Diving into her athletic career at the age of eight, Megan spent seventeen years as a National team springboard and platform diver. Megan and her younger sister Paige were affectionately known around town as "The Gordon Sisters" and Vancouver's "Diving Duo". Megan's career highlights include being ranked the number one Canadian on the FINA World Grand Prix, attending three World University Games, the Pan American Games, placing fifth at the 1994 Goodwill Games, and chosen as an alternate for the 1992 Olympic Team. Megan is a UBC Commerce graduate and currently advises Global clients on their Internet Marketing and Brand Strategies. She has served on the board of many sport organizations over the years. During her spare time she enjoys traveling, yoga, ultimate frisbee, snowboarding, golf, rock climbing, theatre and coaching all levels of diving.



As a young wrestler growing up in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, Justin would go down to the National Training Centre in Regina to watch the Olympic wrestling team train, dreaming of one day being a part of the national wrestling team himself. Justin achieved that goal and was a member of Canada's National Wrestling Team for thirteen years. He is an accomplished wrestler, representing Canada at numerous World Championships and such events as the Pan American Games, the Goodwill Games, the Commonwealth Games, and most recently the 2000 Olympic Games. His career highlights include being a nine time Canadian Senior Champion, winning a Gold medal at the 1994 Commonwealth Games, earning a business degree from Simon Fraser University in 1995 and placing eleventh at the Sydney Olympics.

Justin coached the 2002 World Cup Wrestling team and is currently the coach for the Canadian Junior Wrestling Team and the SFU Wrestling Team.

Rae-Anne, also known as Rae, has been a member of Canada's Senior Volleyball team since 1997. She is a threetime All-Canadian for the University of Winnipeg. From 1994 to 1997, she played with the Junior National Team and went to the World Student games in 1995 and 1997. It was at the '97 World Student Games where Team Canada finished 4th, the highest ever ranking at a world competition for Team Canada. Rae has also had a successful professional career overseas. She played one year in Belgium and two years in France.

Mitch is currently a member of the Vancouver Fire and Rescue Services and continues to pursue his passion for snowboarding.
