a monster teenage boy's citizenship program meeting in the Drill Hall. The group was addressed by Sir Arthur Currie and several prominent citizens.

A special committee was appointed to lay plans for shipbuilding in Victoria.

A seed growing contest was held and the winners were entertained and presented with cups. The annual Christmas tree drive was held for the needy – \$4000 was raised and distributed. The District Conference was held in Victoria in April. Over 1200 attended with the banquet held in the Drill Hall. There was wonderful newspaper coverage of the sessions. 117 delegates stayed on to play in the golf tournament. Both Vancouver and Seattle bulletins doffed their hats to Victoria for unsurpassed entertainment, hospitality and quality of program.

The custom of wearing member badges was inaugurated.

Captain Bruce Bairnsfather (Better Hole Cartoons) addressed the Club.

President Clifford Denham

Clifford Denham was born at Penarth Glamorganshire, Wales on March 1, 1882. At age 6, his family moved to London where he went to school. At 15, he started an apprenticeship as an electrician, but soon left this for a job at Moss Empires Ltd., controllers of some of the largest vaudeville houses in London. He was soon working for the Bioscope Co. of London, a pioneer movie firm. In an effort to persuade Britons that Canada was the land of opportunity, the CPR engaged Bioscope to produce a film on 'Living in Canada'. Clifford was made producer and spent the next few years in Canada travelling and filming across Canada. All indoor scenes were taken during the winter because the CPR had stipulated: "No winter scenes" since Britons already thought of Canada as the frozen north.

At the end of this assignment the American production company "Klaw and Erlanger" hired him. With Mr. Klaw, he toured the length and breadth of the US and Canada, buying, renting or leasing theatres for their productions. It was in Victoria that they leased the Old Victoria Theatre and Mr. Denham asked to be manager. He remained in this position until the Royal Theatre was completed in 1913 and he became manager of it, a position in which he remained until his retirement.

Mr. Denham was a very active president of Rotary. He organized a club orchestra and did much for Victoria business, organizing a "knock the knocker" campaign against those who criticized Victoria's industry or business: "Pull for Victoria or pullout".

Mr. Denham was also a life member of the Royal Colwood Golf Club, the Pacific Club, and the Fraternal Order of Elks. He is described as an ardent fisherman and hunter and an all-round outdoorsman. He was married to Mary and they had two children, Clifford and Vivian. He died after a short illness in 1962.

Activities

In 1920, the Club continued to take part in the transformation of the Board of Trade into the broader mandated Chamber of Commerce. Several Rotarians were elected to the council with one Rotarian as Vice President. Rotarian leaders were in the drive – with 750 memberships sold. A Rotarian was elected as president and the Chamber moved to new quarters uptown.

The Club assisted and became involved in the Boy Scouts, YMCA, Navy League, Community Service, and in an education program to counter Bolshevism and ease industrial unrest.

A picnic was held at Elk Lake with 300 attending including 20 Nanaimo Rotarians who took home a goodly share of the prizes.

The Club assisted the Victoria and Island Development Association as well as continuing boys' work and holding a seed growing contest.

The Club Orchestra (the first in Rotary) was formally formed under leader Benny Bentley. Others included: Frank Higgins, Jim Beatty, Herbert Kent, Frank Sehl, John Woods, Fred Butterfield, Justin Gilbert, Ernie Down, L.D. McLean, Tom Meyers, and Ray Hallwright. This was the start of Club 90's wonderful heritage of music that runs through to today.

The Club continued the task of getting jobs for returning soldiers.

The Christmas Tree Fund raised over \$7500.

1200 children were entertained at a Christmas party. Each child was given a gift certificate for shoes or clothes as well as toys and candy.

A soccer league was formed amongst Victoria, Vancouver and Nanaimo. Six games were played.

85 Club members and 60 spouses ventured to the District Conference in Seattle in March 1921 where 1500 were in attendance.

Members constructed a pavilion for the YMCA at Elk Lake.

The Club entertained "Kumtuka" (ladies club) the latest offspring of Rotary. The Club also visited Port Angeles, their baby club - the Club sponsored the Rotary Club of Port Angeles (RI Club #879).

President Lester Patrick

Joseph Patrick was the patriarch of a hockey dynasty. He became a captain of the lumber industry in the interior of BC (home in Nelson) becoming a millionaire in the first few years of the 20th century. He had two sons, Lester and Frank, both hockey players.

Lester was born in 1883 in Drummondville, Quebec. He completed his schooling in Montreal and then moved to the Prairies for employment with a survey crew. It was not long before he was playing hockey for Brandon and then the Montreal Wanderers where he was the team captain for two years when the Club won the Stanley Cup.

Back in Nelson, Joseph had made his sons partners in the business (which was making a fortune). In the early 1900's the three partners moved to the West Coast with the intention of establishing hockey, which was virtually unknown in that area. They moved to Victoria and around 1911 built three arenas. One was in Victoria (3,500 seats), one was in Vancouver (10,500 seats) and one in New Westminster. These rinks were the first artificial ice rinks in North America. The Vancouver arena was the largest in the world until the Montreal Forum was built in 1926. The Victoria arena was built in Oak Bay where taxes were lower – sadly it burned in 1929. The trio also established the Pacific Coast Hockey League in 1911.

While in Victoria, Lester immersed himself into the community and business world. He was President of our Club in 1921-22 with Percy Scurrah as the Vice-President. In 1924 he managed the Victoria Cougars. Seeing the writing on the wall with the new NHL, he sold his roster to the New York Rangers where he became coach in 1926. He spent 23 years at Madison Square Gardens as coach, then general manager and vice-president. He lived in the Waldorf-Astoria when he was in New York and his wife moved east each winter to be with him. But each summer they would move back to Victoria, which they called home. They had a house on Linden at Chapman. During a game in 1944, at age 57, Lester replaced his injured goalie and preserved a victory.

Their two sons, Murray (Muzz) and Lynn both continued the hockey dynasty. They both became NHL general-managers – Muzz in New York and Lynn in Boston.

Lester Patrick was known as the "Silver Fox". He had strength, vision, a sense of humour, an analytical mind, a flair for showmanship, and unquestioned loyalty. He spent 56 years in hockey and probably did more for the sport than any other individual. He died in Victoria in 1960. The 'who's who' of hockey attended the funeral.

Activities

Boy's work continued with the sending of 31 boys to YMCA summer camp and the annual seed growing contest was held.

International service was stressed and there was a large attendance at the District Conference. The Club assisted the Saanich Health Centre and a monster picnic for 600 boys was held at Deep Cove. The Club took an interest in municipal affairs and civic reform and advocated for a city manager to run the City like a business leaving the Council for policy-making only.

High school parent teacher associations received assistance and the Christmas Fund drive raised \$9,784.

The Club made a presentation to Mr. and Mrs. Butchart in recognition of their efforts with the Community Centre and the swimming baths.

<u>Historical Moment</u>

<u>Spokes</u>

In 1922, a separate debating society within Rotary was started and named **Spellbinders.** This group met every Thursday evening over dinner at either the Douglas Hotel or the Dominion Hotel. The format was changed to hold meetings at members' homes. In 1930 the name was changed to **Spokes.**

President Percy Scurrah

If Rotary were an academic institution instead of what it is, a purely social and fraternal organization, Percy Scurrah would undoubtedly qualify for a Doctorate without further ado. Few men have had such a deep and thorough knowledge of Rotary and such a wide and practical experience as that accumulated by Percy during his career.

Percy was born in Brechin, Ontario in 1883 and educated at Queen's University. He had many occupations during his youth such as that of a telegraph operator for the CPR and a train dispatcher at Fort William.

In 1910, he moved to Victoria and obtained an interest in the *Dynes and Eddington* store. Shortly thereafter, he bought the business and opened *Scurrah's Clothing Store*.

In 1914, he married Mabel Dynes as well as joining the Rotary Club of Victoria. He became very involved in Rotary and made many major contributions. He had perfect attendance from 1924 until a couple of weeks before his death in 1970. He was proud of his Rotary work and Rotary played a major role in his life. He was the District Governor 1934-35 and was elected a Director of Rotary International for 1937-38. He attended 12 International Conventions and 11 International Assemblies. His was a conspicuous and distinguished service to Rotary throughout his life.

Mr. Scurrah served Victoria as an alderman from 1949-54 and was mayor from 1955 for three terms. He had many accomplishments including the Point Ellice Bridge, a new health and welfare system and a major debt reduction program. He organized a hard-working team to establish a ferry service to replace the CPR *Princess* ships. His relentless and tireless team approach convinced Premier W.A.C. Bennett of the need and BC Ferries was born. Percy was a uniquely dedicated Rotarian, an outstanding mayor and a great corporate citizen.

Activities

The Club continued to boost the Publicity Bureau. The Chamber of Commerce was supported in its activities (12 of 18 directors were Rotarians). The Club continued agitation for a city manager form of civic government. A number of inter-city meetings including a most successful Ball was held in the Armoury. Talks by members continued to be encouraged. The Club endorsed tax concessions to the CPR in return for their building of an amusement centre (the Crystal Gardens). Rotariennes conducted regular meetings. The annual seed growing contest was held.

President Jimmy Adam

Jimmy Adam, or as he was known, J. Particular Adam because he advertized himself as the particular grocer, was born In Kilmarnoch, Ayrshire, Scotland in 1882 and came to Canada in 1893. He lived in Nanaimo until 1900, then moved to Ladysmith and opened a grocery store. In 1913 he moved to Victoria where he owned two grocery stores, one on Cook Street and one at Gladstone and Fernwood. He was married with two girls and a boy.

Jimmy was elected into Rotary because it was felt that he epitomized two essential aspects of Rotary: Service and Efficiency. He carried the classification of grocer and became the President of Rotary in July 1923.

In his speech accepting the office of President he vowed to "keep the Club at the top notch of efficiency - enthusiasm means so much to the spirit and success of our Club". At the time the price for lunch was 50 cents. Members who did not want lunch paid 25 cents.

Jimmy was very fond of athletics and, in particular, shone in his younger years as a centre forward in soccer. As such, he captained a team that played victoriously in San Francisco and other US cities. During 1927-28, he was an alderman. He died 29 March, 1939 and is buried in Ross Bay Cemetery.

Activities

The Club pledged \$12,000 to the TB Clinic at the Royal Jubilee Hospital.

Boys were sent to YMCA Summer Camp.

The Lord Mayor of York, England, Rotarian J.B. Inglis presented the Club with a gavel made from oak from York Minster.

The Honourable Walter Nicol, Lieutenant-Governor of BC, addressed the Club.

A Club ladies' evening meeting was held celebrating the 10th anniversary of the Club.

The annual seed growing contest was held.

The annual Christmas tree fund raised \$1825.

A 100% meeting was held 24th February with Mayor Hayward and City Council as guests.

A float was entered in the 24th May parade.

On June 19 lunch was held at the British America Paint Company hosted by Carl and Hubert Pendray. On June 26 our guest was Rear Admiral Sir Herbert Brand, KCMG, KCVO, and CB. He was accompanied by the Captains of Her Majesty's Ships Dehli, Danae, Dauntless and Dragon.

President James Beatty

James Beatty was born in Frankfort, Ontario. At an early age he learned Morse code and became a telegraphist. He also worked in a grocery after high school graduation.

Jim became a charter member of the Rotary Club of Vancouver in 1913. He moved to Victoria in 1914 and joined our Club. During WWI, he served as a wireless operator in the Royal Naval Reserve. Returning to Victoria, he quickly became immersed in Rotary, becoming a Director, Treasurer, and Vice President and in 1924, he became a very popular President. He put much time and effort into Rotary becoming the District Governor in 1926.

In professional life he started out as a teacher in business school. He progressed steadily and eventually became a partner in a major business college – Sprott Shaw. At the same time he was active in the community especially in the Chamber of Commerce, Masonic circles and on the golf course.

Jim Beatty had an unfailing good nature, great patience and a love of good humour. He remained a bachelor all his life.

Activities

The meeting venue temporarily changed to the Chamber of Commerce.

The campaign continued to obtain jobs for the unemployed.

July 24 our guest was Mr. DA MacDonald, City Controller.

August 4 there was a musical program with Miss Kedon (pianist) and Master Kedon (Violinist) who had recently arrived from Russia.

