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D5050 GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE



I am honored to write my first article as your new Rotary District 5050 Governor. During these past weeks, I have been invited to participate in the Installation of new officers for Rotary Clubs in District. My past Rotary experiences began in 1998, when I joined the Rockingham, North Carolina, Rotary Club. My late father-inlaw had been a past President of that Club. Since my initial introduction to Rotary, I have been a part of six different Clubs. In these Clubs I have had the opportunity to observe a variety of Club practices and rituals. All of these Clubs have been committed to "Service Above Self." Some have been more active in service work than others.

There are several important themes that have shaped my Rotary life.

- Clubs are the central place for Rotary. We are not a topdown organization. Rotary starts with the Club and its members. While there are several key practices that all Rotary Clubs need to follow, I firmly believe that Rotary Clubs have a great deal of autonomy in establishing bylaws that will meet the needs of its members.
- The practice of service is best achieved when Rotarians are able to get their hands dirty. This is not to say that "check writing" is not important for many Rotarians. It is. Checks written by Rotarians have produced

outstanding results locally and world-wide. Yet I have found that service work that gets our hands dirty is something in which we can often see the results of our labors. And it is this type of work that will help Rotary Clubs grow.

The theme for the 2023-34 Rotary Year is "Create Hope in the World." I will be sharing in future articles how hope can be experienced, and how we can provide hope in our Clubs, community and world.

I look forward to opportunities to meet you during the coming year. And I hope you will attend the District Installation Gathering on Sunday, July 16 at 4:00 PM at Tulip Town in Mount Vernon.

This was the First meeting of the 2023 - 2024 Rotary Year, held at the Meadow Gardens Golf Club.

WHO ARE CUB SCOUTS?



Cub Scouts are youth ages 8-10 who are curious about exploring the world around them. Cub Scouts do a little bit of everything from camping and hiking to community projects and environmental stewardship programs. Through planned adventures Cub Scouts not only grow

their skill level but also have the opportunity to personally develop in areas such as social, intellectual and leadership qualities. It's all about having fun, meeting new friends and developing selfconfidence.

A Cub Scout Section is called a "Pack" and youth within a Pack are organized into smaller teams called "Lairs". Being a Cub Scout means you are part of the planning process, deciding the types of adventures and activities you and your fellow Cub Scouts want to explore. The motto for Cub Scouts is: Do Your Best and Cub Scouts are encouraged to try new and exciting activities, including STEM projects and cultural experiences.

Scout leader **James Durrand** spoke to us briefly. The Cubs have been working towards their Seesonee Award which is the highest award a Cub can achieve in the Cub Scout Program. To earn this award, they have to complete 10 outdoor adventure skill stages, complete 15 community service hours, and complete a meaningful service project.

As part of working towards this award, the Cubs organized a fundraising event to raise money for the starfish program, by collecting money at the entrance to Fresco (which is the food store where our Rotary Club purchases the food for the Starfish Program). The cubs were therefore able to present our club with the cheque in the amount of \$810 plus a \$100 gift card in support of Starfish.



Scouts is now for both boys and girls. They meet once per week and their activities are youth driven, with help from the leaders. Their activities include hiking, outdoor activities, horseback riding, sailing, and climbing. The older scouts are raising money by selling Duck Race tickets to go to the Jamboree, that will be attended by approximate 3000 scouts. The Jamboree is held only once every four years.

There is currently a waiting list of about 45 young people wishing to get into Scouts, but more volunteers are needed to be Scout leaders. Scouting gets children away from their cell phone and computer screens and into the outdoors, and is an affordable activity.

Club Business

Ineke reported that our club has given \$40,000 to the Foodbank to be held by it towards the Starfish Program. We had money left over from last year, will receive \$135,000 from SD#42, and with donations from the public (including the funds received today from the Cub Scouts) we will have sufficient funds to carry on Starfish for the coming Rotary Year.


Eric is extremely happy to be going to Barcelona and a two-week cruise in the Mediterranean.
