<u>Program: Andy Berrisford - disabled children international project</u> in South Africa – the Island House

#### About our speaker:

Andy Barrisford and his wife Yvonne were both born in Cape


Town, South Africa. 24 Years ago they came to Canada; and six months ago they moved to Maple Ridge. Andy is an electrical engineer where he worked for years in South Africa. Prior to "mostly retiring", he provided technical direction for the Customer and Energy Analytics team at BC Hydro in Burnaby.



Andy has a brother Michael whose wife is named Coreen Berrisford. Andy, Yvonne, Michael and Coreen were all members of the Port Moody club; but Michael and Coreen are now members of the Chilliwack Rotary club.

### Andy's Presentation:

In 2019 Andy and his brother Michael and their wives all went to South Africa, and visited the Cederberg wilderness area which is located about 300 km north of Cape Town.

After hiking in the Cederberg area for about a week, they went to St. Helena Bay where he and his brother grew up as children in the 1960s. The area is known for its fishing and fish processing factories.



While there, he went down to a building that he knew as a child to be a grocery store known as the "Bester's shop", but it was now a building with a protective fence around it. He knocked on the door and told the occupant that he had lived in the area in the 1960s, and inquired what the place was used for now. He learned that the man who now lived there with his disabled daughter was a man by the name of Jimmy Duncan, who had occupied the abandoned building and had fixed it up.

He and a small staff looks after many disabled youngsters there – approximately 14 to 15 residents – many who cannot walk and some who cannot even speak. They were just looking after the kids as best they could.



Andy decided to help them. His father had passed away and left him some money, and Andy decided to use that money for this purpose. He also asked Jimmy Duncan for a list of things which they needed, and that list included such basic items as commodes, bed screens to give the children privacy, and a mobile blood pressure machine. The cost of the items on the list came to about \$10,000 Dollars in Canadian funds.

He contacted the Rotary Club of Melkbosstrand in Cape Town, South Africa, for help, and between 2022 and 2024 had discussions about this project. They also learned of many other things that the Island House was in desperate need of, such as electricity backup. Electrical blackouts are in common in South Africa, and some of the children were on electrical machines that help them breathe – so when the power went out, the caregivers had to help the patients breathe as best they could by manual methods. They also needed help with better fencing to prevent thieves from stealing their bare necessities. With money from Rotary clubs and with the help of Global Grants, they were able to raise \$47,175 US funds. They are now in the process of getting quotes from suppliers in South Africa and when the money comes in later this year, they will be able to proceed with the purchases and installation of the new equipment and supplies.

The Island House is a safe haven for children and young people with severe disabilities ranging from cerebral palsy to Angelman syndrome.


**District Conference** in Tulalip, Washington - May 2 - 4 (our club will pay for registration fee).