August 21 the Club hosted an inter-city meeting with Port Angeles which provided the program and entertainment. Other clubs involved were Bellingham, Everett, Mt Vernon, and Nanaimo. September 11 our guest was Dr. RW Sutherland Minister of Public Works whose subject was "The Roads of BC".

October 9 lunch was held at the #1 Fire hall as guests of Fire Chief Stewart and the Fire Wardens to recognize Dominion Fire Prevention Week.

The Australian and New Zealand delegation en route to the International Convention in Toronto was entertained. The Club was represented by the President at the convention.

The Club was also represented by the President, the Secretary and Chairman of the Boy's Work Committee at the Executive Conference at Hoquiam and by 15 other members at the District Conference at Portland.

The "Buy Home Products" campaign was boosted.

The Club presented a memorandum to the Putnam-Weir Education Commission appointed by the Provincial Government.

The Memorial Avenue scheme was supported with members planting trees along Shelbourne Street. This actually was a Chamber of Commerce initiative well supported by our Club. Special plantings were completed by Marshall Joffre, Lord Byng, Sir Arthur Currie and the Prince of Wales.

January 6 Mayor Carl Pendray and the City Council were guests and conducted the program. The Club agitated for better roads for the island.

Anacortes was visited by the Club (with ladies).

June 4 our luncheon was held in the dining Room of the Hudson's Bay Company.

<u>Historical Moment</u>

Significant statement about Rotary (James Beatty 1925)

.... The primary purpose of Rotary is not to take independent action in its own name on a wide variety of subjects, but rather act as a training school in citizenship for its members. It has therefore been a source of satisfaction to them to see so many of their fellow Rotarians doing good service for patriotic, civic, fraternal and charitable organizations throughout the city and district. The more such honourable work is done, the more the existence of our club is justified.

Malahat Fountain


In 1924 the Club erected a water fountain on the Malahat near Mill Bay. Its purpose was to provide water for the then vintage cars navigating the Malahat. One was lucky to drive the 45 minute trip over the Malahat without a tire blowout and/or an overheated radiator – or both. The fountain also provided drinking water.

The Malahat Fountain was completed and dedicated by Hon Dr. Sutherland, Minister of Public Works. This was followed by an inter-city banquet with Nanaimo in the Agriculture Hall in Duncan. 200 attended. Members of the Victoria Club travelled to Mill Bay by TALLY HO and returned by the Mill Bay Ferry.

The fountain is approximately seven feet tall and five feet wide, made of concrete with a brass water spout. There is space for a Rotary wheel but it is missing. There are two killer whales on the face with a number of native words. The wording on the base reads "Rotary Club of Victoria 1924".

The fountain was almost destroyed in 1982 because of water pollution. The Highways Department wanted to demolish it but the Mill Bay Community League came to its rescue. Under Duncan Rotarian Chuck Peterson, sand blasting was organized, the inscription was re-coppered and the plumbing was re-connected.

Over the last hundred years, the fountain has been refurbished mainly by Rotarians. In 2006, Past President Norm Bradshaw led a team to do such.

President Bob Mayhew

Robert Wellington Mayhew was born in 1881 in Cobden, Ontario. He married and had three children, the youngest of which was killed in action in WW1. He came to Victoria and founded the Sidney Roofing and Paper Co. In due course he became the President of the National Box and Paper Co. and a member of the Royal Trust Co. Advisory Board. He was the President of the Victoria Rotary Club in 1925.

In 1932, Bob became an Oak Bay Councilor. He became Reeve in 1933 until 1936. He was a member of the First United Church.

In 1937, he was elected as the Liberal Member of Parliament for Victoria. In 1938, he became President of the Canadian Manufacturers Association. 1944-48 he was Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Finance and during the period from 1948 he was a member of the federal cabinet as Minister of Fisheries. He was charged with the negotiation of a treaty between the US, Canada and Japan that would protect all North Pacific fishing grounds from wasteful raids. He led Canada into participation in the Colombo Plan. He retired in 1952.

In 1957 Bob sold his company which at that time had 400 employees.

He gave of his time to community affairs such as the development of both UBC and UVic (he holds honourary degrees from both). He was President of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce At age 72, he was appointed Ambassador to Japan for two years. He was a member of the Tokyo Rotary Club 1953-54.

Bob Mayhew symbolized a true statesman who did much to build Canada to its present standing among the nations of the world. He died at the Royal Jubilee Hospital in July 1971 at the age of ninety.

Activities

The Club assisted the Publicity Bureau. A music festival was held in the arena. Boy's work at the YMCA continued.

A float was again entered in the May Day parade.

The West Coast road plan was endorsed.

The Club returned to the Empress Hotel for meetings.

The Port Angeles Club was entertained.

The annual Seed Growing contest was held with Mrs. Butchart presenting prizes.

The Mayor and Council were entertained.

600 children attended the Christmas tree function.

The District Conference was held. 500 Rotariennes went to Government House.

Jim Beatty was nominated as District Governor.

President Edwin Tomlin

Edwin Tomlin was born on 27 August 1884 in Kent to Tom and Helen Tomlin. He came to Canada in 1907 and was employed by the CPR for nine months. He then joined the Vancouver Portland Cement Company which was operated by R.P. Butchart at Todd Inlet until 1912. He then went to the Associated Portland Cement Company at Bamberton. When the two companies joined in 1919 to become the BC Cement Company, Mr. Butchart was named President and Mr. Tomlin became Director-Treasurer. He became managing director in 1927 and retained that post until the death of Mr. Butchart died in 1943, when he became president.

Mr. Tomlin was a Mason, a director and past-president of the Royal Jubilee Hospital, and a chairman of the Oak Bay School Board. He helped organize a branch of the Canadian Manufacturers Association. becoming the first chairman. He was also a director of Evans, Coleman and Gillay Bros., Vancouver; Clayburn Holdings Company, Vancouver; and the London & Western Trust Company.

He was a keen student of national affairs and enjoyed close acquaintances with many political leaders. He was a member of the Union Club and the Victoria Golf Club. An enthusiastic gardener, he made a showplace of his home 'Westward Ho'.

Mr. Tomlin married Olive Agnes Wilson and had four children. He died May 29, 1944.

President James Henry Fletcher

James Fletcher was born in Victoria on 5 August 1874 to Thomas Fletcher. He was the second son (after George) of Thomas, who was a pioneer music dealer in Victoria. James attended Boy's Central School. He entered what was to be his life work by entering the music store of his father.

Thomas Fletcher retired in1896 and James saw his firm grow until it embraced Nanaimo, Vancouver and Prince Rupert with the head store in Victoria. He was head of the firm of Fletcher Bros (Victoria) Ltd at the time of his father's death. By this time, there was only one store in Victoria and there was a second separate store, George A Fletcher Music Company, in Nanaimo. The two stores were no longer connected.

To Mr. Fletcher, music was not only a business but a hobby. He was a keen supporter of all musical and cultural activities in Victoria. He was vice-president of the Victoria Retail Merchants Association and a member of the Chamber of Commerce. He was a Mason, a member of the Native Sons of Canada, a member of both the Victoria and Colwood Golf Clubs and of the First United Church.

James was President of the Rotary Club of Victoria in 1927-28. His son, Walter, was President of the same club in 1949-50.

James Fletcher died on 8 April 1944.

President Herbert Anscomb

Herbert Anscomb was born in Maidstone, Kent in 1892. From an early age, he was always intrigued by politics – his father was an alderman and mayor of Maidstone. Herbert's mother died of typhoid when he was 5 years old and three years later, his father suffered a paralyzing stroke. He was brought up by his sister.

In 1911, Herbert Anscomb arrived in Victoria aboard the SS Lake Champlain. He worked as a clerk/accountant for a number of firms including BC Electric and the Victoria Phoenix Brewing Co. (as a chartered accountant) where he rose to manager in 1918. He married Anne Maud Brooker in 1925 and was devoted to her for the rest of his life.

Anscomb was the Reeve of Oak Bay during 1925-27. The election was dirty politics and was a good experience for him for future political endeavors. He was a tough reeve and won several significant battles, some with Victoria where Carl Pendray was mayor. Anscomb had become a formidable speaker and politician. In 1928 he became mayor of Victoria and was most active. His next political venture was provincial where he continued to be most active. As a Tory, he became a minister in the wartime Liberal coalition government. In due course, he beat Premier W.A.C. Bennett. Bennett crossed the floor to the Social Credit Party which dominated BC politics for decades.

Anscomb was often bitterly disillusioned by politics because of the hypocrisy and disloyalty he often witnessed. However, he was tough, a great orator and a formidable politician for most of his life. He accomplished much and died in 1972

Activities

An inter-city meeting was held with Port Angeles (with a return visit).

A picnic was held with the new Safety League with a number of outside speakers. President Herbert Anscomb was elected Mayor of Victoria. He resigned from the Club and Dan Evans was elected to fill the position for the remainder of the year. Dan was replaced by Jack Land on the Board.

President Percy Watson

Percy Watson was born in the 1880's in Invermay, Bruce County, Ontario. He was the third generation born in Canada. He moved to Kincardine and went to public and high schools there.

At 16 he took a hand in the printing of the Kincardine Review. He must have liked the smell of ink because he printed everything that came his way in Peterborough, London and Niagara Falls until, in1904, he moved to Winnipeg and worked for the Stovel Printing Company. With his young experience, he was put in charge of the publications department.

His face was set towards the Pacific Coast so in 1905 he headed west. He worked for a time in Vancouver and then took charge of a small newspaper in Hedley, BC, for eighteen months. In 1907 he was back on the coast and in 1908, with his partners, he opened the Acme Press in Victoria.

Percy was very athletic. In baseball, he helped the Beacon Hill Team to win the city championship. In ice hockey, he cooperated in landing one senior championship and two commercial championships in Victoria. During the period 1911-21, Percy was the Secretary of Victoria Ice Hockey League. In 1922, he became President of the BC Hockey Association. Percy was President of the Rotary Club of Victoria, BC in 1931-32 and became a member of the Canadian Advisory Committee of RI. He was Chairman of the Victoria Zoning Board of Appeal. He was a member of St. Andrews Cathedral and served on the St. Louis College Welfare Association.

Activities

A Rotary Dance was held for the opening of the new Manufacturers' Building at Willows fair grounds.

The Club hosted outside speakers on world topics, held an inter-city meeting with Port Angeles, had a picnic with Duncan at Cowichan and hosted the Anacortes, Everett and Port Angeles clubs. The Pageant of Nations was held at the Provincial Fair Ground at the Willows.

President George McGregor

Captain George McGregor was born in Aberdeenshire, Scotland in 1863 and moved to Canada in 1884. He worked in his trade as an engineer in Collingwood and Barrie. He later went to Vancouver and worked as a marine engineer in ships along the BC coast. He moved to Victoria in 1890 and founded the Victoria Tug Company. His first tug, Sadie, brought the stones used to build the Parliament Buildings to the City. He was also active in founding the Boscowitz Steamship Company. He was well known in marine circles from San Francisco to Skagway.

He was Reeve of Saanich during the period 1914-16 and earlier served on the Saanich School Board. While serving Saanich, he directed an active and successful campaign to pave the roads of the municipality. He was a past director and past president of the Royal Jubilee Hospital board of directors. He was instrumental in building the main units of the hospital. He was also in the Masonic Order, the Canadian Club and on the board of Managers of the First United Church. Captain McGregor was agent for the Union Steamship Company and at one time was associated with the logging and fish cannery business.

Known to every shipping personality in BC and a close friend of hundreds of friends in Victoria, he also held an honourary life membership with the BC Towboat Owner's Association. George died September, 1947.

Activities

An International Assembly was held at the Empress for a week prior to the International Convention in Seattle. International President Sidney Pascall addressed the Club and installed the new officers. The President planted a Tree of Friendship in Beacon Hill Park. Jim and Mrs. Fletcher entertained the wives of the visiting officials at their home. Lt Gov and Mrs. Fordham Johnson entertained the Board at Government House.

6000 registered at the Convention. Victoria's JH Beatty was elected a Director of RI from Canada. Talks were encouraged on education and the Club was addressed by Dean Coleman (UBC), Minister of Education.

A Christmas party and a benefit concert at the Royal Victoria Theatre were organized to raise funds for the needy.

