Rotarians all over the world have responded spontaneously and generously to the *tsunami disaster* in South Asia. At the *Presidential Celebration in Osnabrück*, Rotary Magazin editor Gerald Deckart asked RI President Glenn E. Estess Sr. about his ideas for Rotary involvement.

#### Deckart: Will Rotary International launch its own program to help flood victims in South Asia?

**Estess:** No. Rotary would never have the capabilities to respond to this catastrophe, which is beyond imagination, at the same comprehensive level that governments or global relief organizations can provide. As with other disasters, we rely on the proven initiative of clubs and districts, which have already shown excellent results.

#### How do you think Rotary and its clubs should take action?

First of all, help needs to be sustained. Currently, there are a lot of relief organizations on location. Rotary should have a long-term perspective. We should concentrate on those needs that will remain in half a year or a year from now — to rebuild infrastructure, schools, hospitals, and affordable homes.

#### How can The Rotary Foundation help?

A gift to the South Asia Solidarity Fund will be used to support recovery projects in Sri Lanka, Indonesia, India, and Thailand. There are other Foundation programs that can offer support. The easiest is Matching Grants. Any club that wants to help can check the various forms of assistance listed on the RI Web site. I would like to thank all Rotarians who have already responded for their great services.

The following is a short excerpt from what Rotary Clubs are planning to do for long-term relief assistance. More information can be found at http://www.rotary.org/programs/wcs/disaster/reliefefforts.html

**District 2980 is** planning long-term assistance to victims of the tsunami disaster. The affected people rely on fishing as their livelihood and the district will be providing long-term assistance through the provision of fishnets and funds for repairing boats and Catamarans.

**District 3000** plans to adopt a small village or two in the affected area and is collecting funds to provide total reconstruction and rehabilitation.


**District 3020** was affected by the tsunami disaster. A committee of Rotarians is surveying the area and will be posting a report on the damages caused on their Web site: www.rotarydist3020.org. The district is collecting funds to provide long-term, low-cost housing for victims, provide nets and other tools, and provide immediate assistance to all orphaned children.

The **Rotary Club of Indore Updtown** in District 3040 is collecting funds to build low cost shelters that will each house five families. Each shelter will cost US\$800 to build. The club established relief camps immediately following the disaster and has spent \$25,000 to build temporary shelters for displaced families and orphaned children.

**District 3150** is planning long-term livelihood assistance projects to support fishermen and their families by providing small boats to support single families each (US\$250), large boats to support two families each (US\$400), mechanical boats to support 5 families each (US\$5,000), and nets (US\$300). The district is seeking international partners to apply for a Matching Grant through The Rotary Foundation.

**District 3210** plans to provide long-term assistance through an "adopt a village" program that will provide low-cost shelters (US\$2,000 each) to those who lost their homes. Land has been obtained for this purpose and beneficiaries are being identified. The district will also distribute fishing nets, boats, and engines.

The Rotary Club of Bali Ubud (Indonesia) is planning to provide long-term assistance and is planning a sponsorship program for orphans, an "adopt a community" program to provide reconstruction and repair to schools and wells, and a micro-credit program that will enable survivors to rebuild their businesses.
