She said the District is under a lot of pressure because schools are the heart of the community, and "we are the trusted lifeline for thousands of families." She said the district has been working hard from "day one" to design

Dr. Dent started her Zoom meeting appearance by saying that the



She said the District has five priorities during this challenging time: 1. Students Meals - Many students rely on daily meals provided at their schools. During the school closures the district has set up five locations in Sumner-Bonney Lake community where kids can go for lunches. As of April 28 they had provided 80,000 meals.

2. Childcare - The District has been providing childcare to medical workers and members of

- the military. 3. Learning opportunities — The District has developed online resources and given teach-
- ers examples of teaching online. Dr. Dent said their success in doing this is testament to the teachers' talent.
- 4. Provide meaningful work and professional development. All district staff members are still employed and working.
- 5. Graduation and seniors Dr. Dent said they want to mark sure that seniors are honored. Administrative staff has had to figure out how to do grades, credits and transcript. Principals are working on scholarships and celebration. Each senior was given a yard sign that recognizes Class of 2020 seniors.

"We are holding out hope that we can do something that can really honor seniors," Dr. Dent said. "Graduation is a special ritual, a rite of passage."

In building a new form of education, while making sure that what your trying to accomplish matches your values, Dr. Dent said the District faces great challenges including:

- * Having to rely on incomplete information. * Keeping education equity at the forefront.
- * Transitioning from deeply entrenched systems overnight. * Providing students technology they need to keep learning.

She said that the great majority of students at both elementary and secondary levels are participating in online learning provided by the district. Each student should have a district-provided laptop computer, and any students who does not have a computer can get one at the district office.

She also spoke of support from the District's partners in the community such as the local fire chiefs, police chiefs, mayors and services clubs such as Rotary. "Everyone helps out. That's what makes this community special."
