Installation of New Members and Rotarians

Assistant Governor **Peter Tam** assisted with the installation of four new members of our club: **Chantal Despot, Kathy Henderson, and Andy and Yvonne Berrisford**.

Chantal Despot

Chantal was sponsored by Clint, but he was unable to attend the meeting. Chantal was therefore introduced by Laurie:

"I have the privilege of introducing Chantal to you. Chantal Despot - her last name spelled d-e-s-p-o-t. To learn about Chantal, I went on the Internet and



Googled her name. The first thing that I learned is that a despot is

"a person who holds absolute power, typically one who exercises it in a cruel or oppressive way." I guess she can blame her husband Ivan for having to live with that surname. I guess we can blame her mother Michelle for Chantal's interest in Rotary. Her mom has been a member of the Haney Rotary since 2007. Rumour has it that about 15 years ago, back in 2010, Michelle signed up Chantal for RYLA without telling her; and when her mom told Chantal what she had done, Chantal didn't want to go at first - but was then glad that she did. In 2010 Chantal went to Tanzania to do some volunteer work and coordinated with the Haney Rotary club to donate several thousands of dollars to a special needs school in that country. In 2013 she became a founding member of the Tri-Cities Rotaract Club where she served as Social Chair and President over the years. By 2013, she became a RYLA Facilitator. (A Facilitator is an older student or young adult who has previously participated in RYLA, and volunteers to guide and support a small group of high school students through the RYLA camp weekend.) Of course, by 2015, Chantal became Head Facilitator, and served as the Ridge Meadows Youth Impact Summit Head Facilitator in 2015 and 2016.

Chantal attended Simon Fraser University where she received her Bachelor of Arts and then Masters in Applied Science. She was commissioned as a Notary Public in 2023, where she was honoured to win two awards — the highest overall marks in all notarial statutory exams of her class, and also the highest marks in the property law exam. Chantal is a third-generation notary, who (along with her fellow notary Liza Afanassieva) purchased her mom's notary practice in Maple Ridge, where they practice under the name of "Ridge Notaries". Their offices are on 227th St. between Lougheed highway and Dewdney Trunk Road.

Chantal has a daughter, Mila, who will have her first birthday on August 1, 2025.

On Chantal's membership application form there is a section entitled "Tell us about your interests and hobbies". She said

"Exploring nature, family history research, and spending time with family and friends". Under the section entitled "Tell us what areas of service you are passionate about", she said "I love working with youth and seniors.... I enjoy speaking to seniors and giving pro-Bono presentations on wills and powers of attorney and representation agreements"

Kathy Henderson

Kathy Henderson was sponsored by Matt Debruyn, who has met with her and says she will be a great member of Rotary. Matt was sorry that was unable to attend the meeting due to a medical procedure, and therefore Kathy was introduced by Ineke:



"Kathy was born into the medical world. Her father was a doctor. She became a nurse at the Ridge Meadows Hospital, where later in life she changed careers and join the administration and headed up two departments, here in our Fraser Health Authority where she worked for 30 plus years.

She has two children (Ryan and Alisa) and happy to also be a grandma - and loves babysitting her grandchild.

Kathy is now retired and loves to get involved in volunteering, and wants to help people, and to advocate for the underprivileged, especially children. Andy and Yvonne Berrisford

Andy was born in Cape Town, South Africa in 1956. Andy says his dad "was a wanderer", so he grew up at several different places in South Africa, including St Helena Bay, Worcester, and Johannesburg. He completed high school at Worcester and got a job as a student technician with Eskom, the electric utility, near Johannesburg. After completing his training, he joined the Electrical Measurements team at Eskom's Research & Development Division.

Yvonne was born in Johannesburg, South Africa, and grew up in Durban. She met Andy in Hillbrow, a residential neighbourhood of Johannesburg. They must have been destined for each other, because they met in October, 1981, became engaged in December, and got married in February 1982. They bought a small house in Kempton Park and raised 3 children there. (Kempton Park is located about 30 KM north-east of Johannesburg.)

In 1994 South Africa abolished apartheid and "a new chapter for the country began, under the wise leadership of Nelson Mandela", says Andy. "Unfortunately, he left office after a few years and his successors were not of the same character. It became clear that the future of our family was in peril and we had to leave the country."

Andy and Yvonne immigrated to Toronto in April, 2000, and lived in Guelph (**) for 4 years. Andy says that he then "got a much better job at BC Hydro", and so they moved to Burnaby in 2004. In Burnaby Yvonne had a neighbour, Coreen. When Coreen moved to Port Moody, Andy and Yvonne followed her in 2016. Says Yvonne, "My neighbour becomes my best friend, and 6 years ago she became my sister-in-law." It was there, in Port Moody, that they (along with Andy's brother and his wife) joined Rotary.

Andy retired from BC Hydro at the end of 2019 as COVID hit and their youngest son died of cancer. In 2022 they decided to move to Maple Ridge; and "Here we are", says Andy.

(**) For those of us geographically and historically challenged, Guelph is located roughly 70 km west of Downtown Toronto. Guelph, like New Westminster in BC, is known as "the Royal City" - "Guelph" was named in 1827 to pay tribute to the reigning British monarch, King George IV, who was a member of the House of Guelph, and "New Westminster" because Queen Victoria chose the name in 1859 after her favourite district in London, Westminster.)
