Queen Elizabeth recognizes polio effort

Polio eradication was one of several worldwide health concerns that Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom highlighted in her annual address on Commonwealth Day, 13 March.

The queen said that with the global effort to eradicate polio as a model, the world can successfully tackle other diseases.

"Polio, for example, used to cast its shadow across many countries," the queen said in the speech she delivered as head of the Commonwealth, a 53-member organization comprising the United Kingdom, former colonies of the British Empire, and Mozambique. "Today, thanks to concerted international action, just a handful still need to eliminate polio. The same approach and commitment to other global scourges, such as malaria and tuberculosis, can achieve equally impressive results."

Quoting an African proverb to urge members of the Commonwealth to invest more in health care, the queen said, "He who has health has hope, and he who has hope has everything."

The organization's focus on the Global Polio Eradication Initiative has increased over the past year. At a high-level consultative meeting in November regarding the Commonwealth's role in polio eradication, Commonwealth Secretary-General Don McKinnon called for sustained political leadership to fight the disease. He told attendees at the event, including a representative of Rotary, that the fight against polio is part of the fight against poverty.



In 1985, Rotary launched the PolioPlus program to protect children worldwide from the cruel and fatal consequences of polio. In 1988, the World Health Assembly challenged the world to eradicate polio. Since that time, Rotary's efforts and those of partner agencies, including the World Health Organization, the United Nations Children's Fund, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and governments around the world, have achieved a 99 percent reduction in the number of polio cases worldwide.

Rotarians stand at the brink of a great victory and look forward to celebrating the global eradication of polio.

We heard from Bob Neal and Mona LaMarche of "Positively Speaking" Toastmasters, which is an International Club of people who are dedicated to learn to improve their public speaking and leadership skills.

Toastmaster had humble beginnings and was started in 1924 by Dr. Smedley and a few colleagues, who got together at a Los Angeles YMCA to discuss ways of improving their public speaking. A short 11 years later the very first International Toastmaster Club was formed in Victoria, BC in 1935. This was also the 38th Club founded. It did not take long for Toastmasters to catch on. There are now over 8000 clubs worldwide.

In 1991, Toastmasters came to Maple Ridge. The Maple Ridge Club meets every Wednesday at 7:30 sharp at Council Chambers.



The Toastmasters program is founded on 4 pillars. Those are:

- 1) **Hands On Activity** practice and do it! Every meeting is organized so every participant can get up and speak. There is a formal agenda to every evening featuring a humorist, an inspirational speech, a timer, a grammarian, speakers and evaluators.
- 2) **Provides Manuals** Manuals for different levels of achievement help one practice various skills in public speaking such as voice intonation, hand gestures, body Language, use of visuals, etc. The membership also receives a monthly magazine with many helpful hints and tips.
- 3) **Provide a non-threatening atmosphere** Every participant is there to learn at their own pace and there is no right or wrong way to go about it. Everyone supports each other in their own learning.
- 4) **Evaluation Process** Everyone speaks and is evaluated by their peers. The evaluator also speaks when evaluating and the evaluator is evaluated by a General Evaluator. The role of the evaluators is to offer tips and ways the speech could be more effective.