The Club hosted Mayor Learning and City Council. The annual Seed Growing contest continued.

Charles French was born in Markham, Ontario in 1867 and was educated in Collingwood. As a young man, he was described as "having a big heart and an honest good nature". As a teenager he entered the printing business for four years.

In 1886, he joined the Hudson's Bay Company in Winnipeg as a fur dog driver. He remained based in Winnipeg until moving to Victoria in 1902 in the HBC fur department as a purchasing agent. In 1913 he became the BC District Manager of fur trade. He moved to Vancouver with the company in 1921. In 1927, he was appointed the chief factor and fur trade commissioner with headquarters in Winnipeg. In 1930, he returned to Victoria and transferred to the Rotary Club of Victoria.

Charles was very active. He was the president of Rotary, president of the Automobile Club, a member of the Chamber of Commerce, a supporter of the Queen Alexandra Solarium, the

Children's Aid Society, a member of the Beaver Club, and a member of the BC Historical Society. He was also an authority on Indian Life and was frequently in demand as a speaker. When he retired, Charles was awarded the HBC Gold Medal and Gold Bar for his decades of long and faithful service to the company.

President Herbert Pendray

Herbert Jeffrey Pendray was born in 1883 to William John and Amelia Pendray. William came to BC in 1869 during the gold rush. He acquired one of the richest diggings in the country, making a fortune. He returned to England temporarily but came back to Canada to establish the Pendray Soap Company and later to establish the British American Paint Company on Laurel Point. Herbert was one of four sons. He started work as a schoolboy at the Soap Factory and the BA Paint Co. for 55 years rising to be Vice-President. He and his brother Carl built up the business. He was the Vice President of the Automobile Club of Victoria, an elder in the Metropolitan United Church, President of the Rotary Club of Victoria, BC, a member of the Union Club and a director of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce.

Herbert built a house "Heavenwood" on the Esquimalt Lagoon which today (2013) is the *Coast Collective Gallery*.

He was interested in photography. He and his wife were constant travelers and visited most parts of the world. They left Germany just before World War II broke out.

Herbert's brother Carl was mayor of Victoria in the twenties.

In his will, he left generous sums to the United Church, the Salvation Army, the BC Orphanage, YMCA, Resthaven, the 7th Day Adventist Church, his gardener, two of his servants and a family friend with the residue going to the family, including the children of Carl Pendray.

Throughout his life, Herbert Pendray was very quietly involved in kindness, inconspicuous benefactions involvement in city affairs and worked well for the institutions of Victoria. He died January 17, 1956.

Captain Thomas (Cappy) Goodlake was born in Rutland, Dorset, England. He was educated at Cheltenham School and Corpus Christi College, Oxford. Cappy was a veteran of the Boer War and arrived in Victoria in 1913.

Cappy became involved in real estate owning *Goodlake Limited*. In 1923 and from 1926 through 1935, he was a member of the Oak Bay Council. 1933-36, he was the President of the Victoria Real Estate Board.

He became very involved in the formation of the Rotary Club of Victoria and became the first secretary, a position he held for twenty-one years. During this twenty plus years, he guided twenty members through their presidency of the Club. He provided the continuity over the years and was actually the backbone of the Club. He was involved with everything that the Club did during the first twenty years including involvement with four district conventions (1915, '20, '26, and '33). "Presidents come and go but "Cappy goes on forever" was an axiom of the Club members. In 1937, he was elected president of the Club.

In July of 1938, he moved back to the UK to retire. He later returned to Canada.

Percy Scurrah was elected an International Director at the Nice, France convention.

President Walter Luney

Walter Luney was born in Toronto in 1880. He moved with his family to Victoria in 1885. His father was 'Billy Luney'. He attended King's Road, North Ward and Central Schools. He entered the construction business at the age of 12.

Walter took over the company with his older brother, William Jr. in 1906. This started a life of 55 years in construction. The company incorporated as Luney Bros. Construction Ltd. in 1911. Walter was on the ill-fated Point Ellice streetcar. The streetcar stopped at the first end of the bridge and told a man that there was no more room. This was a friend of Walter so he got off the car which then proceeded to disaster.

He married Florence (Peep) Luney.

During the war he was very involved with both construction and shipbuilding in the Dockyard. William Jr. died in 1944. In 1947, with William J. Hamilton, he purchased the company and reorganized the firm. They built more than 50 schools in Victoria. Other buildings included the Normal School, the main branches of the Dominion, Royal and Montreal Banks at Douglas and Yates, dockyard buildings, the Crystal Gardens, bridges, streets, highway pavements, the CNR line into Victoria, the first brick building in Vancouver (Palace Hotel) and numerous other structures.

Walter was President and a charter member of the Victoria builder Exchange, a city alderman, President of the Victoria Rotary Club, President of Queen Alexandra's Solarium, a potentate of the Gizeh Temple, and a member of Vancouver Quadra Lodge #2, AF and AM. He died in 1963.

Historical Moment

The Rotary Boys Choir by John McVie

The Victoria Rotary Club sponsored a boy's choir for over two decades, from 1950 to 72, the 'Rotary Boys Choir', 'RBC' as indicated on their choir blazers (which were provided by the Club). In 1949 the choir idea was presented by Rotarians Charlie Brown and Frank Shandley and a committee was struck. Committee members included Brig. Clifford Milley of the Salvation Army, Lionel Huxtable, Ralph Cruikshank, Jack Conway and Tom Walker. Charlie Brown and Frank Shandley were given the tasks of managing the choir with the assistance initially of Charlie Mullens and Angus McIntyre and Bill Thomson for the last ten years.

Formed in 1950, the Choir's Director and Accompanist during the entire time, 1950-1972, were William (Bill) Hastings (Director) and Helen McVie (Accompanist).

On a Saturday night in September of 1950, the first rehearsal of the Rotary Boys Choir was held at the Salvation Army Citadel on Pandora Avenue where fourteen boys attended. Through word of mouth the choir quickly grew and by 1961 a second 'junior' choir was formed. Total membership in both choirs was approximately 80. The junior choir was directed by a Norm Venton who held weekly practices on Saturday mornings at the Salvation Army Citadel on Pandora Avenue. As young boys were trained in the junior choir they, through experience and age, 'may' be invited to join the senior choir. By 1960 the senior choir held their rehearsals on Saturday evenings at 7 p.m. at the YMCA on Blanshard Street. The choirs performed numerous time throughout each year at worthy causes: seniors homes such as Matson Lodge, church fund raisers, the Boy's and Girl's Club, every June an outdoor Sunday afternoon concert in the Beacon Hill Park Cameron Bandshell, a 30 minute Christmas program taped every year at CJVI on Fort Street, Eaton's at Christmastime every year for three consecutive days during Christmas week before the store opened, and of course the annual Christmas Eve two hour program at the Empress Hotel! These programs always featured solo performances. Some of these boys went on to professional musical endeavours: David Foster, Richard Margison, some as musical directors and teachers, but to everyone, they provided an appreciation of music and the discipline and philosophy of participating in worthy causes and giving of self to others.

Over the years the choir often participated with the Arion Male Voice Choir as the choir accompanist, Helen McVie, was also the accompanist for the Arion. These concerts were held at venues such as Oak Bay and Central Junior High School Auditoriums as these stages were appropriate for mass choirs. One of the highlights was a combined concert at Central Jr. High School (May '68) with the Arion Male Voice Choir, the Eugene Gleemen from Oregon and the Naden Band directed by Captain Len Kamplin. The Lieutenant Governor George Pearkes was also in attendance.

The RBC often was invited to sing at Rotary Club Christmas luncheons including the annual Children's Party, and as requested for other Rotary functions including the District Conference. The choir was also invited to perform in Port Angeles, Duncan, Vancouver and Salt Spring Island. Over the years, well in excess of 500 boys sang in the choir. In September 1970 the choir expanded to include young girls and renamed itself the Rotary Youth Choir. At that time Bill Hastings asked John McVie to assist him in directing the choir. When the choir manager Frank Shandley died Bill Hastings expressed a desire to resign due to ill health himself and the choir was disbanded (June 1972).

The RBC is fondly remembered by its former members, many of whom keep in touch to this day via email.

President George Warren

George Irving Warren or "Mr. Victoria" as he was widely known, was born in San Francisco on Valentine's Day, 1887. He came to Victoria in 1912 and immediately started what was to become a very successful insurance business. He became, however, much better known for his work for the tourist industry as managing secretary of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce and the Commissioner of the Victoria and Island Publicity Bureau. He fathered the slogan "Follow the Birds to Victoria"!

In the early twenties, only about 400 cars visited Victoria. No wonder, for to come here they had to have their windshields removed and their tires deflated among other 'safety procedures'. Mr. Warren arranged for the first car ferry, the *Harvester King* between Anacortes and Sidney, later followed by the *Gleaner* on the same run. He built up the automobile tourist business to be one of Victoria's biggest moneymakers.

In addition to Rotary and the Chamber of Commerce Mr. Warren served in a large number of other organizations. He served a term as potentate of Gizeh Temple, and was a member of many athletic organizations. He was quite proud of his initiation into the Coos Bay Pirates: a party of swashbucklers invaded a banquet he attended and "lifted me on a table and proceeded to batter me up". They removed his shoes and his coat and went at him with a small, sharp knife. When it was all over he possessed a membership card in the Coos Bay Pirates, signed with his own blood.

He was married to Eva and had two sons Robert and George. He died in 1964.

John Gough was born on January 20, 1903 in Leeds, Yorkshire. He married Dorothy Mooney Morton and together they had a son and a daughter. John attended Victoria College at the university level at Craigdarroch Castle.

As a teacher, school administrator and author of several text books, Mr. Gough was known as "Mr. Education" in Greater Victoria for many years. He taught at Sir James Douglas School from

1923-27, Vic High 1928-31, the Normal School in 1942 and was the" Satanic Municipal School Inspector" from 1942-46. When area schools were organized into a school district, John became the District Superintendent of Schools. He held this position until 1966 when he resigned two years short of retirement over a policy clash with the Victoria School Board. John Gough died on February 13, 1980.

John Thomas (Jack) Cruise was born in Dauphin, Manitoba, where he received his early schooling. His family moved to Victoria in 1910. John attended Victoria High School and the University of Manitoba where he took his MD in 1931. Following graduation, John was engaged in tuberculosis research at a sanitarium, near Brandon. Three years later, he entered general practice with the San Antonia Gold Mines at Bissett, Manitoba for another three years when his health broke.

In 1937, he entered post-graduate work in Chicago where he began his specialization in the diseases of the eye. He then undertook specialist studies at the Institute of Ophthalmology which were cut short because of WW II. He returned to Canada but was rejected for military duty. He moved to Winnipeg and became the acting head of the eye department at the University of Manitoba.

In 1946, he moved to Kelowna where he founded his own practice and became a member of the Kelowna Rotary Club. He married Claudia in Kelowna. In 1949 he returned to Victoria. He became chief of the eye clinic at the Royal Jubilee Hospital and became the Victoria representative of Operation Eyesight. He also made trips to Thailand to work in an eye clinic. John became the president of our Club in 1954, District Governor in 1961 and an RI Counselor in 1962. He died in February of 1990.

Dr. Reg Wride was born August 20, 1900 in Ontario to John Wride

Dr. Wride was a Canadian Army surgeon who came to Victoria in 1940 and entered a practice here in 1945. He eventually became chief of surgery at the Royal Jubilee Hospital. He was president of the North Pacific Surgical Association, team doctor for the WCHL Victoria Maple Leafs, a president of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club, a president of the Union Club, a president of the Rotary Club of Victoria in 1957, besides being active in Shrine and other Masonic Orders. With his support, the Rotary Club assumed sponsorship and established Goodwill Enterprises. Reg's wife's name was "Ted".

Dr. Wride died March 29, 1979.

