I'm sure, we all get approached by several organizations every month, to donate clothing and/or household items. Well, this is what we are planning: Please keep all these items for Cythera Transition House!

## On Saturday, November 1<sup>st</sup>, somebody from our Rotary Club will knock on your door to pick up whatever you can donate!

So, please, collect everything you would usually give to any of these other organizations (clothes need to be clean, household items in working condition) and put it in a bag or box. #### SYNCHRONIZED NID'S LAUNCHED ACROSS WEST AFRICA

In a swift and aggressive response to a new polio outbreak spreading from Nigeria to neighbouring countries, hundreds of thousands of volunteers and health workers in Benin, Burkina Faso, Ghana, Niger, and Togo started a three-day immunization campaign on 22 October. According to a joint press release from the partners of the global polio eradication initiative, the synchronized National Immunization Days will cost more than US\$10 million.

Genetically traced to northern Nigeria, the outbreak paralyzed nearly a dozen children in Burkina Faso, Ghana, Niger, and Togo and is putting 15 million children in those countries at risk. To check another case recently reported in Chad, similar campaigns are planned in that country and Cameroon for mid-November. Centered around the state of Kano, the polio-infected states in Nigeria have re-infected other areas of the country, most worryingly the city of Lagos with its 10 million inhabitants. Epidemiologists attribute the marked increase in cases in Nigeria to insufficient coverage during both polio immunization campaigns and routine services.

In at least one state, as few as 16 percent of children have been sufficiently immunized against polio. A difficult socio-religious environment has severely compromised the quality of polio campaigns and helped spread rumours about the safety of the oral polio vaccine.

"Nigeria is now the country with the greatest number of polio cases in the world," says Dr. David Heymann, representative of the Director-General for Polio Eradication, WHO. "Polio and other infectious diseases know no national boundaries. We face a grave public health threat, and our goal of a polio-free world is in jeopardy."

Senior epidemiologists from the Global Polio Eradication Initiative convened a high-level meeting with the Nigerian minister of health at the end of September, at which the minister provided his assurance and commitment to eradicate polio in Nigeria by the end of 2004.

"Nigeria is the most populous nation in the region, and in many ways it has been a good neighbour, contributing to peacekeeping in West Africa," says UNICEF Executive Director Carol Bellamy. "Now it has another crucial role to play in the region, and that is stomping out polio once and for all. We need all Nigerians, particularly community leaders, to step up and do their part to end polio."

"Because of the tremendous progress made in 2002, the polio eradication tactics and resources were shifted in 2003 to focus on just those few remaining countries which remained endemic," says Dr Bruce Aylward, WHO's global coordinator for the polio eradication initiative. "But the situation in Nigeria is now forcing us to go back to countries which had already eliminated polio."

Despite the apparent setback, epidemiologists are convinced polio can be eradicated from Nigeria. "Much of the country was already polio-free for over two years, including Lagos," says Dr. Walter Orenstein, director national immunization program at the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). "The challenge now is to increase the quality of polio campaigns in the key endemic areas of the Nigeria, and reach all children during activities."

RI President Jonathan Majiyagbe has pledged Rotary's continued support for efforts to wipe out polio. "Today, I call on the international community to urgently provide the necessary funds as quickly as possible — for the sake of the children across western Africa," he says.
