About Our Speaker

Dan represented the riding of Pitt Meadows / Maple Ridge in the House of Commons of Canada from 2015 until 2019. He was elected mayor in Maple Ridge in 2022 by over 2,000 votes more than the next highest candidate (Mike Morden). Dan was born in Montréal in 1962, and has Jewish ancestry. His parents ran a bakery and a grocery store at **Habitat 67***.

After 27 years working for various food and beverage companies, Dan settled in Maple Ridge where he opened the book cafe, called **Bean Around Books****. When elected mayor in 2022, he gave his café to the **Pathfinder Youth Centre Society** which now operate the establishment. After being sworn in as an MP, Mayor Ruimy said that his major priorities involved "homelessness, affordable housing, helping struggling seniors, and providing assistance to youth trying to find jobs".

His Presentation (in part)

Mayor Ruimy gave us an update on the plans and priorities of the City of Maple Ridge which, he said, is one of Metro Vancouver's fastest-growing communities, with a population of more than 106,000 - projected to reach 150,000 in 15 years. Mayor and council are creating the conditions for a strong, diversified, and sustainable economy. The City has approximately 33,000 dwellings, and the average age of its residents is 49 years.

The city has established an Engaged, Healthy Community Advisory Committee made up of citizens who provide strategic advice, guidance, and recommendations to Council on matters related to various areas matters such as:

- the diversity and accessibility of recreation opportunities;
- community pride and sense of belonging in the community;
- arts and culture;
- safety and well-being of residents; and
- · community engagement.

The City's Parks, Recreation and Culture Plan is being used by staff and Council to inform decision making and priority setting with the goal of providing all residents with optimal, sustainable and accessible parks, recreation and culture services.



Maple Ridge Park

Maple Ridge Park (situated on the corner of 232nd St. and 132nd Ave. and straddling the Alouette River) is one of the best parks around. Its new playground is now complete, with an official grand opening event to be held in the summer of 2025 together with the opening of the new spray/water park. New playground features include 30-foot tree house with slides, bridges, and climbing obstacles and a side-by-side zip line, and a Rubber playground safety surfacing. A new park is being planned in Silver Valley; and another ice-skating arena is planned beside the existing one in Albion

While there is some petty crime in the downtown core, Dan encouraged residents not to downplay what a great place Maple Ridge is to live in and visit. Shoplifting has been cut in half as a result of the institution of a police-walking-patrol. In 2024, on the 150th anniversary of the incorporation of Maple Ridge, more than 50,000 people came downtown to celebrate without any unsafe incidents reported. Public Safety is the number one priority for the City.

There have been complaints about the complexity and time that it takes to obtain building permits, and this is being worked on. There is now an online portal for new homes which will enable builders to upload documents to speed up the process. A Certified Professional Program offers a voluntary alternative route for obtaining building and occupancy permits for large, complex builds, helping to streamline the approval process while ensuring the highest safety standards and conformity with the British Columbia Building Code. The Program allows applicants to hire a Certified Professional (CPs) to assist with the City's building permit review and approval process. As third-party building code specialists, CPs support both the applicant and City building officials by providing impartial design review, advice and recommendations to ensure a project's design and construction comply with the Building Code and the related development permit and other relevant safety enactments. The City's Senior Building Official relies upon the CP's assurances in issuing Building Permits and Occupancy Permits for projects constructed under the CP Program, and thereby speed up the process. Applicants may opt into the program.

Dan said the City is taking a series of steps to improve the community's housing supply and affordability. The City, for instance, has a new "concierge service" to guide building applications through the process and fast-tracking approvals, and more.

93% of the city's revenue comes from taxation on private homes, which Dan says is unacceptable; the City plans to open up 600 acres that can be developed to include commercial properties.