<u>Historical Moment</u>

Goodwill Enterprises for the Handicapped by Dave Perry

Rotary International's motto" Service above self" has been the driving force and foundation attitude behind the many and varied programs initiated by the Rotary Club of Victoria. In 1957 a personal dream was fulfilled when Rotarian Fred Blakeney was able to convince fellow Rotarians of a special need he recognized in Victoria. Fred's dream and tenacity went into one of these initiatives. The end result was the development of "Goodwill Enterprises for the handicapped". This business model from a dream to reality was to assist a variety of challenges associated with disadvantaged people who were unable to cope with the rigors of everyday work. Eventually an industrial plant, offices, retail store, a kitchen, reupholstering department, a laundry, recycling of clothing and small appliance repair shop came into being at 560 Yates in 1959. In 1964-65, Goodwill moved to new facilities at the corner of Bay and Wilson. The building was constructed by Campbell Construction on land leased from the BC Government. It was named Blakenay House.

This all came into being because Rotary backed Fred and applauded his dream. The enterprise hired a group of individuals who displayed a need for training and an opportunity to work for wages thus alleviating a financial strain on the city welfare department. Eventually, Goodwill Enterprises commenced to provide job training, job placement, referrals to potential employers, client follow up and work assessment. This was all backed up by a group of professionals who associated with Fred's dream.

Over the years, Goodwill Enterprises has assisted hundreds of people to find meaningful employment by assisting them in developing their skills. Many of the clients assisted by Goodwill

are still meaningfully employed at a variety of businesses here in Victoria. This was a venture emanating because one Rotarian had a dream and put "service above self" into action. Tragically, in the mid-nineties, the BC Government Employees Union succeeded in having Goodwill certified as one of their bargaining units. This takeover was the beginning of the end. The management of Goodwill objected strenuously. The takeover brought a number of negative changes to the organization which pitted employee against employee, sabotaged goods, vehicles were deliberately damaged, work slowdowns occurred, there were back-stabbings, segregation, harassment and stress. The situation escalated such that the Board of Directors terminated the organization.

J. Maurice Green's father was born in St. Thomas, Ontario and came to Victoria in 1908. He founded the firm RA Green Lumber Company in 1912. He operated the company until 1954 when he turned it over to his sons, J. Maurice and Ralph.

One of his first tasks was the supervision of the construction of the south wing of the Empress Hotel and the noted paneling in the main dining room. Maurice was the president of RA Green Lumber Company, dealers in lumber and millwork, until the company was sold in 1967.

Maurice joined Rotary in 1951 and became President in 1958. He was the Commodore of the Royal Victoria Yacht Club and President of the Canadian Manufacturer's Association.

Tom Little was a native son, born in Victoria on June 22, 1907. He attended local schools, Victoria College, BC Normal School and UBC. He was an all-round athlete who played and coached Victoria basketball for a number of years and was part of the first city team to win the national championship when the Blue Ribbons were on top in 1933.

Destined at first for a career in medicine, Tom switched to teaching and taught at Sooke and Oaklands. Unfortunately, his health broke and he took a year's leave of absence but never went back. While convalescing, Tom started to help his father, Jimmie Little, senior partner of Little and Taylor – in the pioneer jewelry store. Roy Denny was born in New Westminster November 1909, to Arthur and Reletta Denny who arrived from England in 1895. He grew up on Foul Bay beach, first in a small cottage with no indoor plumbing or hot water, then in to a larger home which still stands today at 1963 Crescent Coad. Roy spent much of his spare time building rafts and later several boats which he cruised extensively around the Gulf Islands. He went to Margaret Jenkins and then Victoria High schools. He was an ardent world traveler, starting with family trips to England in 1920, crewing on the old Princess Elizabeth on her maiden voyage from England to Victoria, a 3000 mile bicycle trip through Europe and many other trips all over the world throughout his life. One of the highlights was spending his 70th birthday sailing a small boat across the Atlantic. He owned many boats, both sail and power, did several offshore sailing voyages and all the family learned much from his careful teaching. Roy also used his skills in the Second World War as a 1st officer on a Corvette and later a commander of a Fairmile Launch running convoys in the North Atlantic. After the war Roy returned to Victoria to run Standard Furniture with his brother Tom. He was very active in the business community, involving himself in Rotary, the Chamber of Commerce, the Union Club, Probus and the Royal Victoria Yacht Club. The two brothers ran Standard for over 30 years, building into one of Victoria's premier retail outlets with over 125 employees before retiring.

Roy's son Derek owned the company from the early 1970's. Derek was a member of our club for a few years in the '70's. Roy took up water colour painting after retiring and became very well known for his art. He was a member of the Victoria Sketch Club for over 27 years. He painted daily, his art shows drew a large crowd every time and sold out very quickly. He was passionate about his painting and felt his long life was due to keeping busy with his art.

He was always interested in good design and the two homes he had built, one art deco at 210 Denison Rd and the other a Di Castri at 3130 Midland Rd. Both were ahead of their time designwise. He also read a lot, enjoying history, sailing and discovery and would often have several books going at a time. He loved the outdoors especially anything to do with the sea Roy married Helen in 1939, had four absolutely wonderful children - Derek, Sue, Cathy and John. It was always family first with him and he was always ready to do what ever was needed to help his children succeed. He was married for 70 years and passed away just shy of his 101st birthday.

President Dr. Robert Stark

Bob was born on January 8, 1920 in Victoria. His parents were from Ruchazie, a small town outside of Glasgow in Scotland. They came to Victoria in 1910 and settled in Fairfield, where Bob grew up, attending both Sir James Douglas and Victoria High Schools. He attended Victoria College when it was housed at Craigdarroch Castle. It was there he met his future wife, Mary Wickson in 1939.

World War II interrupted most peoples' plans. Bob was commissioned to the Royal Canadian Navy in December of 1941 and was one of 10 chosen from Victoria, and one of the 90 chosen from across Canada to be the "90 day wonders" for intensive training at Royal Roads. After training, Bob was now an Acting Probationary Sub-Lieutenant, and was sent to Halifax to serve on the Suderoy VI, a wooden Norwegian whaling ship converted to be a minesweeper. He served until June of 1942, making time for a short leave to Victoria to get married in May of 1942. Bob and Mary returned to Nova Scotia. Bob then served on convoy duties and in 1943 was appointed Commander of the Suderoy VI. The ship cleared mines from Halifax harbour, and protected convoys in the North Atlantic. He was transferred to Esquimalt, and later Prince Rupert, serving in both places as a watch-keeping officer. Bob received his discharge from the Navy in October 1945.

Bob returned to University to graduate as an Osteopathic Physician, studying in Kirksville Missouri. He returned to Victoria to set up his practice, where he was regarded as a thoughtful

physician, respected by other doctors for his diagnostic prowess. He practiced for 38 years before retiring.

He believed in pubic service, and served as the President of the Art Gallery of Greater Victoria and aided the Gallery through major expansion and the addition of new galleries in the 1960's. He admitted that he knew little about art, but was adamant that it was an institution that was important in a community. He also served as President of the Rotary Club, and served for 20 years on the Board of Goodwill Enterprises, an institution that provided people with handicaps an opportunity to find fulfilling employment within their capabilities, an aim that he fully believed in. He was photographed with the Mayor and President of Goodwill – all wearing gold hard hats and operating gold painted jackhammers – at the ground breaking for Goodwill's new building. He also volunteered with fund raising for the Community Chest (later the United Way). Bob and Mary had three sons, Steven, Stuart and David. He was a 30-year member of the Victoria Golf Club and enjoyed travels to Hawaii, and fishing off Vancouver Island. He died in 1993 at the age of 73.

Historical Moment

The Rotary Anns

In 1914, Rotarians from San Francisco were headed to Houston to attend a Rotary convention. In those days, few wives attended Rotary events. Until the train stopped in Los Angeles, the only woman aboard the special train was the wife of Rotarian Bru Brunnier. AS the train picked up additional convention-bound delegates, Mrs Ann Brunnier was introduced as the Rotarian's Ann. Since the western clubs were inviting Rotarians to hold their next convention in San Francisco, a number of songs and stunts were organized which would be performed in Houston. One of the skits was a "Rotary Ann" chant. When the train arrived in Houston, one of the greeters was Guy Gundaker of Philadelphia whose wife was also named Ann.

During the arrival demonstration with the Rotary Ann chant in full voice, the two wives, Ann Brunnier and Ann Gundaker were hoisted to the men's shoulders and paraded about the hall. The term of endearment was used for all wives in attendance. Since then the term "Rotary Ann" has stuck.

Coincidentally, Guy Gundaker became President of RI in 1923 and Bru Brunnier in 1952. Thus each of the two original Rotary Anns became first ladies of RI.

Our own Rotary Anns have been instrumental in the success of the car raffle and are a vibrant and special group of ladies.

Carron Jameson was born in Victoria and spent most of his life in Oak Bay. He remembers when the Bowkers had a farm and their son ran the Oak Bay boat house. Cows roamed the fields and Indians sold salmon door to door.

Carron went to Willows School along with the race track gang. He then attended Oak Bay High School which had 150 students. He next attended Victoria College in Craigdarroch Castle and had his first meeting with Past President Bob Wallace as mathematics instructor and advisor to the student council.

After completing the two-year program at Victoria College, he went to the University of Oregon for four years studying his profession. He arrived home to Victoria to enlist in the Canadian Army and spent the next 4 1/2 years with the RCAF in BC, England and Burma.

After living out of a suitcase for 8 years, he was glad to return home to Victoria where he started his practice, joined Rotary, married, and fathered four daughters, in that order.

Feeling that life was dull and liking to talk, Caron was elected to the School Board where he served for 10 years as a Trustee and Chairman. These were constructive years with little controversy and culminated in the establishment of Camosun College.

John Cecil Rolston Lort was born in Victoria, the eldest of five children. His English-born father came to Victoria in 1907. He was an architect and worked for Samuel McLure. John's youth was spent between Victoria and Vancouver because of his father's work. He began school in Burnaby then in Victoria at Beacon Hill School, then the Collegiate School and Magee High School in Vancouver. He returned to Victoria and attended Brentwood College and UBC where he obtained a BA with honours in history. He spent one year at the University of

Washington taking a library course. In 1942, John joined the army and spent his time mainly in Ontario in the Prince of Wales Rangers. He went to England near the end of the war. In 1946 he returned to Victoria as a library research assistant. One year later he went to Ketchikan, Alaska as the librarian. Here, he drafted the Alaska Library Act. After this he had a short stint with the CBC as a speaker. In 1949 he went to Oakalla Prison as a librarian.

In 1950, John became librarian of the Vancouver Island Library at Nanaimo. Three years later, he returned to Victoria as Assistant Librarian and then as the Librarian of the Victoria Public Library.

John married Faith Elm from Oregon. He taught a Sunday School Class at St. David's Anglican Church. He was secretary and treasurer of the BC Library Association and the President of Rotary.

President Eric Dowell

Eric Dowell was born May 15, 1927 in Victoria. His father, Alf, came to Victoria from England with his family in the early 1900's. Hs father, who was a long-time member of this Club, went overseas in the Army during the Great War serving at Vimy. He returned to Victoria and started a trucking business with his brother Art. His mother Florence came from an early Victoria family making Eric a third generation Victorian. Eric's great-grandfather on his mother's side (John Cox) came to Victoria on a sailing ship and served with the Royal Engineers from 1858. His great-grandmother Minnie Gillen was from Tynemouth and came to Victoria on a "Bride Ship". They were married by Bishop Cridge.

Eric schooled at Sir James Douglas School. He and a number of his friends were introduced to sailing by a Grade 7 teacher. This started a lifetime of love with sailing and a lifetime of nautical enjoyment. It also changed his principal hobby from model aircraft building to model ship building. He joined the Royal Victoria Yacht Club.

At 14, he built his first sail boat (16 ft.) followed by a 19ft. competitive sailboat. As result of being the winning sailor in the North Pacific, he went to Miami in 1949 for the "Lightning" sailboat race. Eric excelled at academics at Vic High, Vic College and UBC in Engineering. At age 20 he joined his father's company to be close to his mother who was very sick (childhood Scarlet fever) and sadly died 3 years later. He was happy to be in Victoria to participate in local sailing. In 1921 he joined the Jr. Chamber of Commerce becoming involved in charitable work. At age 24, he married Shirley with 4 children resulting. He bought his father's half of the company (Dowell's Cartage and Storage) and a friend and longtime employee bought the other half.

In 1954 he joined Rotary where he knew most members (200 members) through helping his father in Rotary matters. Sadly, his oldest son died of Leukemia, after a long struggle, in 1968.

