Pakistan honors Rotary's quake relief efforts

The government of Pakistan has announced an award to recognize Rotary's swift response to the plight of survivors of a 7.6-magnitude earthquake, the worst in the country's history.

More than 75,000 people were killed and 3.5 million left homeless by the devastating quake that ripped through the North-West Frontier province and Pakistani-administered Kashmir in October 2005.

As soon as news of the disaster broke, local and international Rotary clubs rushed emergency relief to hundreds of thousands of affected people. District 3270 (Afghanistan; Pakistan) set up a disaster relief account to accept donations from concerned Rotarians and friends. Food, blankets, medicine, and tents were among the donated items that Rotarians sent and helped distribute to survivors.

RI President Bill Boyd, who was president-elect at the time, traveled to Pakistan in December to comfort survivors and convey the sympathies of the world's Rotarians to the Pakistani people and government. He also aimed to find out firsthand how Rotarians could help with long-term rebuilding efforts.

The Rotary world has contributed more than US\$5 million in cash and in-kind donations to assist survivors. More than \$200,000 was directly donated into subaccounts The Rotary Foundation established in early 2006 to support earthquake disaster recovery efforts in Pakistan, the worst-hit country, and affected parts of India.

"Rotarians in Pakistan feel tremendous pride in receiving this award because this is the first time that the efforts of Rotary in Pakistan have been properly recognized," says Muhammad Faiz Kidwai, immediate past governor of District 3270, who coordinated the relief efforts. "This will positively contribute in improving the image of Rotary in Pakistan."

Pakistani President Pervez Musharraf will present the award, officially called Sitara-e-Eisar (the Star Award for Courage and Sacrifices), to Rotary International in February.


Some stories that were shared were:

Sharon announced that the Rotary Foundation Dinner will be held at the Skagit Hotel Resort in Washington on November 17, and encouraged attendance for this event.

Fred introduced Rod Thompson who was our Guest Speaker. Rod has had a very challenging start to his term as District Governor. The newspaper that he works for recently had an eleven week strike. Rod said that his visits with the Rotary Clubs in our District proved very therapeutic for him during this high stress period.

Rod spoke of the importance of Rotary and the goals for each club:

- 1. Membership Rod congratulated our Club for being able to grow and sustain our membership. We have inducted seven new Rotarians this year.
- 2. Funding of Service Projects he named some of the projects that our club has funded such as the local sports facilities, water wells, the Guatemalan Literacy campaign, etc. He reminded us that bingo funds can be used to provide scholarships for the education of our future leaders.
- 3. Support of International Projects Rod advised that our club has exceeded its' goal for raising funds this year. As well Dave Rempel is working on a matching grant for a project in Russia.
- 4. Leadership He spoke highly of Marco's leadership in the GSE exchange this year. Rod spoke of the Youth Exchange programs and welcomed our exchange student, Anna. He spoke of the power of leadership, the ability to initiate change, motivate others and lead by example. The challenge is to identify real needs within our community and focus on solving those issues.

Rod spoke of how the new generation communicates differently and how as a result the Service Clubs have declined in the last few years. Rotary is unique in that we have a selection of meeting venues including breakfast clubs, after work social clubs, and e-clubs. There are 1.2 million Rotarians worldwide, who enjoy

fellowship and conduct business. International is looking at some new membership and attendance methods including a family membership where the attendance can be shared.

The profit to our members derived from membership in Rotary is the ability to help others. Membership brings a unique gift that you cannot purchase – gratitude.

Rod told a story on humanitarian work in Zambia, and a boy named Johnny Banda who had lost his family to aids. He was considered a "throw away child". Rotary took him in and placed him with a safe foster family that could look after him. The doctors checked him over, and although he should have been scared to be examined, he recognized the "Rotary wheel" and felt that he could trust the Rotarians helping him as he had seen the wheel before when they were doing the polio vaccinations a couple of years earlier.

Rod reminded us of the importance of our annual contribution to the Rotary Foundation. For only \$250 you can save a life today, thanks in part to the dedication of Rotarians working together.

There are a couple of new programs being introduced this year based on Bill Boyd's "Lead the Way". They are:

- 1. Rotary College will be an on-line program teaching leadership.
- 2. Adventures in Leadership will be a high school program for Grade 10 12 students starting next Spring or Fall. Gary Hollick is involved, and the course will teach young leaders the leadership skills required to be effective in life.

Rod reminded us of two upcoming events – the District 50/50 conference to be held at Harrison Hot Springs May 31 – June 2, 2007. This is a golfing event. The second event is the annual Rotary International Convention, which is being held in Salt Lake City, Utah on June 17 – 20, 2007.
