Introduction of Special Guest Peter Tam, Assistant District Governor – by Lynda Lawrence

Peter was born in 1961 and spent 9 Years living in Hong Kong before moving to Canada and becoming a Canadian citizen. He grew up in Burlington, Ontario before moving west and settling in Maple Ridge. Peter and his wife share three children, a daughter and two sons. Peter’s journey is as unique as his sound. For over 30 years he worked as an aviation data engineer and analyst for NAV Canada. When the 2020 pandemic disrupted the aviation industry, Peter chose to follow his true calling and pivot entirely to embrace his lifelong passion for music. Since then, collaborating with JUNO award-winning musicians, he has developed a signature style of Jazzy Adult Contemporary music drawing inspiration directly from nature and humanity. His first studio album was “A Walk in the Woods”. Peter also helped compose a hybrid Cantonese opera “The Prop Master’s Dream” that was performed at the Orpheum Annex and Queen Elizabeth Playhouse theatres.

He has taken his “General Man” tribute show, highlighting the music of Billy Joel and Elton John, on tour, raising money for both local community projects and projects benefiting Rotary. He performs well over 200 shows per year and now has four published albums and the number of singles. A dedicated community advocate, Peter is driven by a “Think Global, Act Local” philosophy. He ran as a candidate for both the provincial BC Green Party and the Federal Green Party advocating for green technology investments and small business innovation. Peter created the Albion Scout Group and served as the Area Commissioner for Scouts Canada from 2007 – 2010. He then served as an Auxiliary Constable with Ridge Meadows RCMP from 2011 – 2013. Peter joined Rotary in 2008 as a member of the Haney Rotary Club, and since then he has embodied the Rotary model “Service Above Self”. In 2017 he stepped up to serve as Club President for the 2018 – 2019 year, and continues to expand his impact in Rotary currently serving as our Area Governor and Assistant District Governor. Peter is recipient of both the Paul Harris Fellow award and the Rotary International Blue Metal for leadership during the pandemic.

Paul Harris Fellow Awards, and Recognitions – by **Alex Pope**, assisted by **Mike Davies** and AG **Peter Tam**

The presentation of a Paul Harris Fellow is The Rotary Foundation’s way of expressing its appreciation for a substantial contribution to its humanitarian and educational programs. It is named for Rotary’s founder Paul Harris, a Chicago lawyer who started our organization with three business associates in 1905. The recognition was established in 1957 to encourage and show appreciation for substantial contributions to what was then the Foundation’s only program, Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study, the precursor to Ambassadorial scholarships. When Rotarians donate US \$1000 to the Rotary Foundation, they receive 1000 points towards their own Paul Harris award, and 1000 points that they can use to acknowledge another person with the Paul Harris award.

Rotarians often designate a Paul Harris Fellow as a tribute to a person whose life demonstrates the shared purpose with the objectives of The Rotary Foundation to carry out the many programs we know are benefiting people and communities around the world through improved living conditions, better healthcare, educational opportunities, and new channels for the flow of international understanding. Notable recipients of the Paul Harris Fellow include Mother Teresa, Nelson Mandela, Jimmy Carter, Prince Charles, Indira Gandhhi, Luciano Pavarotti, and Pope John Paul II, all of whom have been recognized for the devotion to the ideal of goodwill, peace and understanding. The number of Paul Harris Fellows reached 1 million in 2006. Prior to today's ceremonies, the Meadow Ridge Rotary Club has awarded 71 Paul Harris Fellows since it was chartered in 1990.

**To Libby Nelson –
Rotarian of the Year**

“The Marco Terwiel Rotarian of the Year Award is presented annually to a club member who demonstrates outstanding contribution and dedication to the club. I monitored to announce that our Rotarian of the Year for 2025/26 is Libby Nelson. Libby has been a Rotarian since 1993 and joined the Meadow Ridge Rotary Club in 2014. She has served in a variety of roles in the club and on the board, including President in 2017 – 2018. Currently Libby is the chair of the Duck Race Committee. Under Libby's leadership, the Duck Race set a new record of over \$98,000 in ticket sales for the 2025 race, and is targeting a new record this year by adding another 1000 ducks to the race. The proceeds from the Duck Race support close to 30 local youth and seniors organizations. Libby, thank you for your service to Rotary.”



