
In my travels as president, I am constantly impressed by the commitment and creativity of Rotaractors. On a recent trip to Russia, I met with Rotaract members in St. Petersburg who had come from Vladivostok - nine hours away by airplane. These young people truly understood what Rotary volunteerism is all about, and Russia can only benefit from their work. I came away feeling confident that the future of Rotary was going to be with the next generation, and the future of Russia as well.

As I write this message, the members of a Rotaract club in San Diego are packing their bags for their first international service project – one for which they are uniquely qualified. The club's members are all Sudanese refugees who, as children, fled their country's civil war without parents or relatives. Now, these new Rotaractors are returning to the Kenyan refugee camp where they once lived to help other refugees find a better life. This is just one example of Rotaractors seeing a need and doing everything they can to make a difference.

Rotaract is flourishing around the world. With over 7,700 clubs and 177,000 members, there is Rotaract in almost every country where there is Rotary. World Rotaract Week, 7-13 March, is an opportunity for all of us to reach out to Rotaractors and make sure Rotaractors feel that they are part of the Rotary family. Sponsor joint projects with your local Rotaract club. Invite Rotaractors to your club meetings, and propose them for membership. Rotaract is a path to Rotary, and it is our responsibility as Rotarians to keep that path clear and inviting.

For my wife, Mary, and me, family always comes first. And often, we hear from members or prospective members that they have so little time to spend with their families, they cannot take on the commitment of community service. Rotary was never meant to take members from their families - instead, it should be a force to bring families together. Encourage your children or grandchildren to join Rotary, Rotaract or Interact, and involve them in your club's service projects whenever you can. There is no better way to teach service than by example – and bringing generations together in service is one of the many ways we continue to Celebrate Rotary!



Dave Rempel stood and explained a student exchange program he is looking for funding for. This project will see 8 students from our area travel to Russia to be home-stayed, attend some local schools and tour the cities of Moscow, St Petersburg and Novosibirsk. The long term plans are to facilitate a return exchange with students from Russia coming to stay in our area. Dave is requesting \$800 funding from the Rotary Club.

April 12th is the Youth Diversion fundraising dinner at the Gourmet Hideaway. The tickets are \$120 each but you will receive a tax deductible receipt for \$100 of that. Last year we were very successful in our efforts and we look forward to improving on that this year. If you are interested please speak to Gordy who can let you know who has the tickets.

Our guest speaker this week was Lola Chapman from the Ridge Meadows Youth & Justice Advocacy Association. This association was founded in 1994 by Lola, and has helped approx 130 youths each year since then. First time youth offenders are referred to the program by the RCMP or the Crown Council at which time they meet with a volunteer mentor for an interview. In this interview their offence & their personal background are discussed as well as consequences are set for their offence. After this is completed they are assisted with making positive choices in their life through the mentoring and quite often drop in to the office to brag of their successes. The overall success rate of this organization is 84%-94% and that is defined in that they do not reoffend for a year from their entry into the program. The average cost to send a youth through the prison system is \$250,000 with a success rate around 40% while the Youth Diversion program averages \$250 with a 84-94% success rate. Lola has also traveled across Canada assisting other communities to set up similar programs. Lola thanks the club for their past support and looks forward to an ongoing relationship with us.
