It has been said that membership development underpins both the philosophical and operational cornerstones of Rotary International. The four Avenues of Service require an active and growing membership in order to fulfill the Object of Rotary.

A strong and growing membership base allows Rotary to expand humanitarian and educational work in our communities and throughout the world, strengthening our efforts to advance peace, understanding, and goodwill. It also provides financial support for The Rotary Foundation of RI, enhances Rotary's public image, introduces fresh perspectives to our clubs, helps develop future leaders, promotes fellowship, and creates opportunities to include non-Rotarian family members in the family of Rotary.

If we want this organization to be handed down to the next generation of Rotarians, we must constantly work to infuse new blood into our ranks. A 99-year-old man (the same age as Rotary) was asked on his birthday how he felt, to which he quipped, "Not bad, considering the alternative." If we do not focus on the challenges of bringing in new members and chartering new clubs, Rotary faces the same alternative.

In this Rotary year, I urge Rotarians not only to bring more men and women into Rotary, but also to instill the spirit of Rotary into these new members to help ensure that they remain Rotarians. Clubs should create a family of Rotary committee to help nurture new members and their families. When new members and their families feel "wanted," they will immediately know the difference between acquaintance and friendship. We should, of course, also work to bring in new members from underrepresented segments of our communities, including younger adults, women, and members of other ethnic and religious groups. In order to encourage grassroots membership growth, I urge clubs to conduct Rotary business in the predominant languages of their regions and communities and to translate Rotary literature into those languages.

In the last two years, we have witnessed steady membership growth the world over, thanks to the efforts of our previous leaders, and the tools for promoting further growth and retention remain available. The RI membership zone coordinators are trained and at your disposal, ready to Lend a Hand to your growth efforts. Clubs and districts should strive to win two-year retention recognition awards, an incentive program launched last year. The criteria for recognition has been mailed to clubs and districts, so join the competition.

LAST WEEKS MEETING

Well its definitely hot summer days but even so we managed to have 20 people present at this weeks meeting. Our guest speaker was Jeff Haveman, who is the young man we sponsored last year to participate in the Canada World Youth organization. He spoke of his eight months away from home with this organization and obviously it had a profound effect as he is still trying to process the new experiences and perspectives he picked up along his journey.

Jeff spent his first four months in Miramachi, New Brunswick along with 9 other Canadian participants and 10 Cubans. While there Jeff's main project was Recreational Therapy with senior citizens and he did this four days a week, with the other two days being for Community Volunteer projects and planning. I guess they had one free day a week. They stayed with host families in the community and also were involved with the "very productive" Rotary club in Miramachi.

From there these 20 young adventurers carried on to a small community of 55,000 in Cuba where once again they were hosted by families in the community. In regards to Cuba he noticed that there was a lot of "political propaganda" about and regular meetings to discuss politics within the communities. He described it as being very organized in this area. He also noted that it is a very "culturally rich country with a lot of love" in spite of their limited resources.

Young people interested in this program can contact Jeff Haveman for more information. It is for youths between 17 and 20 and they select a group comprised of a wide socio-economic background. Each youth is responsible for fundraising \$1,500 each in order to participate.

Announcements of the day were as follows:

Each advertiser receives 20 calendars for their \$400 spot, which they can then sell for \$20 each or use as promotional material.
- 3) Vladamir has invited everyone (family included) to his place for a end of summer picnic to see his bee farm. It will be held on Tues Sept 16th. A sign up form will be circulated at the meetings for the next couple of weeks, so please fill it out so Vladamir will know how many are coming.

Laurie announced with great pride that last year our club donated in excess of \$10,000 to Rotary Foundation and Polio Plus which is a record and very impressive. The district also hit a record with a total donation for the year of \$512,000.


'BEE' THERE AT OUR 'FAMILY END OF SUMMER BARBECUE'
