So the Minister asked the congregation, "What can you learn from this demonstration?"



ROTARY HONOURS CDC, USAID CHIEFS FOR LEADING ROLES IN POLIO EFFORT

Rotary International has honoured Dr. Julie Gerberding, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and Andrew Natsios, administrator of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), with the Polio Eradication Champion Award for leading the two government agencies in their support of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

They were recognized by RI President Glenn Estess Sr. at a reception honouring U.S. champions of polio eradication in Washington, D.C., on 11 May.

"In America, three generations have passed since any mother feared polio for her child. Polio didn't disappear here all by itself — it was conquered by dedication, generosity, and hard work," said Estess. "And now, America and Rotary International are continuing that fight, so that every single child, everywhere in the world, will be safe from this terrible disease."

Under Gerberding's leadership, the CDC, a spearheading partner with Rotary in the initiative, has provided crucial technical and financial support. Gerberding's recent travels to the polio strongholds of India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan have encouraged her counterparts in those countries to intensify their efforts against polio. The CDC deploys expert staff to polio-endemic countries and operates the world's leading specialized polio reference lab. Last year, the organization funded vaccinations in high-risk countries.

Fellow award recipient Natsios was recognized for his commitment to eradicating polio. Under his leadership, USAID provided crucial support for the synchronized polio immunization campaigns launched in 2004 in 23 West and Central African countries, including critical work to reach children in the previously inaccessible areas of Darfur, Sudan, and northern Nigeria.

In Southeast Asia in 2004, USAID grants supported immunization activities that affected more than 200 million children. Worldwide, USAID is contributing \$32 million to aid in the development and maintenance of polio eradication infrastructure and fund immunizations, surveillance, and social mobilization activities. As the largest donor to this global endeavour, the U.S. government has contributed more than \$1 billion to polio eradication since 1995.

"U.S. leadership is crucial to ensure that the threshold of victory over polio is crossed," Estess said. The Polio Eradication Champion Award was established in 1995 to recognize world leaders who have made outstanding contributions toward the goal of eradicating polio.

Past recipients include former U.S. President Bill Clinton; former prime ministers John Major, of the United Kingdom, and Ryutaro Hashimoto, of Japan; presidents Chen Shui-Bian, of Taiwan, Pervez Musharraf, of Pakistan, Olusegun Obasanjo, of Nigeria, Mamadou Tandja, of Niger, and Jose Eduardo dos Santos, of Angola; Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands; UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan; German Economic Cooperation and Development Minister Heidemarie Wieczorek-Zeul; Dutch Development Cooperation Minister Eveline Herfkens; and Egyptian First Lady Suzanne Mubarak.