Outgoing President's Report – Alex Pope

“I've been asked by a few people over the last month if I was looking forward to being finished my year as president. After noting that as of now there 245.5 hours left in my term as president (including one more Tuesday meeting) I must admit that I have enjoyed my role as president and I'm not really looking forward to being finished. But don't get any ideas Eric, I'm not agreeing to continue, either.

As is clear from the awards and recognitions we handed out this evening, the reason for me having an enjoyable year as president was having a knowledgeable and effective team supporting me all year. We had success in our fundraisers during this year with the Duck Race in August 2025 and the Wine Fest in May 2026 both setting new fundraising records. But more importantly, we had a positive impact on our community with financial support for local organizations and events, bursaries for graduating students, and participants in Rotary Youth programs. I'm not going to list them all, because I don't want to make us all eat for dinner, but I will point out two of our larger contributions. In November 2025 we contributed \$10,000 to the Ridge Meadows Hospital Foundation for purchasing two vital sign monitors for the Urgent and Primary Care Centre for our local hospital. This adds to our previous contributions to the Hospital Foundation of over \$78,000 since 1992. And just last month, in May 2026, we contributed \$20,000 to the Friends in Need Food Bank which is being used towards the purchase of refrigerated van for their food recovery program.

Thanks to Ineke's work, we have been approved for a US \$2,300 matching District 50-50 grant for a project in Banos, Ecuador. The project is to build and install reading corners, also known as book notes, at 5 Schools in Ecuador. There will be an opportunity for Rotary members to participate “hands on” in this project in early 2027.

Of course, we've had some fun together this year, too. Our annual Rotary Camping trip was in September 2025. For those who haven't participated yet, you don't need to camp to enjoy the festivities... Just drop by the campground anytime for food drink and social time. We are all booked and ready to go for

2026. Also in September 2025, we had a friendly Frisbee golf competition hosted by Dave Rempel. I'm reminded that I have a trophy from that event on my mantel at home - I suspect I owe some thanks to my son Casey for being the ringer on our team.

In October 2025, Adrienne Dale and Warren hosted our international Thanksgiving dinner where we had an ample spread of food representing the cultural heritage of our Rotarians. They gave us an opportunity to share our favourite traditional food with each other.

In November 2025, we entered a dance team in the Maple Ridge Community Foundation's "Dancing in the Ridge". The dance we performed was tap dancing to "Singing in the Rain" complete with yellow duck T-shirts, duck hats, and umbrellas. They may have also been some non-dancing Rotarians distributing hundreds of squeaky ducks to the audience during the event.

In December, Clint Callison and Cheryl hosted our Christmas Dinner. It was well organized and enjoyed by all. February's Valentine dinner was courtesy of Mark and Pauline Forster, including Mark's infamous rum cake. Throughout the year we had our monthly Pub Hubs, where we visit old and new drinking and eating establishments in Maple Ridge and Pitt Meadows for some social time. So far, we have mostly behaved ourselves and have not been kicked out.

I'm proud of our accomplishments this year. We are finishing the year with a strong, engaged club that will continue to have a positive impact. I'm looking forward to seeing what the new Rotary year brings. Thank you all for a fantastic year."

Remarks of our new Club President - Eric Mollema

I want to be clear: The board cannot do this alone. The beauty of Rotary is that the President is merely a facilitator who, with the Board, can utilize the collective genius of our membership and Rotary as a whole. I am asking each of you to bring your 'something.' Maybe it's a connection you have to a local business, an hour of time for a project, or simply a new idea that you've been hesitant to share. We are a space where innovation is encouraged. I'm also particularly excited to lean into our collaborative strengths. Working with knowledgeable members, we are already planning to optimize our operations so that we spend less time on administration and more time on the ground, serving where we are needed most.

In closing, I am reminded of why we call this "Service Above Self". It isn't just a slogan; it's a commitment to look outside of our own lives to see where we can be the catalyst for positive change. I am genuinely humbled by the trust you have placed in me. I promise to listen, to work hard, and to ensure that this year is one where we not only meet our goals but have a great time doing it. Let us make this a year to remember. Let us work with purpose, lead with empathy, and serve with heart. Thank you, and let's get to work."

They currently have the entire band group fundraising and selling tickets for the Duck Race. They have been fundraising with the Duck Race for the past nine years. This is year marks the 80th anniversary of the MRCB.
