Program:

An Invitation to Support Education and Literacy in Belize



Presenters:

Al Stjernegaard, past president of the Port Moody Rotary Club 2012/2013, and the past Assistant Governor 2019/2022.

Brian Wormald is past Director of Environmental Services of the Port Moody Rotary Club, and who is active in his community with numerous environment engagement groups (and he has a passion for older cars, especially Pontiac). Brian is originally from Australia, and moved to Vancouver in 2006. He has been a volunteer for most of his youth and adult life in various capacities for a wide range of organizations – in several countries.



Both Al and Brian (together with Glen Brown) spoke to us on April 11, 2023 about the Port Moody Club's international project in Belize, that started in 2018, and involved the Belize Central Prison which is run by the Belize Rotary Club. Today, they told us about, and invited us to support, a follow-up education and literacy project in Belize.

Background:

Belize is a small economically challenged country in Central America.



50% of Belize children live in poverty, facing substantial barriers to education. Education is technically free, but many costs are left for families to pay themselves, placing a huge burden on the poor. For every dollar spent by the government on schools, Belizean families spend another 90 cents. Only 45% of children attend secondary school at all. To make things even more difficult, two years of education were lost to Covid when schools were closed. Belize was impacted more than any other Caribbean country. Attempts were made to provide students with home and study alternatives, but many lack the family and financial supports to continue learning during that period. The result is that historical challenges accessing basic education and literacy have increased significantly.

Where Rotary has Succeeded:

During the Covid epidemic, the Rotary club of Belize City and the Port Moody Club obtained a Rotary Global Grant. This funded the purchase and installation of computer labs for the prison in Belize utilizing the RACHEL device. RACHEL stands for Remote Area Community Hotspot for Education and Learning, and is a portable, battery-powered device that contains copies of educational websites in off-line format that can deliver digital educational content to laptops. In September 2022 when students return to school following Covid, school-wide testing of reading levels was conducted in Belize, and testing confirmed a dramatic underperformance of student literacy relative to expected grade levels. In the spring of 2023, a RACHEL lab was established in a learning resource centre accommodating up to 15 students at a time, which enabled the school to target literacy and educational support to at-risk groups and to students with individualized learning needs. This allowed the centre to allocate limited resources to areas where the needs are most acute.

What We / They Planned to Do

The plan of the Port Moody/Belize Rotary project is to strengthen the basic education and literacy needs in Belize – to address the literacy gap arising from Covid's lost years of education, and address the historically high dropout rate by providing more students with access to technology. They can do this by providing RACHEL-based learning labs to schools lacking critical learning resources. A learning lab that each school would get includes a RACHEL server, 20 Chromebooks, headphones, a large monitor (TV screen) and a secure lock box storage unit/cart.

How our Maple Ridge Rotary Club Can Help

They expect to invest \$8,000 USD in each school to provide the technology, along with training and implementation support. Their fundraising target is \$80,000 USD which will provide learning labs to 10 schools. Funds will be raised to qualify for the Rotary Global Grant. The goal, working with the Rotary Club of Belize, is to match club contributions with district funds, and then augment the grant budget with a contribution from the World Fund (at 80% of district funds).

What this means is that \$3,500 USD raised at the club level can provide an \$8,000 USD computer lab, support and training to an impoverished school in Belize. We are invited to join in this exciting international project where all of the investigation and work has been done.

For only \$3,500 USD we can sponsor/adopt a school, or join with other clubs to support this project.

We can also travel with other Rotarians to Belize on a 7 – 10 day trip which is being planned for April or May, 2024.
