RI PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear fellow Rotarians,

August is the Rotary month of membership and extension, an area of great importance to our organization.

The United States leads the way in total number of Rotarians, with 388,170 members. The second largest country is Japan with approximately 103,700 members, followed by India with about 90,000 Rotarians. A couple of interesting observations are that these three countries alone account for 50 percent of the Rotary population and they are all around

the Pacific, where 60 percent of the world population is located.

As to the percentage of a country's population who are Rotarians, the picture is quite different. Iceland is the number-one country, followed by Sweden, Norway, New Zealand, Finland, Denmark, and Australia. It's fascinating to note that all seven top nations come from the Nordic part of Europe and Down Under.

More interesting, however, is the general trend of Rotary membership worldwide. The Far East has a general upward trend. Africa has a trend of small gains like Europe, a steady but small annual positive development. All other areas, unfortunately, show another picture – a downward one.

In the past, we have had several years dedicated to a special and intensive focus on membership. These have been very successful during the time they were implemented, but due to the lack of continuity, the gains have often been lost during the following year.

I think it is wise to work towards goals. However, goals must be easy to understand and reachable. For 2005-06, I have set a goal of a net increase of one member per club. I believe this goal is reachable and understandable. Unfortunately, we have a loss of members each year in the area of 10 percent. This may make the goal more difficult to reach, which is why retention is so critical. If the drop-off rate can be reduced, the goal will be much easier to achieve.

It is therefore of greatest importance that we a) make our clubs interesting through dynamic programs and meaningful projects, b) take care of club members so they feel that their membership is relevant to both them and their clubs, and c) put an emphasis on fellowship and friendship, two of the cornerstones on which Rotary was built.

We need to be strong in membership so that through *Service Above Self* we can continue to show the world the great leadership of Rotary International.

She was very pleased and looks forward to our ongoing support. Next years calendar promises to be even better with the support of the whole club.

On August 10th (next Wednesday) we will be participating in a joint meeting with the Haney Club at MGGC and will have Dimitri of the Rotary Club of Novosibirsk, Russia speaking on the topic "Democracy in Russia, Fact or Fiction" Please sign up at the reception desk today if you want to attend.

Cheryl also updated the club on this years Harvest Wine Fest (10^{th} Annual). We will be holding the event this year at the ACT on Saturday Sept 17^{th} from 7 – 10 pm. Tickets are \$35 each and it is hoped that each club member will sell a minimum of 6 tickets each to help make this a huge success. We already have 10 wineries on board and some new restaurants are expressing

interests as well. Promises to be a great event. Also we expect each member to donate two bottles of wine or spirits with a minimum value of \$15 to our Bottle Raffle, to help raise funds.

Our Guest Speaker was Alan Lomax from the Ladysmith Club and he introduced us to a very exciting opportunity to possibly incorporate into our "international services portfolio". It is called Shelterbox Canada and its mission is to provide Survival boxes to people affected by a natural disaster such as the recent tsunamis. Each box contains a tent for 10 people, 10 sleeping bags, water





container, water purification tablets, shovel, torch, rope and plastic bags. These boxes have already been shipped to Indonesia, India, North Uganda and the Sudan. Over 12,500 boxes were sent to Asia to assist over 140,000 survivors of the t sunami. We have also helped set up a tent camp in Northern Uganda to assist 2,000 people suffering

because of the wars in their country. The aim is to provide, shelter, comfort and most importantly dignity and hope to people struggling against enormous odds. Rotary clubs in England, USA and Australia are already participating and Alan is the Canadian representative for this project. Each box costs \$1,150. A few members asked questions and expressed an interest in this project. Each box that is shipped has a certificate indicating

who has paid for the box and has Rotary emblems attached along with the Canadian flag. Sounds like a great project to me. What do you think, let your international chair know your feelings re this.
