Lebanon a trailblazer for Rotary in Muslim world, says Majiyagbe

About 670 Rotarians from nine countries convened in Beirut, Lebanon, on 5-7 March to meet RI President Jonathan Majiyagbe, who took a special trip to the Middle East. The RI president said that Rotary's success in Lebanon offers a glimpse of the potential for extension throughout the Arab and Muslim world.

"I am aware that Rotary has a long history in Lebanon — starting with the Rotary Club of Beyrouth, which was chartered in 1936. Over the years, Lebanese Rotarians have risen to serve the organization as leaders on the international level," said the RI president. "Rotary's more recent history in Lebanon is one of growth — not just in terms of membership, but also in the amount of Rotary service being carried out here. Rotary's success in Lebanon is a source of inspiration and hope — offering a tantalizing glimpse of Rotary's potential throughout the Arab and Islamic world."

Lebanese Rotarians who have served as senior Rotary leaders include Francis Kettanah, RI director in 1944-46, and Augustin Catoni, RI director in 1956-58 and vice president in 1957-58.

In addition to addressing a press conference, President Majiyagbe and a 50-member delegation of Rotarians met with Lebanese President Emile Lahoud on 6 March. The RI president helped launch an avoidable blindness fundraiser and a major immunization campaign. He also attended the closing ceremony of an international Rotaract conference that attracted 70 participants from 10 countries.

Other highlights of President Majiyagbe's visit include a gala dinner attended by 670; a Rotary family lunch attended by 420; a visit to a children's cancer center; and a tour of the

Zgharta- Zawié Blood Bank, a 3-H Rotary Foundation project funded with contributions from clubs in France and Lebanon. The prototype of a Rotary Centennial postage stamp designed by artist and Lebanese Rotarian Fadi Geara was unveiled at the gala dinner.

"We are pleased to observe that the bright image of Rotary in our Lebanese community has contributed greatly to the unification of its society and the Lebanese Rotary clubs have set an example for good citizenship through the behaviour of their members during the civil crisis," said Dr. Michel Jazzar, chairman of the committee that organized the RI President's visit. "I am pleased to relay to you that all 18 clubs in Lebanon have agreed on a common project in celebration of the Centennial of Rotary. It is a humanitarian project that aims to help children with leukemia by supporting the St. Jude Children Cancer Center with specialized equipment exceeding US\$ 200,000."

On 2-3 March, the RI president visited Turkey, where he met with the country's President Ahmet Necdet Sezer, as well as scores of Rotarians, Rotaractors, and Interactors in Ankara, Istanbul, and Izmir. In Ankara, he opened an international art exhibition and a school commemorating the 50th anniversary of Rotary in Turkey.

Another impressive speaker was a young man 11 years of age who has raised more than \$800,000 in the past five years for the development of fresh water wells in Third World Countries. Ryan Hreijac now has his own Foundation and web site: www.ryanswell.ca and his goal when he grows up is to be a water engineer.

The Pacific Northwest PETS 2004 was the largest convention yet with 840 Rotarians in attendance from 10 Rotary Districts including Siberia. We had two and a half full days, received lots of material, exchanged ideas and came away exhausted, but full of 'vim and vigour'.
