We started this month with Mary Budke telling us the different programs available at the Boy's and Girl's Club. For many of us, we never realized what they provided.



Barbara Hughes is the widow of Harry Hughes longtime member and Treasurer of our club.

The annual Harry Hughes Dictionary Project began in 2000 after Mr. Hughes' passing. Each year since, the Club has awarded every 4th Grade student in Sequim their own new hardbound dictionary. These valuable teaching



tools have been gradually replaced with personal tablets and laptop computers. Because of this transition in teaching venues, the Club has decided to take an objective look at the

effectiveness of this Youth Services outreach. In the process, Club President Bob contacted Jodi Olson of the Sequim Education Foundation to investigate available options.

He discovered SEF has a long standing and very effective Teacher Grants Program. Each year, teachers present requests to the Foundation to fund cutting edge projects and equipment for their classrooms not included in the school budget. Donors are able to select grants from the list they would like to help fund. These programs have proven to be most effective in helping the most children in our schools. Programs include such simple things a day trips to Seattle museums to our exotic student-teacher interactive technologies.

Our club has decided to join Sequim Education Foundation by helping to fund some of these Teacher Grant requests each year. This will allow the Harry Hughes Memorial Fund to carry on as very relevant Youth Services outreach.

SERVICE ABOVE SELF

History of Rotary Official Mottoes

Rotary's official mottoes, Service Above Self and One Profits Most Who Serves Best, trace back to the early days of the organization.

In 1911, He Profits Most Who Serves Best was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon. It was adapted from a speech made by Rotarian Arthur Frederick Sheldon to the first convention, held in Chicago the previous year. Sheldon declared that "only the science of right conduct toward others pays. Business is the science of human services. He profits most who serves his fellows best."

The Portland convention also inspired the motto **Service Above Self**. During a convention outing on the Columbia River, Ben Collins, president of the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, talked with Seattle Rotarian J.E. Pinkham about the proper way to organize a Rotary club, offering the principle his club had adopted: Service, Not Self. Pinkham invited Paul P. Harris, who also was on the boat trip, to join their conversation. Harris asked Collins to address the convention, and the phrase Service, Not Self was met with great enthusiasm.

At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mot-toes of Rotary: He Profits Most Who Serves Best and Service Above Self. The 1989 Council Legislation established Service Above Self as the principal motto of Rotary, because it best conveys the philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. He Profits Most Who Serves Best was modified by the 2004 Council to They Profit Most Who Serve Best and by the 2010 Council to its current wording, One Profits Most Who Serves Best.