The Teamsters Union's annual cry for increased wages put him at a disadvantage with his nonunion competitors. The situation worsened and fearing an immediate strike, Eric sold the company in two parts. This was the end of his business.

In 1969, Eric was asked to be president of Rotary in 1970. He enjoyed the job and was very active for many years. In 1975 his father died after a round of golf. Eric bought a Shawnigan Lake property which became a 'savior' in his life with his family.

In 1973, Eric bought his first fibreglass boat sailing out of the RVYC. This was followed by a 28 ft. sailboat and a 35 ft. racing sailboat which were put in the charter fleet at RVYC (profitable). Eric raced the 35 footer in all major races in the North West. He raced in 10 Swiftsures winning in 1984. He sold all boats and bought a 41 ½ footer.

Eric's wife Shirley disagreed with his sailing and was more interested in politics, leading to a divorce. His new wife Joan enjoyed all his activities for 20 years on lengthy annual trips to New Zealand, trips to Alaska and 3-month cruises. Eric retired from his lifelong love, moving into a harbour front condo. He spends much time just walking around and viewing the harbour activities. He continues to enjoy Shawnigan for several months of the year.

Activities

Dues were raised by \$15 after considerable discussion and aggravation.

The Boys Choir had 37 members and practiced at the YMCA under Bill Hastings and accompanist Mrs. McVie. The choir performed at the T. Eaton Co. at Christmas and sang at the Duncan Club.

The "Gold Brick" Program sold tickets under authority of the Provincial Lottery Corp. The program raised \$5000 given to the White Cross Program raising the total to \$1,700 which was enough to purchase their needed premises. The remainder was disbursed as follows:

- \$250 to UVic for a scholarship
- \$250 to the Victoria Youth Council
- \$100 to Silver Threads
- \$140 to Autistic Children

The Club hosted 46 Quebec exchange students at a luncheon. A tour of the city and billeting at Oak Bay High followed.

The student exchange program was cancelled because of a lack of host parents and a general lack of enthusiasm.

Robert Thomas Duff Wallace was born at William Head on May 29, 1929. He was a graduate of Victoria High School and began his career teaching mathematics at Victoria College when it was located at Craigdarroch Castle. He remained with the college when it moved to Landsdowne and Gordon Head. In 1963 he became head of the mathematics department at UVic and later Dean of Administration. He retired in 1971 as vice-president of the university and then became its chancellor, "a strictly honorary position" which he held for the next six years.

In 1972 he was chosen Victoria Chamber of Commerce's Man of the Year. That year he also received an honourary degree of Doctor of Law at his university. In 1978 he was named Victoria's Man of the Year and in 1994 he was made a member of the Order of Canada. He was a member of the Masonic Order and was made an honourary member of our Club. He did much to promote sport in Victoria and at the university.

Through his whole life he was an active member of the United Church and it was here that he met his wife to be, Norah. Together they raised two children: Brian who became a lawyer in Vancouver and Barbara who married in Montreal. He died on April 1, 1999.

President David Hambleton

David Herbert Hambleton was born in London, England, December 18, 1932. His father, Fred Langhorne Hambleton (1895-1933) served in the Royal Naval Air Service 1914-1918. He died when David was four months old. His mother was Florence Clara (nee Wainwright 1905-1990). David attended boarding school from age of six until graduation. Because of the advent of war and consequent numerous evacuations of the school, he was unable to return to home and family for any reason until the end of the war. Despite evacuations, the school had its exciting moments...particularly during the time the school was situated under the flight path of German planes one of which once unloaded its remaining bombs over the school playing fields. He studied architecture in London in the Faculty of Architecture at Regent Street Polytechnic. now the University of Westminster. He graduated with Distinction in Design and winner of the Sir Bannister Fletcher Prize. He practiced in the office of Professor Albert E. Richardson, President of the Royal Academy of Arts and Head of the Bartlett School of Architecture, London University, specializing in the restoration and rebuilding of several historic buildings destroyed in WWII bombing including a church designed by Sir Christopher Wren. Also in the office of Sir Louis deSoisson where he worked on the famous Wellwyn Garden City as well as on historical restoration in The City of London and the West End and throughout southern England. Married in June, 1958, he immigrated to Victoria, B.C. the same month. He was blessed with the birth of five daughters all presently living within easy reach of Victoria and who together have produced six grandsons, five granddaughters and one great granddaughter, so far as of 2012. He remarried in August 1995 and gained a stepson and a daughter-in-law along with a granddaughter and a grandson.

In 1958, on arrival in Victoria, David was employed the very next day in the office of Burley and Wagg Architects. Patrick Burley and Donald Wagg were both members of the Rotary Club of

Victoria. Burley died in 1961 and David joined Donald Wagg as partner in the new firm of Wagg and Hambleton in 1966 and joined Rotary in 1968. Donald Wagg retired at 65 in 1979 and David carried on in partnership with Brian Bartle until his retirement in 2003.

The architectural output of his firm was much diversified although they did specialize in the design of general hospitals throughout BC. Other work included several churches on Vancouver Island, faculty buildings at U Vic, commercial buildings, condominiums, apartments, housing, urban design including the design of the Songhees and of several of its buildings, recreation centres, schools, banks, private houses etc.

Notable projects include the Oak Bay Marina, Holy Cross church, additions to St Patrick's church, buildings for the Faculties of Law, Business and Economics, Human and Social Development and the Clearihue Building. His firm was responsible for the complete restoration and interior design of the Crystal Garden, for the Diagnostic and Treatment Centre of the Royal Jubilee Hospital (in association with a Vancouver firm) and for the phases two and three of the Shoal Point Development.

David served on the Boards of the following bodies:

- Rotary Club of Victoria and President in 1975;
- Architectural Institute of British Columbia and President in 1975;
- Royal Architectural Institute of Canada and President in 1980;
- Norfolk House School and Chair for several years;
- Capital City Executives Association and President;
- Craigdarroch Castle Historical Museum Association and President 1989-1996;
- Rockland Neighbourhood Association; and
- The Chairmanship of the Design Panel of the City of Victoria
- and service on a variety of other City Committees

David's hobbies have included competitive long distance running in the 40-50 age category. He achieved first place finishes in many races on the Island and in the Vancouver Marathon, second and third place finishes in that same race in subsequent years as well as a first place finish in the Masters level of the BC Cross Country 10k. In addition, he enjoyed golf and membership in the Victoria Golf Club for many years. Currently he spends time cycling, walking and kayaking. He painted in water colour and oils, sculpted busts of family members and gardened. He has owned and ridden motor bikes since 1949 and presently, (in 2013) rides an 1800cc Honda Goldwing.

Jack Gregory was born in Wellington, Somerset, England on December 6, 1919. He came to BC with his family in 1926.

The beginning of his career was with the BC Provincial Police which he joined in Kelowna in 1939. He stayed with them until their dissolution in 1950, when he joined the RCMP. He was seconded to the Victoria City Police in 1963 and appointed chief constable in 1965. Jack was elected president of the Canadian Association of Chiefs of Police in 1974 - he was described as tough on crime and favouring capital punishment.

In the sixties he once gave a lecture entitled "The Law is a Haven for Hoods". Jack told the Times-Colonist in 1979 that "a policeman's authority has been corroded. Respect for the policeman has deteriorated. It is not the fault of the police. I think it is the evolution of civil liberty to the point of being detrimental to society".

Jack joined Rotary in Prince Rupert in 1959. He joined our Club in 1962 and in addition to the positions of director and president he was the District Governor in 1983-84. He was a Paul Harris Fellow, a Shriner and active in many other charitable organizations. He was predeceased by his wife Gwen and his two children Gillian and David.

He died in 2001 after a long illness.

About three years after the birth of the Rotary Club of Victoria, Henry James Linney saw the light of day in Toronto. He grew up in Riverdale Flats, now called Cabbagetown.

Jim attended Brock Avenue School and Bloor Collegiate where he was the class valedictorian. Earlier, at age ten, he sold newspapers at the corner of Bloor and Landsdowne which led to a paper route which he grew to 270 papers a day. After graduation, he attended the University of Toronto in political science and economics. In his early twenties, he worked as a stockbroker but soon landed a lifelong job with the Customs and Excise Division of Revenue Canada. He initially made \$60 per month at the port of Toronto. However, he moved up the chain becoming CEO of Customs in Toronto and finally as the Regional Director of Customs Operations of Ontario. Jim spent four years in the army in the Intelligence Corps during WWII. Among his accomplishments was the exposing of an important spy, a fact confirmed shortly thereafter by loor Gouzenko.

In 1939, Jim married Charlotte Cameron. They had three boys, 4 grandchildren, and seven great grandchildren. Upon retirement in 1974, they arrived in Victoria and built a home in North Saanich. Jim had pioneer open-heart surgery in 1976. The next 12 years were among the happiest in his life until his wife unfortunately passed away in 1988.

Jim's 40+ years in Rotary started in Toronto in a club with 400 members. He chaired a couple of committees, was a director and chaired the Information Committee for the 1962 RI Convention in Toronto. George began his sales career with the Hudson Bay Company in 1932 in the field of textile distribution.

George's true claim to fame was his ability to share his love of music. During his many years in the Rotary Club of Victoria, he started and conducted several 100-voice choir concerts. He raised over \$135,000 in three concerts. The third concert featured his very good friend, the world renowned tenor Richard Margison. As director of the Rotary Choir, he involved and inspired many of his fellow members to perform and enjoy music. He has also been a mentor to many students at the Conservatory of Music.

Institutions that have benefited from George's hard work include the Mustard Seed, the Cridge Centre for the Family, the Vancouver Island Cancer Centre, the Victoria Conservatory of Music and many others.

He was married to Gwen for 55 years until she passed away in 1998. They had three children: Chris (deceased) who was the president of Harbourside, Tom and Susan. In his spare time, George lived to sail and rose to the lofty rank of International Commodore of the International Yachting Fellowship of Rotary. He travelled the world with his darling wife promoting yachting in Rotary.

George had a dedicated love of his family, friends and Rotary, and he especially loved singing. His enthusiasm was infectious as he had a zest for life. Those who knew George Kent during his July 11 the guest speaker was Michael Hernsey, Deputy Minister of Tourism.

President Hugh Smith

Hugh was born in 1934 in London, England, where he was educated and trained as a professional engineer. He completed two years mandatory military service in the Royal Engineers before joining a consulting engineering firm in London. Hugh worked as a consulting engineer for his whole career. In 1959 he and Frances were married and a year later immigrated to Montreal where they lived for eighteen months before moving to Vancouver.

By 1967 they had four children and had built a family home near Horseshoe Bay in West Vancouver. In 1973 the company, where Hugh had become a partner, had the opportunity to open a design office in Victoria and Hugh was asked to be the partner in charge. With some reluctance he agreed to take it on for two years. At some time in the two years they changed their minds and Hugh and Frances have been in Victoria ever since, although all their children and grandchildren are now on the mainland.

In 1975 past presidents Don Wagg and David Hambleton proposed Hugh for membership of the Rotary Club of Victoria. Hugh was active on the Youth Exchange committee and Hugh and Frances hosted a number of students over the years. After a term as a vice president Hugh served as president for the 86/87 year.

Previous presidents had been very successful in expanding the membership and for the year the membership stayed at an all time high.

The club was well established in The Empress Hotel. The meetings were either held in the ballroom or in the less suitable, but luxurious, dining room. At the Christmas dinner the hotel manager, always a club member, led a parade of chefs carrying Christmas fare around the ballroom. But in1987 the hotel which had provided the land for the new conference centre, were looking to attract more conferences and tours. They were no longer interested in housing local groups with limited budgets. This problem was passed on to the next president.

The decision in a court case in California in this year challenged the men only rule of Rotary. This did not have an immediate effect but it opened the discussion and in time led to our Victoria club opening membership to women as well.

This year also saw Rotary International embark on its largest and most far reaching programme ever. Polio Plus was strongly supported at district level and the local clubs got behind it with

considerable enthusiasm. A one hundred voice choir was formed under the leadership of past president George Kent. This later led to some momentous fund raising performances.

