Special Guest Lewis Lukens from the US Consulate was our speaker today. The Consulate he manages covers all of B.C. and the Yukon Territory.

He has been speaking and reaching out to Rotary Clubs around the Lower Mainland as well as Chambers of Commerce to get to know Canadians and find out what is important to us. The District 50/50 that our club belongs to represents a great co-operative feel between our two countries. Mr. Lukens sees his department as the "eyes and ears" to the US Ambassador for Canada. There is a US Embassy in Ottawa and 7 consulates across Canada.

At the US Consulate downtown there are 62 employees, 32 Americans and 30 Canadians. The Consulate works with American authorities such as the DEA, ATF, Homeland Security and they co-operate and work closely with RCMP, CESIS and other Canadian authorities on a range of cross border issues ranging from drug trafficking, people smuggling, gangs and terrorism. They also process some 40,000 visa applications per year.

Trade Issues: The USA Canada relationship is huge! It is 500 Billion per year or 1.5Billion per day! Canada exports more to the Home Depot in Atlanta, Georgia alone than to France as a whole. USA trades with Ontario is more than all of Japan. Also on the tourism front, 2.1 Million Canadians travel abroad (not USA) compared to 10 Million Canadians travelling to the top 10 destinations in the USA.

The cross border issue is hot right now. Mr. Lukens told us that the US Congress has passed law, requiring passports for Canadians and Americans re-entering the USA by 2008. We have the longest relatively undefended border in the world. Local communities are affected as are school groups and hockey teams, travelling to play across the border, but the US feels that with standardized documentation the border wait times may be reduced.

Mr. Lukens is optimistic about a deal on Softwood lumber, that was recently initialled by both countries. There are so many lawsuits on both sides of the border and although both sides cannot be 100% satisfied, there is hopefully enough to make the deal. Both sides government and industry want to agree.

Mr. Lukens recently returned from Baghdad and recounts his experience there as very restrictive and terrifying. He stayed in an inner compound within the Green Zone in a small trailer with shared facilities, where he basically worked and did not leave the compound as a promise to his wife. He said it was very scary to hear mortar fire and bombs shaking buildings on a regular basis. He said he lost some friends, who were shot at in the compound at the green zone. It was dangerous work but he came away with a sense that he was doing important work there.

Mr. Lukens is thrilled to be in Vancouver for the next 3 years with his family.
