### CANADIAN INTERACTORS BRING JOY OF READING TO INNER-CITY SCHOOLS

The reading menu for students at several inner-city schools in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, has become more varied as a result of a literacy project of the Interact club at Ross Sheppard High School.

According to Jenna Briscoe and Matt Karpman, the 16-year-old 11th graders who coordinated the effort, libraries at many inner-city schools have far fewer holdings than at Ross Sheppard.

"It is pretty serious when schools cannot afford books for their elementary students to read," the Interactors explain in a joint e-mail. "Some of the libraries that we visited were quite small. We can't speak for all of the schools, but the ones that we distributed to were in need."

After two weeks of planning, preparation, and promotion, the Interact club launched a month long book drive at the end of October. From preliminary research, the club set a modest goal of collecting 1,000 books to distribute to inner-city schools that enrol mostly poor students.

But club members were overwhelmed by the response. More than 75 percent of Ross Sheppard's 2,139 students participated in the drive in a variety of ways. Many of them donated books they no longer needed.

"We expected just over a thousand books," Briscoe and Karpman say. "To our surprise, we received almost 12,000, which is absolutely amazing for a first-time [literacy] project."

The outcome was a source of immense personal satisfaction for both because they were just learning the ropes, having joined the Interact club at its inception in March 2005.

For the club, the success of the book drive was a big confidence booster. It was also an unforgettable lesson about Service Above Self, organizing, and not underestimating a community's capacity to help the needy.

"We as a group learned that there are many people who are in need that live in our own communities," Briscoe and Karpman note. "This project made a lot of us feel more of a reason to give back. We also found out that when the students of our school are pushed, they can move mountains."

There is no looking back for the Interact club, which is already planning more initiatives. A club-sponsored leadership conference for inner-city junior high school students is scheduled for 17 February, and a campaign is underway to raise C\$58,000 (US\$49,810) in support of an orphanage in Guatemala. Some club members will travel to Guatemala in mid-March to help build the orphanage.

### SAUDI ARABIA CONTRIBUTES US\$2.66 MILLION TO FIGHT POLIO



**UN Secretary-General Kofi** Annan lent a hand to immunize children in Pakistan.

At an early December pan-Islamic conference in Mecca, the Muslim world's holiest city, the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia announced a contribution of US\$2.66 million toward the polio eradication effort.

According to a news update on the Global Polio Eradication Initiative's Web site, previous Saudi support included mediation to help end an oral polio vaccine boycott in northern Nigeria and a decision to verify that visitors to the kingdom are immunized against polio.

The Extraordinary Session of the Organization of the Islamic Conference (OIC) Summit, hosted by the Saudi government, also focused attention on the effort to rid the world of polio in a communiqué issued on 8 December.

Saying that the OIC was painfully aware that five of the six remaining polio-endemic countries in the world are its members, the statement highlighted the significance of the international efforts to eradicate the crippling disease.

The wild poliovirus still circulates in OIC member countries Afghanistan, Egypt, Niger, Nigeria, and Pakistan. Polio-endemic India isn't a member but boasts a Muslim population of more than 100 million, many of whom live in states where the virus still circulates.

Saudi Arabia's donation marks a trend of increased support for antipolio efforts among OIC member states. In November, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners announced the first-ever contribution from Turkey, another OIC member, of \$500,000 to the worldwide war against polio.

The partners explained in a press release that Turkey's leadership role within the OIC was critical in securing strong political support for polio eradication at previous meetings of the pan-Islamic organization.