President Jack Matvenko

Jack was born on 26 June 1928 in Togo, Saskatchewan. Both of his parents were born in Russia. His father, Carl Mifodi Matvenko, was born in Rechki, a small village north of Kharkov, Ukraine. Some of the family immigrated via London to Canada in the 1900s. His father was an officer in the Tsar's army, deserted, was taken prisoner, escaped, and came to Canada. Their homestead was taken up in1904 at Stony Creek, south of Kamsack, and a Matvenko is still farming the land. His mother Tanya Lebedoff was born in Rodinus, Tiblisi, Georgia. She emigrated to Canada with her family in 1898 via Cyprus, to Pier 1, Halifax They then moved to Winnipeg, and settled in Thunderhill, NE Saskatchewan Her father Laron worked at Cowan, Manitoba on railroad construction. The family then moved to Stony Creek, south of Kamsack, Saskatchewan, where her father built a new home and developed a farm.

In the early 20s during hard times, many of the Matvenkos moved to California and worked in orchards, and father worked for a time as a gardener at Stanford University. Jack attended school in San Francisco. They eventually moved back to Canada, and they settled in the Togo area, Saskatchewan, after purchasing land with a new home. His father became a mixed farmer and at a later date a grain farmer.

Jack had two brothers, Nick (born 1913) and Charles (born 1914), a sister Nina (born 1916), and a younger sister Jean. During the Depression in the 1930s the boys rode the rails, worked in mines and other occupations, and then settled on farms back in Togo. Some time later, Nick purchased a hotel in Weekes, Saskatchewan, and Nina and her husband ran the Togo Empress Hotel.

Jack attended Carclew School which was near Togo for grades 1 to 7, and then Togo High School for grades 8 to 12. During WW II he joined the RCAC, achieving the rank of lieutenant. Jack had many interests and activities when young – hockey. In university he played for the medical team. Throughout his early life he had many interests – radio, fretwork, management of a travelling library, marbles, cycling, stamp collecting, Indian relic collecting (stolen). In later life he enjoyed pool, curling, squash and golf. For income he trapped, dug Seneca roots, spray painted barns and granaries, and selling chicks.

Jack's interests were in medicine or chemistry. After graduation in 1947, he attended the University of Saskatchewan to obtain a BA degree which was a pre cursor to medicine. He was successful in this and was accepted into medicine. He spent two years at Saskatchewan and completed his degree at U of T graduating in 1954.

He then did a junior internship at St Michael's Hospital in Toronto, where he also worked at the Blood Bank. Here he met an RN, Anne Joan Lacey and married her. They had two children, Brian and Lynne-Mari. He decided to practice in a remote area and took a year's course in emergency medicine and surgery at Shaughnessy Hospital. He also spent one month in an obstetrical hospital to prepare himself for a heavy duty prenatal practice. The course at Shaughnessy taught him emergency medicine, anesthesia (general, spinal, subdural, epidural and block). He also took a short course in block anesthesia under Denny Moore at the Mason Clinic in Seattle.

Jack practiced in Burns Lake for ten years. The time spent in that area was interesting and also very trying. He used an aircraft in his practice. He was fortunate to meet some famous bush pilots, Jack Hodge, Bill Harrison, Dick Schreiber and Gordon Beddows, who tweaked his bush flying.

After ten years of general practice, he made the decision to specialize in ophthalmology and was accepted at the University of Saskatchewan in 1965. Unfortunately, just as he was starting, one of his employees, an RN, was in the aircraft that blew up due to a bomb in the 100 Mile House area in BC, killing all on board.

Jack set up a practice in Victoria in 1969, and also provided ophthalmic services to outlying areas in northern BC and on Saltspring Island. He travelled to the Queen Charlottes, Kitimat, Terrace and Smithers, and did most of the surgery in the Kitimat and Terrace Hospitals.

His main interests, other than medicine, have remained the same. He enjoys ham radio, and in the past did enjoy mountaineering, skiing, curling, fishing, hunting and more recently golf (not always enjoyable!). He has had an exciting and enjoyable life to date. In 2013 at age 85 Jack is semi-retired.

President David Iles

David Iles was born in Winnipeg in 1949. At the University of Manitoba, he earned a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and Philosophy in 1971. This was followed by a Diploma in Physical Therapy at the School of Medical Rehabilitation in 1974.

David moved to Victoria in 1972 working at the Gorge Hospital. He took over a private practice in 1976 and started his own practice/clinic - Foul Bay Orthopedic Physical Therapist Corporation in 1980. He did a specialty in Orthopedic Manipulative Therapy in 1982 and earned his fellowship in 1984. He earned a Master of Arts (Biomechanics) at UVic in 1988 and ten years later in 1998 he took a course in public administration (one course short of graduation).

David joined Rotary in 1981. He was the youngest member and jokingly referred to as the "token young guy". He was nominated for the Board in 1984 and lost the election (6 nominated, 4 elected). Later in the year two members resigned, so he was appointed to the Board. In 1986, he was asked by the nominating committee (under George Kent) to stand for president. He replied to George that there must be some sort of mistake. Since he had been a member, all of the presidents wore glasses, owned a boat or had grey hair. Most of them had all three but David didn't qualify in any category. In spite of this, he accepted and became president in 1988 at the age of 39. He was probably the youngest president in the 74 year history of the Club. David has been happily married since 1971 and is still (2013) practicing Physical Therapy.

Historical Moment

Women in Rotary by David Iles

In 1988, the Rotary International triennial Council on Legislation, meeting in Singapore, voted to allow all Rotary clubs to admit qualified women. This decision was driven by a Canadian initiative.

The following is a quote from the 26 January 1989 Sunshine Bulletin:

"The Board of Directors of Rotary International has ruled that Rotary clubs in Canada may admit women to membership. This decision was based on a legal opinion submitted to them by certain Canadian clubs that the male-only provision for membership conflicts with human rights legislation in this country. Accordingly, your Board of Directors will present to a special general meeting of this club, to be held during the regular luncheon meeting on Thursday, 26 February 1989, a proposal to amend our by-laws so that women may be admitted to the club." Signed by David Iles, President

During the 1988 fireside chat session, the subject of allowing women into the Club was one of the subjects. The straw vote was 76% AGAINST. However, it was necessary for the Club as a whole to formally vote on the matter. Our Club was of the age that it had a grand-fathered constitution so we had to change our constitution to be in compliance with RI.

President David Iles last speech on the subject stressed that we were the senior club on Vancouver Island and that we were a "class act", if that was the case, it was our responsibility to lead and not follow. We must set the example. The two

Nominators were former Victoria mayor Mike Young and UVic Chancellor Bob Wallace. The motion passed with only four dissenting votes. All four members came up to David afterward and apologized, saying that they were not against the proposition but felt that David had rammed it through too quickly. One of them even proposed our second woman member.

Bob Whyte was born in Victoria but undertook most of his education in Campbell River and California. In his early business career Bob worked as a securities trader in Vancouver and later a stock broker in Victoria. Bob travelled extensively and on a trip to the Caribbean he landed a job as a manager of a 500-car Hertz Rental Agency on the island of St. Thomas and in a short period turned it around from a "loser" to a sound, profit-making business.

When he returned to Canada in 1968 he went into the marine business with his father. In 1975 he left to start his own business *Bob Whyte Marine* in Sidney. Under Bob's very capable" handson" management it became the leader of the marine businesses on the Island. In a time when many marine businesses were failing, Bob's business flourished due to his perfectionist tendencies of taking care of his customers and paying attention to their special needs well after the sale. After only 6½ years of Sales and Service he retired (for the first time) at the age of 38 years.

A few years later he came out of retirement and dabbled in property development as the owner/developer of three substantial projects: A Dairy Queen, an 18-unit condominium and a nine-unit business centre.

Throughout his lifetime he made a wonderful contribution to the community. President Gus de Jardin

Gus de Jardin was born in Winnipeg in 1932. His father came from Belgium, was in the insurance business and was the Belgian Consul. His mother was the daughter of a noted Winnipeg architect. Gus attended the prestigious St John's Ravenscourt School where he was the head boy in his final year. Following this, he went to the University of Manitoba.

In 1954, Gus entered the RCAF as a pilot. He did his initial training in Centralia, Ontario on *Harvards* and earned his wings on the *T-33* jet. As he was sponsored by 402 City of Winnipeg (Aux) Squadron, upon returning home he flew the C45, T33 and the P51 Mustang, in 1957, Gus joined Trans Canada Airlines. Initially he flew the venerable *DC3* out of Toronto before moving to establish his base in Winnipeg where he moved on to the *Viscount* and *Vanguard* aircraft.

Gus was married in 1964 to Shirley Oliver. They have four children and three grandchildren. While in Winnipeg he was appointed to the boards of St. John's Ravenscourt, Balmoral Hall School and the Manitoba Motor League.

Historical Moment

Rotary House

During the early 1990's, the Rotary Club of Victoria set out on a mission to complete a major charitable project to benefit Victoria. After much studying and consideration, the Club decided what was to become Rotary House. The result was a 41-unit building created to provide affordable housing in the central Victoria area.

There were many people involved in the planning, construction and management of the project. The management of Rotary House was undertaken by a Board of Directors all of whom were members of the Rotary Club of Victoria. The initial planning included the site selection, city approval, selection of a contractor, government funding and subsidization by CMHC. The principals initially were Bill Milne, Bob Whyte and Peter Lewis. Peter Lewis became the leader of the project.

To legally oversee the project, the Club established a society (2 October 91) called the Rotary Club of Victoria Housing Society. Peter Lewis was the first Chairman of the society. There were about 25 Rotarians deeply involved in the project.

At first, the project proceeded on schedule but in September 1992, the contractor went out of business. After much scrambling and aggravation, the project proceeded. Rod Skillings, the chairman of the Building Committee, spent almost every day at the site. After a tremendous effort, the building was completed at the 11th hour. Rotary House was officially opened 18 June 1993 by the Honourable David Lam, the Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia.

The Housing Society ran Rotary House for more than ten years. The actual Board changed slightly every AGM. The first Board in 1993 consisted of:

Space does not permit the listing of all Boards. However, the principals of the last Board (2005) consisted of:

During the 2005-06 timeframe the Club was leaning towards getting out of the building rental and management business. On 18 May 2006 a special meeting of the Rotary Club of Victoria Housing Society was chaired by Peter Norman to approve the turning over of Rotary House to the Capital Regional Housing Corporation. The entire activity was fully negotiated with Peter Norman taking the lead. The name of Rotary House would be retained. The current Board of the Rotary Club of Victoria Housing Society has put the House back on its feet and revamped the administration. The entire operation is in such good shape, due in large part to the efforts of Don Lovo and Gus de Jardin that it could be easily turned over to another organization retaining the Club's image. Peter Lewis presented the motion with Jim Cutt seconding. The motion passed.

President Donald Stuart McDonald

Don was born on the 10th of May 1937 in Chatham, Ontario to Edwin and Leona MacDonald. He was the oldest of five children (4 boys and 1 girl) and attended both Public and High School in Chatham. He left high school after completing the 11th grade and joined the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) in 1956. After completing basic and Air Force Police training, he was transferred to RCAF Number 1 Fighter Wing, Marville France. While stationed in France he met and married Maria C.J. MacDonald (nee VanHorsigh) on 26 February 1960. She was also an RCAF member. He was promoted Corporal and transferred to RCAF Station Falconbridge, Ont. They had three children, Katheryn, David and Ruthann.

After he was posted to CFS Baldy Hughes, BC he was transferred to RCAF Station North Bay, Ontario in 1966 and while stationed there completed his Junior and Senior Matriculation by night school. In 1972 he was commissioned from the rank of Sgt to Lieutenant and over the course of the next twenty years until his retirement in 1992, he rose from the rank of Lieutenant to Major (Lieutenant Commander "Navy"). Over the course of his 36 year career with the RCAF and later with the Royal Canadian Navy he had 12 transfers mainly in Europe, Ontario, and British Columbia. Rear Admiral Robert D Yanow was born in Saskatoon on 4 February, 1933. He is married to Valda Elizabeth Sisson of Victoria, and has two children. Rear Admiral Yanow commenced his naval career as a Sea Cadet in 1945, attending the Royal Roads Military College in 1951 and later graduating from the University of Saskatchewan in 1956. From 1951 to 1960, he served in minesweepers and frigates and in 1960, he was appointed to the Weapons Specialist course at the Fleet School, Halifax. On completion of this course in 1961, he was appointed Weapons Officer, HMCS COLUMBIA, and in 1963 he joined the staff of the Flag Officer Atlantic Coast, as the Staff Officer Anti-Submarine Equipment Trials. In 1965, on promotion to Lieutenant-Commander, he was appointed to the Operational Evaluation Group, HMS SEA EAGLE, Londonderry, Northern Ireland. During this appointment he was seconded to the staff of the Flag Officer Second-in-Command Far East Fleet, serving in various British and Australian cruisers/destroyers out of Singapore.

