Membership in a Rotary club offers a number of benefits, including:

- Effecting change within the community.
- Developing leadership skills.
- Gaining an understanding of and having an impact on international humanitarian issues.
- Developing relationships with community and business leaders.

Through Rotary's service programs, a Rotary club can have a significant effect on the quality of life in its community. Programs of The Rotary Foundation offer opportunities to form international partnerships that help people in need worldwide. More than 1.2 million Rotarians make significant contributions to the quality of life at home and around the globe.

Paul P. Harris formed the world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905. The Rotary motto is Service Above Self and, as it celebrates its centennial, Rotary continues to concern itself with truth, fairness, improved relations between peoples, and world peace.

During World War II, Rotary members increasingly became involved in promoting international understanding. A Rotary conference held in London in 1942 planted the seeds for the development of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), and some 50 Rotary members served as delegates and consultants at the founding of the United Nations.

Today, Rotary holds the highest consultative status with the United Nations that a non-governmental organization can obtain. In this capacity, Rotary has a voice within the UN system allowing access to its people and resources worldwide.

Rotary club membership carries with it certain responsibilities.

- Members are expected to attend weekly programs of the club. Opportunities to make up attendance include attending the regular meeting of another Rotary club, attending various other Rotary meetings, or attending a club service project authorized by the club board of directors.
- Members are required to pay annual dues to their clubs, their districts, and to Rotary International.
- Members are expected to participate in local or international activities or projects of the Rotary club.
- Clubs encourage members to aspire to leadership or committee roles within their clubs.

LAST WEEKS MEETING



Last week we had the honour of having Billy Weselowski from Innervisions as our guest speaker.

InnerVisions Recovery Society provides guidance, support and care of people affected by addiction with recovery programs based on an intensive integrated holistic approach which is contingent on their ability to participate.

Billy Weselowski 's hard work started paying off in 1991. He married Kim, and later that year their son Max was born (little brother Sam arrived two years later). In April, he rented a two-storey house in a middle-class Coquitlam neighbourhood. Beds were installed, and three staff members were hired via a Canadian Job Strategies grant. Through referrals from agencies, social workers and doctors who knew Billy, the house was soon filled to capacity with 15 clients.

Billy opened a second house in Port Coquitlam in November 1991, followed by another PoCo house for clients who are re-entering society. During their stay, which generally lasts four months, Innervisions residents must strictly adhere to a roster of guidelines and activities that would tax Marine Corps recruits. This includes no food in rooms, no loud talk, and scrupulous daily maintenance of the facility.

As Innervisions approaches its 14th year of operation, Billy is proud of his accolades-but only because they attract more addicts and troubled people to his doorstep. "I don't hang my head for the bad things I've done because I've paid for them. But I never forget the nightmare my former life was either."
