Last week we printed the first two of four areas of service, RI President Glenn E. Estess Sr. had chosen to lead Rotarians into a year of celebration, namely Family of Rotary and Health Concerns. Today they are Literacy, and Water Management.

### Literacy

According to the United Nations Development Programme, the combined adult literacy rate in all developing nations is below 75 percent, a sobering statistic that underpins Estess' commitment to support literacy and education initiatives.

"It's quite unfortunate that, even in the 21st Century, illiteracy is a major problem in developing countries," says Past RI Director P.C. Thomas, 2003-04 Coordinator of the Literacy and Education Task Force.

Rotarians already are working to improve basic literacy through a variety of innovative approaches. One of the most successful initiatives is the Concentrated Language Encounter (CLE) program, an immersion method introduced in Thailand in the late 1980s. The approach is now used in more than 15 countries, including Bangladesh, Brazil, and South Africa, where Rotarians have introduced comprehensive programs funded by Health, Hunger, and Humanity (3-H) Grants from The Rotary Foundation of RI.

"The Concentrated Language Encounter is responsible for providing basic literacy to thousands at a pace unbelievably quick," says Thomas.

In Ismir, Turkey, for example, a 3-H Grant has been used to educate adult learners using the CLE method. According to District 2440 Literacy Chair Esat Kardicali, who helped coordinate the program, Turkish Rotarians hope to teach five million adults to read.

### Water management

In choosing water management as an area of emphasis, Estess has targeted an essential need. More than one billion people worldwide lack access to clean water, and according to United Nations estimates, more than five million die of waterborne illnesses every year. In Africa, where the problem is most severe, only about 55 percent of the population has access to safe water.

Because the problem affects so many, water projects provide sweeping opportunities to improve quality of life. Members of the Rotary Club of Bainbridge Island, Wash., USA, encountered one such opportunity in 1998, while visiting Uganda to assist with a literacy project. They visited several communities, but when they arrived in the village of Ochero, they noticed something was seriously amiss.

"There was a constant chorus of coughing," says Bainbridge Island Rotarian Joanne Croghan. "Nearly every child seemed dramatically underweight or ill. We wondered why conditions here should be so much worse than those we had seen elsewhere. Then we realized what it was. The people in Ochero had no access to clean water."

The U.S. Rotarians teamed up with the Rotary Club of Kampala-Ssese Islands, Uganda, to drill a safe well for the village. The project was completed in 2002, and now, Bainbridge Island Rotarians are raising money for a larger effort that would create 20 wells and provide clean water for more than 6,000 people.

"Our task is huge," says Bainbridge Island Rotarian John Walker, who has traveled to Uganda with Croghan three times to assess need and plan projects. "Things that seem so small to us, like running water and ordinary paper and pencils, are a real treat for these kids. There is so far to go, and there are thousands of villages like this out there. This is just one."

#### CRYSTAL METH COMMUNITY ACTION MEETING – JULY 29, 2004

Thank you to all who attended the meeting on July 29 at the ACT. The overwhelming response was very encouraging and a number of steps have been taken as a result of it.

At the meeting it became very clear that Crystal Meth in our community is "our problem". It is not people from Vancouver East who are on our streets; they are our people, our sons, our daughters, brothers, sisters, members of our families.

We were told that not only are the people on our streets ours, but they are just the tip of the meth iceberg. Over 90% of these people are addicted to Crystal Meth. It is not as obvious how Meth is effecting our youth, but it is in our high schools. It is especially prevalent amongst school dropouts and youth in alternative educational programs.

Crystal Meth is responsible for the majority of property crimes and violent criminal activity. Car thefts, purse snatchings, break & entrees are directly related to Meth.

We also became aware that Crystal Meth is not a drug. Crystal Meth is a poison and it destroys the brain. Although recovery is possible, Meth addicts are never the same. We heard about communities were Meth addiction reached 30% of the population and caused the entire fabric of those communities to breakdown.

Although we did not get to hear from everyone who attended the meeting, the message was very clear: "Crystal Meth is an epidemic and we as a community are ready to do something about it."

We have some well meaning people in this community attempting to deal with the Meth problem, but a coordinated action is required now.

Recent comments by the Provincial Solicitor General who has declared war on Crystal Meth and The Honourable Susan Brice, Minister of Mental Health and Addictions who announced that she is forming a provincial committee to deal with the problem are reassuring.

It is here in our community that this battle against Meth will be won or lost. Through consultation with the many community groups, organizations, government agencies and concerned citizens who attended the meeting, three task forces have been formed. They are:

- 1. Youth Education & Community Awareness
- 2. Addiction & Rehabilitation Services
- 3. Enforcement

Although my goal was to focus on educating our youth about the horrors of Crystal Meth, as a result of the meeting, it became very clear, that community awareness needs to be addressed at the same time. It also became clear that if we raise the level of awareness, we have to be able to provide a support system for the people who need help now. And if we as a community are going to win this battle against Crystal Meth, we need to provide an outlet for those who wish to report the people who are manufacturing or selling this poison.

I welcome the other two task forces and I truly believe that a coordinated effort can save many lives. We do not yet know how we will attack Crystal Meth in our community, but we have asked all the task forces to report back with their battle plans by September 15.