In 1967, he was appointed Executive Officer of HMCS TERRA NOVA, and in 1969, promoted Commander and appointed in command of HMCS SAGUENAY. He was posted to the Canadian Forces Staff College in August, 1970, and on completion of this course was appointed as the Commander, Weapons Division, Canadian Forces Fleet School, Halifax. In September 1972, he commissioned and took command of HMCS ATHABASKAN, one of Canada's new DDH 280 destroyers.

STUDENT ENTREPRENEUR'S PROGRAM

The Student Entrepreneur Program provided students with real world business issues and problems for subsequent resolution. Students participate in Action Learning Teams in partnership with business people, parents and teachers, enhancing their appreciation and understanding of the business world.

The Action Learning that takes place consists of experiencing a problem, reflecting on it, developing concepts to understand it, and taking action to resolve the problem. The Program recognizes the increasing importance of entrepreneurship as a skill area and viable career option. It bridges the gap between the business and education communities through productive partnerships.

The uniqueness of the Program was such that it allows all students, regardless of their academic standing or socio-economic background, to relate this experience to their personal goals and learning plans. In 1996, the program had 156 students involved. In 1997, there were 5 secondary and 16 elementary schools in the Program with 714 students. The Rotary Club of Victoria provided financial support to the Program to the extent of \$20,000 per year for three successive years.

President Stu McGowan

Stu McGowan was born in Montreal in 1938 and spent his first ten years following his family around since his father was in the air force. His family settled in Victoria where he did the normal things for his age – scouting, church choir (until his voice broke – luckily early)), sea cadets, delivering clothing for Spencer Stores (by bicycle), navy reserve, etc. He attended 5 schools in Victoria and although he was not interested in the academic side of school, he did manage to graduate from Victoria High.

Stu joined the navy by entering le College militaire royal de St Jean. He graduated from RMC with a BSc. After completion of pilot training, his first operational tour was with VS-880, based at HMCS Shearwater, flying the Tracker aircraft. He spent most of the next ten years serving at sea in HMC Ships BONAVENTURE, OTTAWA (in which he earned a Bridge Watch keeping Certificate), MARGAREE and ASSINIBOINE. His second major aircraft type was the venerable Sea King which he flew in the 60's.

Stu married the former Paddy Johnston in 1962. They have two sons and two grandsons. After a year attending army staff college, he had a variety of employments including project officer at the US Navy Air Development Center in Philadelphia working on the USN Sea King replacement aircraft, Commanding Officer 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron in Edmonton (army helicopters supporting 1CBG), Deputy Commander Air Reserve Group, Base Commander CFB Winnipeg, deputy project manager of the Canadian Sea King replacement program (chairman of the committee which selected the EH-101 which was cancelled by the Chretien government) and Commander Army Aviation (as a brigadier-general). Stu completed his 40-year career in the NORAD (North American Aerospace Defence) system. He first served in Colorado Springs as a command director in Cheyenne Mountain missile warning center (during the Gulf War). His last posting was deputy commander of the Alaskan NORAD Region based in Anchorage Alaska.

Upon retirement from the military, Stu and Paddy moved to Victoria. Stu got involved in a number of non-paying activities – Commonwealth Games (chief of security at Centennial Stadium), Air Force Officer's Assoc (president), St John Ambulance (chairman), Board of Governors Commissionaires, Rotary (president), Royal United Services Institute, Vancouver Island RMC Ex-Cadet Club and the Naval Officers Association. Historical Moment

THE CROSSLEYS

The Crossleys were both born in the UK in 1938. Pat was born in west London, lived in Ealing, and attended Haberdashers' Askes School. Rod was born in Rochdale, grew up in Lancashire; attended Todmorden Grammar School and moved to Southampton to attend Eastleigh High School. Rod and Pat both attended the University of Southampton where they met. He obtained a degree in aeronautical engineering and she a degree in Honours French and German. Rod then worked for Folland Aircraft in Hamble, Hampshire while Pat commenced a career in teaching.

The Crossleys were married in 1961 and raised three children. In 1962 Rod attended the Cranfield Institute of Technology for a master's degree in automatic control systems. They moved to Montreal in 1964 where Pat taught at Chomedey High School. This was followed in 1968 by two years in Philadelphia where Rod worked for GE in the missile and space field from 1966 to 68. Pat received a master's degree from McGill in 1972.

In 1982 they both moved to Baden-Soellingen, where Pat became the principal in the DND school while Rod worked for Hi-Tech Entwicklung in Karlsruihe. In 1987 they returned to Montreal where Pat was the principal of a French first language school. In 1988 they moved to Vancouver where Pat obtained employment with the Vancouver School Board as principal of French language immersion while Ron worked in software development for Alcatel. In 1997 Pat and Rod Crossley retired to Victoria.

In 2001, after full professional careers and in their early sixties, Pat and Rod changed their lives dramatically. Under the auspices of the Canadian Harambee Education Society, they commenced many years of humanitarian support of the residents of the region surrounding Maseno in north Kenya. They commenced a life of six months in Kenya and six months in Victoria. Pat was commissioned by Christ Church Cathedral in Victoria which enabled her to become the Education Secretary for the Diocese in Maseno which opened many doors for her to obtain local support. Their work was all encompassing: water projects including the construction of wells, literacy projects in schools, leadership training for school principals, and on and on. The list of areas of personal support and assistance is somewhat endless. They are outstanding Canadian ambassadors as well as encouraging dozens of other Canadians to become involved in helping and supporting families and children in Africa.

The Crossley's personal expenses are all covered by themselves. There is no financial remuneration for their work. Funding for projects is made possible by donation and a number of major matching grants from Rotary International (the largest has been \$35,000). Control of all funding is by the Crossleys and the local Rotary Club to ensure that it is spent properly. The Crossleys have started their own Canadian Foundation called TEMBO (Teaching-Empowering-Mentoring, and Building Opportunities) www.tembokenya.org.

Pat and Rod Crossley have now devoted 12 years (2013) to help hundreds of Africans in the region of Maseno.

Allan is a Chartered Accountant by profession and is the managing partner of Norgaard Neale Camden Chartered Accountants. He joined the Rotary Club of Victoria in November, 1989 and served as the Club's Treasurer from 1995 to 2002, when he became President. Allan also spent many years as the Chair of the Club's youth programs, including Interact, Rotaract, and the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA). He and his wife, Janet, also participated on several occasions as host parents for our Youth Exchange Program. In addition to his contributions to Rotary, Allan was very active in minor hockey in Victoria. He coached at many levels for more than twenty years. In the year 2000, Allan was named BC's "Coach of the Year" by the BC Amateur Hockey Association. In 2001, he was named Victoria's "Sports Person of the Year" in recognition of his contributions to Victoria's youth. In 2007, Allan joined the Victoria Advisory Board for the Salvation Army. For 15 years, he also served as a volunteer on the Government Affairs Advisory Committee and the Impact CA Committee for the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants. These programs consulted with the federal government on budget and other matters. Both groups raised the profile of the profession among senior bureaucrats and cabinet ministers. Before moving to Victoria, Allan chaired the professional section of the United Way Campaign in Winnipeg. In 2009, Allan was elected to the Fellowship of Chartered Accountants (FCA). The FCA

designation is awarded to individuals whose service to the profession and the community has brought honour to the profession.

Allan was born and raised in Winnipeg. He is married to Janet and they are now "empty nesters"

having raised their two children, Heather, and David. They are now meeting their latest challenge as grandparents.

Past President Wayne Morson completed the mammoth task of rewriting our constitution and bylaws. He reviewed, revised, and rewrote the entire document so that it would conform to the Society Act of BC and the new RI Guidelines..

The Club also acted as a co-sponsor of the new West Shore Club.

My name is Allan Neale and, for the past twenty years, I have been one of Stu McGowan's colleagues in the Rotary Club of Victoria. Our club recently celebrated 100 years of service to Victoria and our members are well represented here today as are many of our colleagues from other Rotary Clubs.

Stu has been a mentor to a great many of us in Rotary over the years, **nobody** more than me. So I'm going to **start** and **finish** with the same thought:

I read an article once about the jazz musician Dizzy Gillespie who was asked to what extent he had been influenced by Louis Armstrong. He summed it up in four words. He said, "No him, no me." Our motto at Rotary is "Service Above Self". No one epitomized this ideal of service more than Stu McGowan. I couldn't **begin** to list all his accomplishments in Rotary in the short time allotted to me today. His latest project – one that required hundreds of hours in the Victoria Archives and countless interviews with past presidents and others -- was to write a complete 100-year history of our club's service to Victoria.

People like Stu McGowan don't happen by accident.

I didn't know his parents, Mac and Muffet McGowan, but everyone tells me that they were **devoted** to community service and that they encouraged the **ideal** of service in their own children. Many of you know that Stu had a flag pole in his yard. He flew whatever national flag was appropriate to the day in question. For example, on July 4, he would fly the American flag. If he had visitors from Switzerland, he would fly the Swiss flag, and so on.

His **parents** also had a flag pole in **their** front yard and so did his **grandparents**. Tour buses used to go by Mac and Muffet's house and challenge the tourists to identify what flag was flying that particular day.

Stu's parents would have been proud to see how their son honoured their ideals and their memory in the manner in which he lived his own life.

In Rotary, Stu had a **particular** influence over our Rotary Exchange Students who have come to us over the years mostly from Europe. He used his encyclopedic knowledge of Victoria to show them every sight in town. **Sometimes** on the **same day**.

He taught them how to barbeque ham, how to carve it, and how to serve it. He supervised and supported their activities whether it was speed skating, curling, or sailing.

He **really** supervised their haircuts. When one young man's hair had gone out of control, Stu looked at him one day and said, "You've got **one week**." It was gone the **next day**.

Many of these students have come back to Victoria as adults so that they could introduce their new fiancées to Stu and Paddy; they invited Stu and Paddy to Europe to attend their weddings; and every Christmas, Stu and Paddy received cards and letters from all over the world. Stu's spirit will live on in them long after we're all gone so you never know where his influence will end.

Those of you who ever attended an evening party at the McGowan's will know that Stu had a **unique** tradition of how to let the guests know that he'd had **enough** of them and it was time for them all to **leave**. He would play **Rule Britannia** at maximum volume on the stereo and the tradition was that, at the end of the song, everyone had to be **gone**.

We once had a Hungarian exchange student and Stu was holding a dinner in his honour prior to his return to Hungary. That day, as you might expect, Stu was flying the Hungarian flag. As it happened, there was a lady living way down the street who came from Hungary. She drove up and down the street trying to decide what to make of this Hungarian flag and, finally, she couldn't stand it anymore so she knocked on the door to find out what was going on. Stu ended up inviting her to the dinner and she brought a home-made Hungarian goulash.

Everything was going well until **Rule Britannia** came on at about 9 o'clock and I had to explain the tradition to this bewildered woman, "OK, we have to be **gone** by the end of the song." I then watched her scrambling **frantically** to reclaim her **goulash** dish within the allotted time. I'm quite sure that Stu never heard from her again.

In his spare time, Stu was a captain on the Harbour Ferries and, every Sunday morning in the Inner Harbour, he was the lead "ballerina" in the Harbour Ferries Ballet to the music of the Blue Danube

Waltz. So we had a **Brigadier General** leading the ferry ballet. This could only happen in Canada. In addition to Rotary, Stu also served other organizations such as the Commonwealth Games Society, St Johns Ambulance, and the Commissionaires. He even served as the Chairman of the Air Force Officers Association, an organization whose membership included his **mother**, Muffet. She used to go to the meetings and say, "Mr. Chairman. That is **not** how it's done."

