The Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) has denied The Canadian Rotary Committee for International Development (CRCID) application for matching funds for money collected on behalf of the Tsunami Disaster affected countries in South Asia.


To: District 5050 Canadian Rotary Clubs:

As you are aware CRCID (Canadian Rotary Committee for International Development) submitted an application on behalf of Rotary in Canada to CIDA's International Humanitarian Assistance Program seeking eligibility for matched Rotary funds to assist in the immediate relief of the victims of the horrendous Tsunami catastrophy in Asia.

**CRCID has received a negative response from CIDA**, stating that Rotary in Canada is ineligible for matched funding under this program. "A committee of Senior Managers reviewed the Canadian Rotary Committee for International Development proposal with interest, but regretfully the organization was not deemed eligible for matching funds, based on the criteria set out by CIDA".

This information was received in an email addressed to the Chief Administrative Officer of CRCID at 5:37pm on January 11, 2005 and it is attached for your review. This news means that those funds raised for the Tsunami relief effort by dedicated Rotarians and either sent to the Rotary Foundation (Canada) or directly overseas will not be matched by the Canadian Government. However, this only represents the initial stage of a multi-vear recovery and reconstruction effort in the disaster areas. In an announcement made on January 10, 2005, the Canadian Government has pledged \$425 million to the disaster over the next five years. \$150 million of this amount is dedicated to matching the contributions raised by Canadians between December 26, 2004 and January 11, 2005 and contributed to a CIDA approved disaster relief agency (e.g. Red Cross/Crescent; UNICEF; CARE Canada; etc.). Rotary in Canada was seeking access to these funds through its application to IHAP. Rotary in Canada and its representative committee, CRCID, has not had any past relationship with this program or with the Multilateral branch of CIDA. Since its incorporation in 1985, CRCID has only dealt with the Canadian Partnership Branch. It was therefore necessary to introduce IHAP to Rotary in Canada through the submission of a request for eligibility letter (attached). The additional \$275 million will be utilized for humanitarian and rehabilitation assistance (\$115 million) and for ongoing reconstruction assistance to the affected region (\$160 million) over the next five (5) years. These are funds that will be available for organizations such as Rotary in Canada to do what Rotarians do best - implement sustainable development projects identified by the host country Rotarians and beneficiaries that meet the priority needs of the beneficiary communities. CIDA has not yet announced how these funds will be distributed but the CRCID Board of Directors will be discussing a strategy with its CIDA representatives during its Board Meeting being held in Ottawa the weekend of January 21-23, 2005. Rotary in Canada may not have been eligible for matched funding for the short-term humanitarian assistance but this was a departure from its natural strengths and abilities. Rotarians are recognized and respected for providing communities in need with financial and professional assistance and expertise.

For 100 years Rotarians have contributed in meaningful ways to improving the standard of living and reducing poverty for the beneficiaries in these communities.

#### LAST WEEKS MEETING

This week our guest speaker was none other than our past member Dave Reekie. He recently participated in an EarthWatch project in Brazil and was here to share his adventure and encourage us to try to do something for the environment as individuals and as a club.

The name of the project was Projecto Atlantis – Brazil Marine Mammals, and was the study of the Tucuxi dolphins. These small dolphins live in the rivers and estuaries of South America and are small in number. Dave stayed in a small town called Cananeia, just south of San Paulo and his duties included observing the dolphins from the beach or a boat, cleaning skulls, recording their activities, recording the water temperature and salinity and photo identification.

Much like the killer whales, these dolphins are often identified by the unique scars, shape and notches in their dorsal fin. They think their life cycle lasts for approximately 20 years and that they reach sexual maturity at 5 years old. Their numbers are decreasing and they are trying to identify the reasons of which could be, loss of habitat, loss of food, or others. Tourism and fishing seem to be the things that most impact their lives.

HSBC in partnership with Earth Watch pays for staff to volunteer for these types of activities. The volunteers range from 16 - 60 years old and are usually there for 1 week or 10 days. They are provided accommodation and food and are doing their work from 7Am til about 8 pm.

Dave found this trip very rewarding and said he would definitely like to go back again. He encourages our club to pick up an environmental issue to fund or assist and every effort helps, no matter how small.
