That was the day she discovered a Quebec-based organization, Students on Ice, had accepted her application to join its whale research expedition this August.



Next month's experience, she say will be invaluable. "It's something I've always wanted to do", says Mackenzie, who is also a volunteer at .the Vancouver Aquarium.

Things are moving along with our Exchange Student and Doris Gagel will be the Counsellor. The Robson's will be the first host family and we are still looking for other host families for the remaining 3 periods. Please speak to either Mary or Doris if you are interested.

Our guest speaker was Gaeton Royer a fellow Rotarian (from Port Moody) and the City Manager of Port Moody. One of this busy mans other hats is to be on the Board of the Cross Roads Hospice, a freestanding hospice in Port Moody. He came to offer us encouragement and advice and how to successfully "build the dream" into a reality of a freestanding hospice facility.

The Cross Roads Hospice in Port Moody cost \$2.3 million dollars and all the funds were raised with the exception of a \$140,000 mortgage. They have 10 beds and average approximately 250 patients per year.

There are currently 3 ways to receive Hospice or Palliative care in our society:

- 1) In the Palliative care ward of the hospital, which can be a very clinical, cold environment because it is in the hospital. This is probably one of the least desirable options.
- 2) Home Care this is likely the best option, but is not always possible. The Hospice Society does assist the family members where they can but it is still sometimes not possible.
- 3) Hospice Care in a freestanding Hospice center.

At the Cross Roads Hospice each room is individually decorated to provide a warm, friendly and comforting environment for the clients and their families. They offer support services and there are two roof top gardens of which 12 ft is a covered area and another 12 ft is open to the air. They have 2 cooks and a music therapist as well as nursing staff, along with many visiting volunteers for grief support. They offer Grief Journey's where family members take walks and talk if they want.

Gaeton offered lots of advice like: have lots of people who believe in the cause, trickle your info to the Media so as to receive more ongoing coverage, recognize your donors, focus on the big donations first, then go after the smaller individual ones.

Remember it is not about the money, but about the MISSION.