I'm not sure if that's where it started, and I probably shouldn't say this, but, other than Paddy, Stu didn't really "get" women at all. It's not that he considered men **superior**, ...exactly. But he definitely shared the view of Professor Henry Higgins who wondered aloud: "Why can't ...a **woman...** be more... like a **man**? Men are such **decent** chaps."

With Paddy though, it was different. Stu and Paddy had a **real life** 50-year Love Story that most people could only **dream** about, let along experience. Their devotion to each other is an inspiration to us all. Paddy supported Stu's efforts in all his roles **including** Rotary and Stu supported Paddy's leadership of organizations such as the Canadian Federation of University Women, another group that is well represented here today.

Back in the nineties, Stu "**persuaded**" me to be the Treasurer of the Rotary Club. "**Ordered**" would have been more like it. He used to have breakfast meetings to discuss Rotary matters. His telephone conversations with the members of the Executive were **legendary**. I could say the entire conversation before it even started.

"Hi, Allan? Stu. Thirty seconds. Breakfast tomorrow. O-Seven-Hundred Hours. White Spot. Bye." Stu was very generous giving recognition to others. He even started our practice of awarding Presidential Citations to deserving members. But he **hated** recognition for himself. I'm expecting any moment to hear **Rule Britannia** coming down from the rafters.

He even recognized **my** efforts now and then although, at first, I wasn't always sure whether he was complimenting me or not. Here's an example. This is a thank you letter he wrote to me 15 years ago about my work as the Treasurer. Tell me what you make of this: "Dear Allan,

I'm writing to thank you for all your efforts as Treasurer this year. You have managed our club finances in a **mind-boggling** fashion. "You also have a pleasant manner and a dry sense of humour that most people **miss**." He then concluded with "Bravo Zulu", Stu.

I had no idea what Bravo Zulu meant so I had to look it up. It's a military expression meaning, "Well Done." I learned over the years that a "Bravo Zulu" from Stu was the highest compliment you could get.

In the course of his life, Stu and Paddy met Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, Pope John Paul II, and countless dignitaries.

He won the respect, admiration, and love of his many friends and colleagues.

He lived a life that greatly honoured the memory and ideals of his remarkable parents.

He had the devotion of his sons, Blair and Bryce, his grandchildren, Draeven, Carly, and Ryan; and the everlasting love of his beautiful bride, Paddy.

If we consider these things to be things of **beauty**, then Stu's life was truly a **work of art**. In the famous words of William Butler Yeats:

"Think where man's glory most begins and ends, And say that **MY** glory was I had **such friends**." As long as I live, I will forever consider it an honour and a privilege to have been Stu's friend. "No **him**, no **me**."

And I've always wanted to tell Stu, "Bravo Zulu".

President Jim Cutt

While normally we would prepare a profile such as this at the beginning of a president's term, in President Jim's case we found a person who is never short for a comment or two coupled with the odd witticism but is somewhat reluctant to talk about his own life. To quote Jim, "like Mr. Atlee" I am a modest man because I have a great deal to be modest about.

Jim was born in Edinburgh in 1937 and following his schooling and university training spent 50 years in the academic field instructing and teaching many thousands of eager and as he says "not so eager": students. His best subjects in school, oddly enough, were English and French. He survived math and science, leaving no trace. In university his studies revolved around Economics and Law. He obtained his MA degree from the University of Edinburgh in 1960 before heading off to the University of Toronto for graduate work. He made two trips to India of six months each while studying for his PhD which he received in 1966 with his thesis titled "Taxation and Economic Development in India". He was granted an Honourary Chartered Accountant designation in 1993.

Jim spent many of his early years as an instructor, lecturer, assistant professor and associate professor at York University in Toronto followed by a six-year term as Professor at the Australian National University. He then seized an opportunity to come to Victoria as a full professor in the School of Public Administration and after a number of years as Acting Director of that department became Director in 1984, a post he held until his retirement in 2002.

Jim is skilled in languages and has a Churchilian command of the English. In addition to his native Scottish, English and French, he has a smattering of Hindu (from student days) as well as Cantonese, the latter learned while on summer assignments to Hong Kong.

Jim has always been a prolific writer and during the years he has published numerous articles on taxation, economic restructuring, government spending, etc. In fact, his CV lists over 150 submissions. Many of his articles have appeared in local and national newspapers.

On a more personal note Jim met his wife Gwen who is from Toronto while he was first studying at U of T and she was studying nursing. Jim could not believe his good luck in Toronto where he obtained not only his major degrees but a wife and a good job as well. No wonder Scotland was left behind! The couple has three children and a number of grandchildren.

Jim has always believed in giving back to the community and has devoted many hours of volunteer time to some 24 organizations he has recently belonged to, both professionally and community related. He can be justifiably proud of being a board member of the United Way of Greater Victoria for 19 years, during which time he served as president 1989-90 and 2002-03.

Alexander Leonard (Sandy) Peel was born in Quesnel but moved to West Vancouver at an early age where he received his schooling – he was a good student with his favourite subjects being woodworking, metalworking and English literature.

Sandy married his wife Marilyn who hails from Nelson. They have three daughters. Marilyn was always a strong supporter of Sandy as he continued his advanced education and then his business career all of which involved numerous moves and upheavals in the household. In 1959 Sandy received a BCom in transportation leading to a job as an economist with the CNR in Montreal from 1959-62. He then took a senior position with a large firm in Oakland from 1962-65 when he attended the University of California receiving an MBA specializing in finance, transportation and budget control. ROTARY WELCOME GARDEN

In 2004, a number of members of the Club, led by President-Elect Sandy Peel, decided that a major project/gift to the City of Victoria would be most appropriate to recognize the 100th anniversary of Rotary International.

A committee was struck including Chairman Sandy Peel, Norm Bradshaw, Frank Cappello, Tony Isenegger, Norma Friedman, Don Lovo, and Bill Morley.

A period of intense planning and decision-making ensued with a number of possibilities tabled. These ideas included most notably:

An avenue of trees at Ogden Point A welcome garden at Ogden Point

A Rotary-sponsored reading room at the library A Rotary-sponsored move of Silver Threads to the Bay building

A number of significant meetings with civic officials were held leading up to a final decision on the project. The officials involved included:

The Greater Victoria Harbour Authority Westcan Terminals The Ogden Point Enhancement Society Tourism Victoria Alan Lowe, Mayor of Victoria Butchart Gardens The Provincial Capital Commission

One can easily see that a tremendous amount of time and effort was put into the planning of the project. The final decision was to build a welcome garden at the south entrance to the Ogden Point Marine Terminal on Dallas Road. The Garden was designed to provide a year-round "WELCOME" to passengers of a large number of cruise ships visiting Victoria each year. All associated organizations agreed to this \$200,000 project and gave support. The project was directed by President Sandy Peel and his committee with specific support from many:

- The Butchart Gardens donated all plants and their crew did the planting.
- The City of Victoria donated one of their classic lamp standards.
- The Greater Victoria Harbour Authority ensured that the Garden would fit into their future plans.
- Westcan provided a new directional sign.
- The Provincial Capital Commission donated the fountain from the Crystal Gardens to be used as a central feature of the Welcome Garden.
- Kenetic Construction was involved in the construction work.

The Rotary Welcome Garden was unveiled in April of 2005 with President Sandy Peel as the Master of Ceremonies. All involved organizations were present including the Captain of the year's first cruise ship.

President Terry Jones

Terence Stanford E. Jones was born of British parents in India, in the dying days of the British Raj.

He attended school in London England until he was a teenager then immigrated to Canada. He obtained a BA (honours) and Masters in history at the University of Waterloo. After completing his university studies, he took two momentous steps: he got married to Dawn Campbell; he joined the Canadian Foreign Service.

In the Foreign Service he served at six posts and was accredited to eight others, from Madagascar to Greenland, from Denmark to Belize, from Benin to Australia.

He became fascinated with Africa and served there twice, in Accra, Ghana, where he was acting High Commissioner during the Rawlings' coup, and in Dar el Salaam, Tanzania, from where he covered Mauritius, Madagascar and the Seychelles. From Dar he also covered the Rwanda war, the Arusha peace talks and the subsequent Rwanda genocide.

His last assignment was in headquarters in Ottawa, where he was head of the Lusiphone section in the African bureau, working closely with Canada's office to the United Nations while Canada was on the UN Security Council, and worked on such issues as "conflict diamonds" and Angola sanctions.

After 36 years in the Foreign Service and four successive Ottawa winters, he retired to Victoria where their daughter Kari and family live.

Historical Moment

POLIO PLUS by Joan Toone

My husband Terry is a Rotarian and I was thrilled when they took on the task of immunizing the children of the world against poliomyelitis. I knew this devastating illness all too well as I was paralyzed by polio in 1951 when I was just seven years. I was first asked to speak to a Rotary club about my polio experience and its aftereffects – Post Polio Syndrome in 1999 and subsequently invited to several clubs over the next few years. In 2007 I had the honour of speaking at the Rotary concert to raise funds for Polio Plus. This presented an opportunity to tell the story of polio and to publicly thank Rotarians for their tremendous work through their Polio Plus Program. In the ensuing years I have had the good fortune to speak at training seminars, conferences, fundraisers, Rotaract and Interact groups and to many clubs in numerous Rotary Districts. Each time I get to meet my heroes – Rotarians. Each time I also get to hear someone's story of someone they knew who had polio or that they had polio themselves. For the majority of Rotarians however their passion about Polio Plus is "doing the right thing – doing good in the world". I have tremendous respect for the principles of Rotary and for Rotarians.

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation gave \$355 million US to Rotary and challenged them to match \$200 million by June of 2012. Rotarians did just that in Jan. of 2012 with \$202,600,037.25. Before Rotary began the Polio Plus Program over 1,000 children were paralyzed every day and since that time over 8,000,000 have been protected from paralysis. Rotarians do not just raise money; they travel to infected countries and give those immunizations themselves. I have spoken to many Rotarians who have attended NIDs and their commitment and compassion fill me with awe. If my speaking about polio has helped Rotarians in some small way I am truly honoured. I am proud of the recognition I have received from Rotary – a Paul Harris from District 5020, a President's Commendation from the Rotary Club of Victoria. Terry and I have been awarded the Rotary Foundation District Service Award twice. We are humbled by this acknowledgement as we consider it our privilege to work for Rotary and Polio Plus. Rotarians are amazingly capable of "getting the job done" and I have no doubt the eradication of polio will be achieved as well. I am most appreciative of the opportunity to be a part of the history of the Rotary Club of Victoria.

President Peter Norman

Peter Joseph Norman was born in Liverpool, England on July 2nd 1941 to Sarah Mabel Norman, a fashion buyer and homemaker. His father, Harold Michael Francis Norman was by that time overseas in the Royal Artillery on anti aircraft duty.

Peter spent his early years in Anfield near the hallowed ground of Liverpool FC. He attended initially St. Francis de Salles primary and then went on to St. Francis Xavier prep and grammar schools. His sports were football (soccer) and cricket.

During a brief banking career with Barclay's his only accomplishment was hiring the then "Silver" Beatles for an annual bank dinner dance during intermission. He briefly read law at the university but on a 1959 summer sailing holiday found the exotic Isles of Sicily and moved there to farm daffodils for the winter markets.

For adventure he moved to Canada and arrived on the day John Kennedy was shot. Starting in Ontario he travelled through the Maritimes and the "Boston states" and finally in 1965 on the new but still graveled Trans Canada Highway to British Columbia.

In Vancouver, Kamloops and Cranbrook he was involved in the forest industry with Laurentide Industrial Finance Corporation at an exciting time when the industry was moving to sustained yield harvesting centered on pulp mills.

In 1969 in Cranbrook in the Rocky Mountains he met Dana and they lived the ideal small town life for thirty years with the house, the yard, the pool, the three children, the dog, the camping vacations and all.

They had changed to Real Estate in 1973 and had their own successful company until the hard times in 1986 saw Peter change to government service in BC Lands. There Peter was involved in the early development of Ski areas that are now huge and famous: Panorama, Kimberley North Star, Fernie Snow Valley, Red Mountain, and Golden Kicking Horse.

After years of community service in Kinsmen at age 40, as was the custom in Cranbrook, Peter was invited into Rotary and Dana into Rotary Anns and they were joint presidents in 1993. When they moved to Victoria prior to retirement they kept their Rotary allegiance and were joint presidents again in 2008-2009.
