

Making a Difference • It is still legal in Washington to declaw cats. It is worse than removing toenails.

• Dumb regulations — neighbor can pick up your cat and take it to the humane society and then cat owner can pay a fee to retrieve the cat. Animal welfare leadership

Our Problems • Our building. Built in the 50's and updated in the 80's. It has limitations, including no runs outside.

• Big Numbers (or animals) coming into the shelter. Goals

• Build a new center, a real campus for space for all the animals. Practical structure with space to walk dogs. Educate people. Cost to adopt an animal: \$200 or more down to \$50 depending the type, age and pedigree.
