KENT HOJEM (Oct. 1) Washington State Fair

Highlights from this year's fair:

• The atmosphere was electric. Sept. 7 in particular - the biggest electrical storm ever seen at the fair. The rodeo was cut short as was the concert and the fair closed early. There were about 80,000 in the fairgrounds when it was canceled. Scone sales skyrocketed that night. Social media was the primary means of communication.

· Total attendance was off a couple of percentage points. The bad weather on strategic days played a role. However, there were still over 1 million who came. It's the largest attended event in the entire Northwest.

.• People are spending more money since the fair rebranded in 2012 to "Washington State Fair" from "The Puyallup Fair." The fair has attempted to increase the things to do and see which hopefully reduces the lines and allows more people to spend more money. · The fair posted a lot of social media highlights.

Rotary members heard the latest school construction news from Marina Tanay, Capital Projects Manager with Sumner-Bonney Lake School District. Marina highlighted seven construction projects:

Tehaleh Heights Elementary – Built with an eye to STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math).

Bonney Lake High School Performing Arts Center – Ribbon-cutting ceremony was Sept. 25. Emerald Hills Elementary - This building will be a reflection of the community. Marina loves the lobby area as it is very big and reflective of the area. STEM is also a focus in this school which is why it has a rain garden.

Sumner Early Learning Center – Just opened this fall. The space is inviting for parents and children as this is a transition period for children who normally stay at home and now go to school. It also has a covered indoor play area (as well as an outside play area).

Sumner High School - Early stages of building new buildings — the picture/slide is only a vague representation of various additional buildings in the plans.

Lakeridge Middle School – The grandstand was re-purposed from the high school. The modern lighting is also a plus.

The Pierce County Library System is asking for advice and ideas about the feasibility and funding for a new Sumner library, located on Main Street across from Fred Meyer. The library levy that passed has been in effect starting in 2019. The levy covers increased operating costs to keep up with inflation with the rest saved for "sustainability" projects including new libraries like the one proposed for Sumner. The library system is currently surveying and gathering feedback in the Sumner community. Sumner has had a library for 95 years; the current building which has housed the library since the 1970s is old and failing. Library space could grow in new Main Street location from under 12k sq/ft to about 18k sq/ft.
